The last week of Ms. Watkins tour was occupied with the life of the Kibbutz. A kibbutz is a settlement community chiefly agricultural and one of Israel's forms of education. The Kibbutz is self-contained with Hebrew being the native tongue and Jewish as their choice of religion.

Ms. Watkin's talk was very informative and showed a new view of the Holy Land from the standpoint of education,

# Fellowship Group Walks For Money

Several members of the GSC Christian Fellowship will walk 20 miles November 1 to raise money for an interfaith chapel at the West Virginia Rehabilitation Center.

The Center, located at Institute, serves more that 1500 disabled and handicapped students of all faiths, Previously, students were transported to community churches by concerned volunteers, but often this entails moving much equipment such as wheel chairs, walkers, and so forth. In some cases, it is practically impossible to take students out at all.

Presently, Center students are ministered to by various religious groups who hold worship services in the recreation hall. Bible studies are held in the library and student

The Chapel will be a centralized area for meeting these and other spiritual needs. In a year's time, more than 150 worship services will be held there, along with Bible studies, group discussions, and religious drama groups.

Approximately \$150,000 is needed to build the chapel and the money has to come from sources other than Federal and State funds.

Churches, civic clubs, service organizations, veterans groups, and national foundations are being asked to assist the project.

Students, faculty, and other interested parties can help the project on the Glenville campus by sponsoring someone to walk in the November Marathon. By pledging a nickel, a dime, or a dollar a milehowever much the individual wishes to contribute-he can help make this 20 mile hike worthwhile.

Two parts comprise the service: the microfiche file of clippings from urban newspapers throughout the country, and the index. The microfiche file is located in the Eric/

Newsbank room next to the elevator on the first floor of the library. It is arranged by major category, then by year, and finally by card

The Newsbank microfiche file is searchable through the index, which is located in the reference section of the library. # Faulkner Is Subject Of Sigma Tau Delta

Sigma Tau Delta, honorary literary fraternity, will discuss three of William Faulkner's novelettes at its monthly meeting, Wednesday, October 29th, at 6:30 p.m. in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Pioneer

The stories can be found in one volume entitled Three Famous Short Novels, Spotted Horses, The Old Man and the Bear, published by Random Houses's Vintage Press. It is available in the bookstore.

"Spotted Horses" is the hilarious account of a horse auction. When the laws tries to settle a dispute caused by the sale of wild horses, it finds opposition in the cold practicality of Mrs. Tull. "The Old Man" recounts the adventures of a convict who finds himself adrift with a pregnant woman when the lower Mississippi floods the countryside. "His one aim is to return the woman to safety and himself to prison where he can be free of women.' "The Bear" is often considered one of Faulkner's best works. It is the story of Ike McCaslin's coming to terms with the adult world and the world of the wilderness. Through his confrontation with Old Ben, the bear who for years eludes Ike's older relatives, "the boy is taught the real meaning of pride, humility, and courage, virtues Faulkner feared would be almost impossible to learn with the destruction of the wilderness."

# **Pioneers Beat Blues**

second game of the season last Saturday afternoon in Bluefield when they came from behind in the second half to defeat the Big Blues from Bluefield 17-7.

Bluefield jumped on the Pioneers early when big John Monroe of the Big Blues bulled his way over from the one yard line with 7:47 still left in the first period. Joe Johnson converted the extra point.

With the score 7-0 in favor of Bluefield, Glenville's kicker Bob Casto booted a 41 yard field goal of the season.

The second half was nothing but Glenville's as Coach Whitey Andersen got his troops fired up. By alternating two quarterbacks, Chris Arderson and Tom Cowan, the Pioneers were able to score two touchdowns, each quarterback throwing one touchdown apiece.

The go-ahead touchdown came with 5:19 left in the third stanza when Anderson took the G-Men in to score from nineteen yards out. The score was set up after freshman Ed Donatell intercepted a Bluefield pass and raced 45 yards to the Big Blues' 19 yard line. Andersen, the senior signal caller, capped the drive with a 10 yard pass to sophomore tight end C.W. Campbell. It was Campbell's first touchdown in his college career. Casto added the PAT to make the score

With 5:03 left in the game Cowan guided the G-Men to their final score when he hit slotback Steve Chandler on a 13 yard touchdown pass. Casto's successful PAT made the final score 17-7.
