The 42nd annual homecoming parade kicked off activities for the day Saturday, Oct. 11. Thirty-four units participated, making this year's parade exceptionally nice.

Sigma Sigma Sigma Sorority "sewed up" first place this past week in the float competition with the bicentennial theme "Sewing Up a Victory." The float depicted Betsy Ross sewing an American flag.

Second in the competition was the Tau Kappa Epsilon Float. They chose "The British Then-The Bobcats Now!" as their theme. A giant Pioneer was the center figure on the float, which shot a bobcat off a tree stump.

"200 Years Closer to Christ's Return" won third place in the judging. Sponsored by Christian Youth Fellowship, this float used the "one way" symbol-a hand, holding a cross," with the forefinger pointing skyward.

At 11:30, Miss Rebecca Watson was crowned. She and her court, consisting of Vickie McCracken, Beth Steidl, Tish Cummings, and Kim Casto, reigned over the homecoming festivities at Rohrbough Field.

The Montrose Award was presented to Thomas Lilly and Robert Hardman, for their outstanding scholastic and athletic achievements, at the halftime ceremonies. Queen Becky and her court were introduced to the spectators, and the float trophies were awarded by Mrs. Susan Fulton.

The Alumni Dance was packed with students and alumni. Both bands, Shenendoah and Brass L.T.D. played to every heart's content. With hard rock, 50's music, polkas and waltzes, both the ballroom and the union were alive with sound.

Forensics Team Previewed; Exciting Season Anticipated

With the beginning of the 1975-1976 forensics season near at hand, the Glenville Mercury staff gives you a look at the G.S.C. forensics team and dares to answer the question: What is forensics? Forensics is contest speaking in a variety of events, including Oral Interpretation of Prose, Poetry and Drama; and the Public Speaking Events which include Sales talk, After Dinner Speaking, Informative Speaking, Persuasive Speaking, Impromptu Speaking, Extemporaneous Speaking and Rhetorical Criticism.

Each year Glenville sends a variety of entries in each category (except Rhetorical Criticism which is too boring for anyone to enter). At the contests, which are held at colleges across the nation, each contestant must compete at least in three preliminary rounds (and possibly semi-finals and finals) in each event in which he is entered. A contestant normally will compete against from four to six contestants in each round. The goal is to place as high on the judge's ballot as possible, so that a first is the best and a sixth is trouble. At the end of the three preliminary rounds, contestants with the lowest totals proceed to the semi-finals and after tabulating low scores in the semi-finals, the top six move to the finals. Usually all finalists receive trophies (from 1st to 6th) except for the cheap tournaments which might give lovely keepsakes like terrariums (cactus for the sixth, petunia for fifth etc.)

Any student who makes it to the finals in any event in any qualifying tournament (10 or more schools participating and at least 12 entries per event) qualifies to compete in that event in Individual Events. This year the National Finals will be held in late April at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Last year at the National Finals (held at Niagara, N.Y.) Glenville finished 19th in the nation with Dorothy Wright placing second in the nation in After Dinner Speaking. On a yearly tabulation basis based on competition in Individual Events and Debate, Glenville finished in the top 20- a remarkable achievement con-

sidering Glenville had no debate team.

The 1975-76 G.S.C. forensics team is 12 members strong (with a couple of weaklings thrown in for good measure) Heading the group are five returning team members: Art Wilt, who has two years' experience, 'has tried virtually every aspect of forensics and done well, excelling particularly in Impromptu Extemp. (He is the state champion) Judy Ditlow now in her second year on the circuit competes primarily in Oral Interp, After Dinner (she is the state champion) and Informative. Brenda Maylee Miller has competed for two years in After Dinner and this year will branch out in more events including Oral Interp. and Persuasion. Dorothy Wright, the final returning team member, will be in her second year of competition. Dorothy has proven her abilities by placing second in the nation last year in After Dinner Speaking, competing against more than 100 contestants from colleges and universities across the nation. She is also the state champion in both Prose and Poetry Interpretation.

New team members include Brenda Henthorn, Mark Hickman, Judy Crites, Tina Crump, Mary Lou Farnsworth, Jim Anderson, and Delbert Conley. Brenda Henthorn is a transfer student from Lorraine County Community College where she competed on the forensics team.

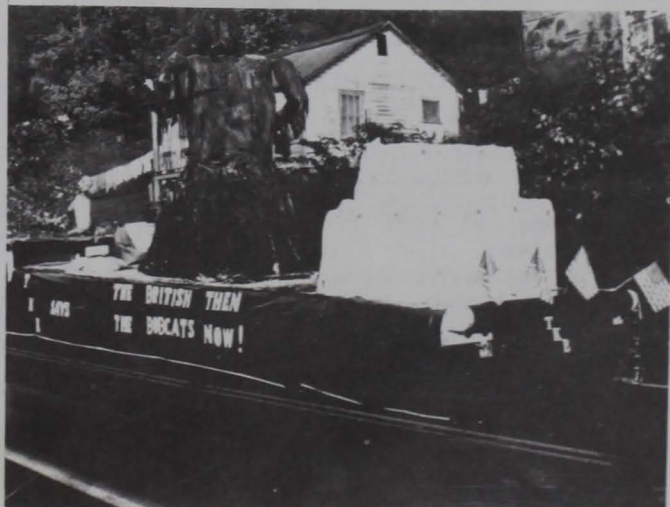
Last year, at the two-year college nationals in Sacramento, Calif., Ms. Henthorn placed third in the nation in After Dinner Speaking. The remaining team members will be competing for the first time this year, although two members, Tina Crump, and Judy Crites have had considerable high school forensics experience. Ms. Crump attended Greenbrier East High School in Lewisburg, and Ms. Crites attended Parkersburg High School

Dear Editor,

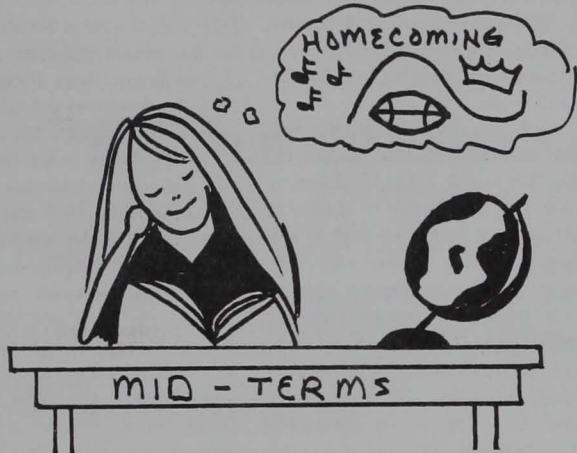

If not, you're forever too late. Steven Deem, Peggy Collins, Robert Hays, Janet Eriksen, Barbara Stemple and the rest of the cast members have resumed their student roles. However, neither they nor the audience members are likely to soon forget this high-spirited comedy.

The combination of Sumner Arthur Long's wit and the characters' timing and delivery drew grins, chuckles, and tears of laughter throughout the three acts. Harry Lambert's vanity, Edith Lambert's pregnancy, daughter Kate's schemes to get out of the housework and keep her husband home, and husband Charlie's rivalry with his father-in-law/boss all contributed to the humor.

Some highlights included Charlie sticking his head in a commode (purchased for Edith's nursery and stored in the Lambert living room) only to find neighbor Mayor Crane's name on it. The resolution of the West Virginia Conference of AAUP from which my statement was extracted reads, in part: "...Policy Bulletin Number 40 gives the presidents...total and blanket authority to make any decision that they see fit concerning employees...."

Second, I did say Policy Bulletin Number 40 "effectively removes the faculty from the governing process of an institution," but only if an individual president chooses to exercise all the power available to him. Thank you.

For his abounding effort of the past two weeks Paul Jackson is the winner of the Randello Scarlotto Memorial Award-face down.

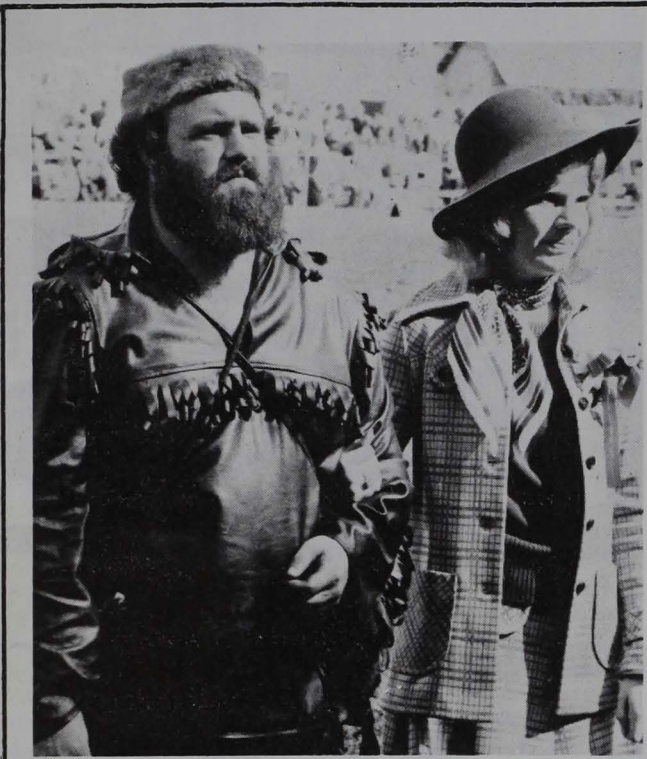

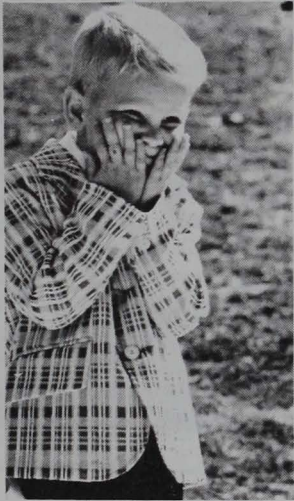

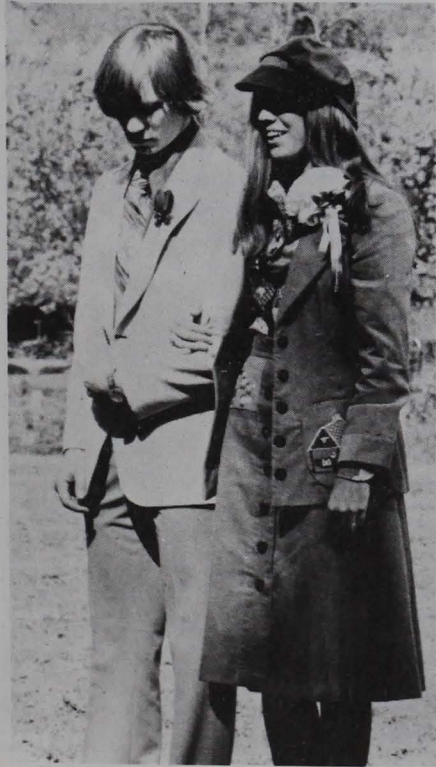

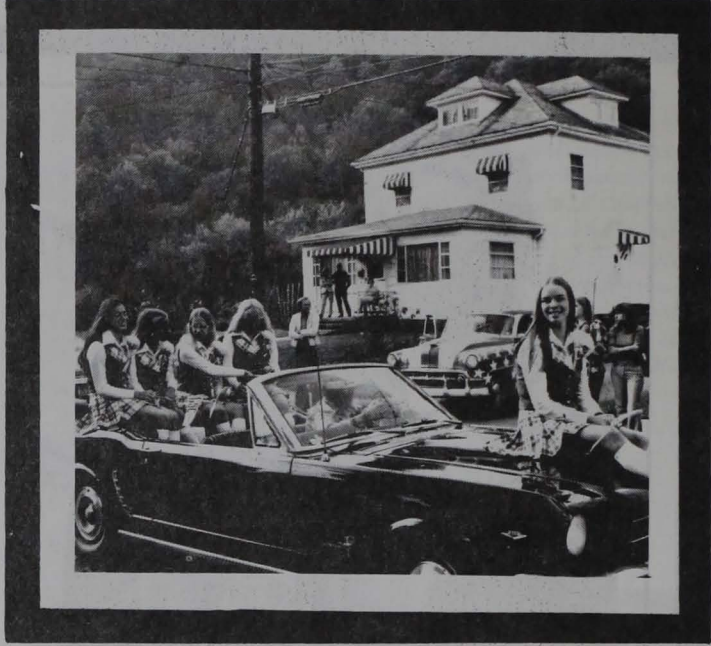

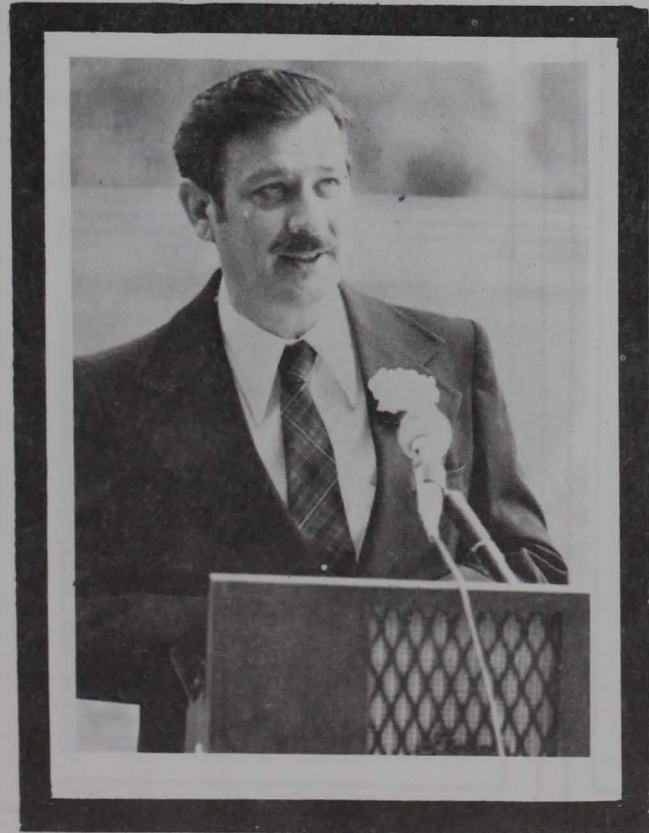

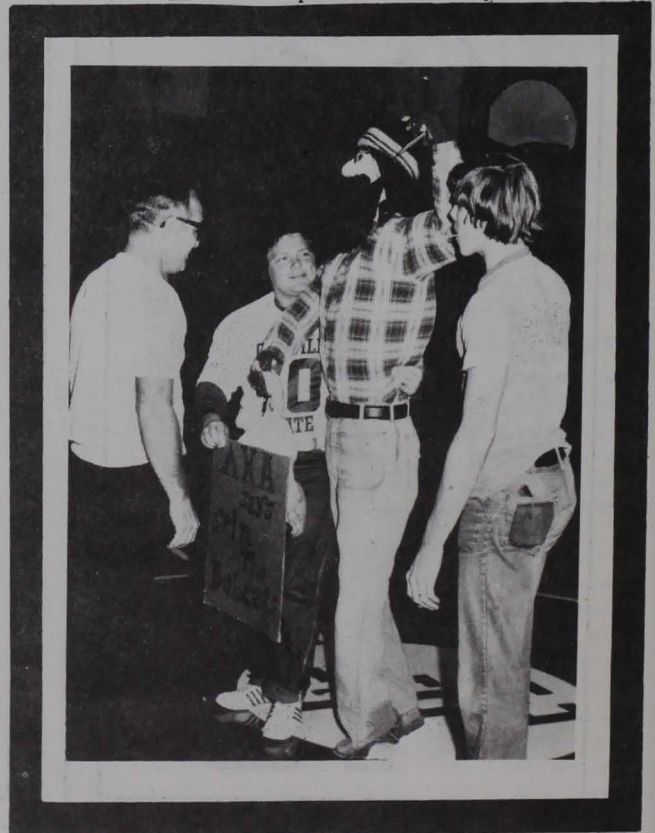

Then the tenth-ranked West Virginia Mountaineers were crushed by the Penn State Nittany Lions. And to cap off an already poor afternoon, my favor Cincinnati Reds were belted by the Boston Red Sox in the first game of the World Series.

Getting back to the Pioneers, it seems the G-Men can't get things going. One of the main reasons for the Pioneer misfortunes is the many nagging injuries. As little as the Pioneers are, they can not afford many injuries, but in last Saturday's game numerous players played with injuries or had to sit out the game.

In this sportswriter's opinion, that in itself was a major factor in the Pioneers' 21-15 overtime loss to the Bobcats.

OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

In last week's column, I mentioned that the Pioneers had yet to score in the first half of any ballgame this season. Well, in last Saturday's Homecoming game, the G-Men scored in the first quarter when quarterback Tom Cowan hit wide receiver Bob Shaffer on a 34 yard TD pass. In the second period, Glenville scored again when linebacker Randy Smith tackled the Bobcats' John Luchs in the endzone for a safety.

Another Pioneer highlight in the game came when fullback Leandis Hodges raced off tackle for 54 yards before being hauled down.

That play set up the Pioneers' last touchdown, but it wasn't enough. **RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT**

Could you believe the WV State-West Liberty game last weekend when they tied 54-54 in three overtimes?

The Yellow Jackets were ahead 42-13 with 12 minutes left in the game when the Hilltoppers' substitute quarterback, Mike Flannery, brought West Liberty back in the game by throwing four T.D. passes in the final 12 minutes. The game which ended in the highest scoring tie ever, was highlighted by Flannery's seven T.D. tosses.

The only way the Yellow Jackets could stop Flannery was by knocking him out and that's exactly what they did in the overtime period.

Bobcats Upset Pioneers In Overtime

The WV Wesleyan Bobcats upset the Glenville Pioneers last Saturday afternoon 21-15 in overtime, dampening Homecoming spirits for the Pioneers. The Bobcats won their second straight ballgame while the Pioneers lost their third game in a row.

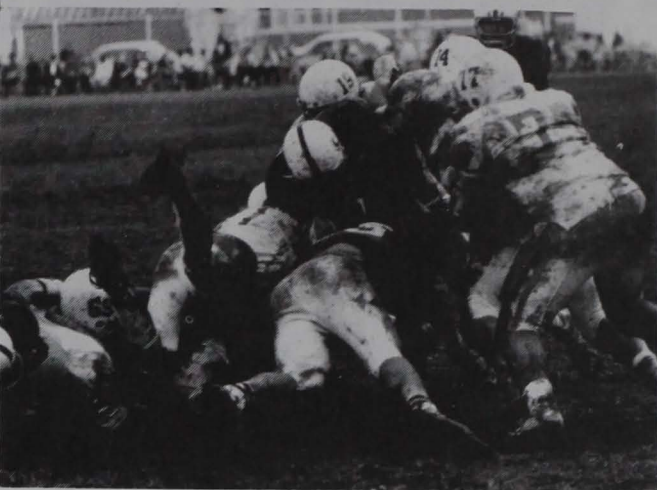
The Pioneers jumped out to an early lead when quarterback Tom Cowan hit split end Bob Shaffer on a 34 yard pass play. The scoring drive started on the Glenville 48 yard line and it took only six plays to score.

The Pioneers failed to convert their extra point on a bad snap from center.

The G-Men increased their lead to 8-0 in the second period when linebacker Randy Smith tackled Wesleyan's quarterback John Luchs in the end zone.

Both teams were held scoreless in the third stanza, but the Bobcats' ground attack caught fire in the fourth quarter and burned the Pioneers. The Bobcats were led by running back Steve Vannoy, who picked up 108 yards in 24 carries for the day. Vannoy scored the first Bobcat T.D. on a three yard run. Luchs threw to Rich Thomaselli for the two point conversion and an 8-8 tie.

The Pioneers bounced back and scored when they marched 80 yards

in 9 plays to give the G-Men a 15-8 lead. The highlight of the drive was a 54 yard run by Leandis Hodges. Don Brady scored the TD when he leaped over the goal line from one yard out and Bob Casto kicked the PAT.

Wesleyan came right back to tie the score and put it into overtime when they marched 75 yards in eight plays for the TD. Vannoy scored the Bobcat touchdown on a 3 yard run. Jeff Haymaker kicked the PAT.

In the overtime, the Pioneers failed

to score but the Bobcats scored on their first possession of the ball when Luchs ran over from two yards out.

Glenville was led in rushing by Brady who carried the ball 24 times for 76 yards. Cowan threw for 69 yards connecting on 5 of 12 attempts. Overall the Pioneers led in statistics with 227 yards total offense compared to Wesleyan's 200 yards.

The Pioneers, whose record now stands at 1-3-1, travel to the southern part of the state tomorrow to invade Bluefield in an afternoon tussle.

Theta Xi Wins "Commode Bowl" Title

The Theta Xi fraternity captured its fifth Commode Bowl title in seven years last Thursday afternoon, beating defending champion Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity, 16-0.

Theta Xi jumped on the defending champs early when Randy Buchannon pulled the flag out from TKE's quarterback Tim Howard in the end zone for a safety.

Later in the first half, the 'Zits' speedster, Dennis Hunt, raced for a 60 yard touchdown making the score 8-0. They failed on the point after attempt, but still went into half-time with an eight point lead.

In the second half, the Tekes' Tim

Howard was again forced into another safety when Ken Wilson and Joseph Mills pulled his flag out before he could get rid of the pigskin.

Late in the game, defensive back Terry Handschumaker of the 'Zits' picked off a Howard pass and raced 40 yards for an insurance touchdown, giving the Theta Xi's a hard fought 16-0 victory.
