# **Forensics 7th In Tourney**

The Glenville State College Forensics Team, under the direction of Katherine J. Leisering of the Speech Department, missed a Sweepstakes trophy by only five points as Glenville amassed seven more trophics and won out over twenty-two other schools in the Georgetown College, Ky. Julep Invitational Individual Events Tournament held this past weekend. Glenville finished seventh in the sweepstakes tabulation with only a five member team and beat such other schools as: Stetson U., Florida; Ohio University; University of Tennessee; Fairmont State College; University of Toledo; University of Dayton; S. Connecticut College; Murray State University; and Marshall University.

Glenville's Sweeptakes loss assuredly came as the result of some of Glenville's team members dropping out of competition at the last minute. This is Glenville's first sweepstakes loss of the season.

Glenville's seven trophies included a phenomenal three first place trophies. Judy Ditlow entered in five events, finaled in two, taking first place in After DinnerSpeaking, against 38 other contestants, and 3rd place in Sales Speaking, against 28 other contestants. Mark Hickman, also entered in five events, finished first in Sales Speaking and third in After Dinner Speaking, simply reversing Ms. Ditlow's wins. Mr. Hickman added sweepstakes points in Prose, Persuasion, and Drama Duo with Dorothy Wright.

Tina Crump, while only a freshman and only in her 4th tournament, won the varsity Prose Interpretation Category and won out over 62 other contestants. Ms. Crump, though a novice who should have been entered in Novice Prose, did not let that stop her, competed with the seasoned varsity readers and beat them all. Ms. Crump also tied for finals placement in After Dinner Speaking and missed out by one speaker point of reaching

the finals there. Ms. Crump added sweepstakes points in Sales and Poetry Interpretation.

Dorothy Wright, competing in five events, narrowly missed finalling in Poetry Interp and added sweepstakes points in Prose Interp, Sales, Drama Duo (with Mark Hickman) and Persuasion. Brenda Henthorn, who was supposed to be a pentathlon entrant, was down to four events at the last minute. Ms. Henthorn added sweepstakes points in Prose, Poetry, After Dinner Speaking and Duo (with Judy Ditlow).

Ms. Ditlow, a pentathlon entrant at the contest, placed second out of 25 pentathlon entrants. Mark Hickman, also a pentathlon entrant, won sixth place in that category. Pentathlon is extremely difficult due to its rigorous demands.

This is the 28th trophy of the season for Glenville and the 18th qualifier for the National Finals in April at California State University at Los Angeles. The trophy total for Glenville is now 87. The next tournament for GSC will be Mansfield, Pa., on Feb. 20-21.

On February 18th and 19th the GSC campus will be provided with an opportunity to elect new student leaders. The Glenville State College Student Congress will hold its annual elections on Wednesday, Feb. 18 and Thursday, Feb. 19.

Three polling places will be provided for students to cast their ballots. All GSC students are eligible to vote. The only requirement is a student identification card (I.D.). The polls will be located in (1) the lobby of the Student Center; (2) the office of Louis Bennett Hall; (3) the Scott Wing Office of Pickens Hall. The polls will open Wednesday, Feb. 18 at 9:00 a.m. and will close at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday afternoon.

Some forty students will be vying for offices in the upcoming elections. Only one candidate has declared himself for the office of president. Tim Butcher, junior business administration major from Glenville, is the single candidate for the presidential slot.

Three candidates have filed their intentions for the office of vice-president. They include Kim Casto, elementary education major from Ripley; Jane Stump, math major from Glenville; and C.W. Campbell, physical education major also from Glenville

You are urged to cast your vote. The entire process takes a mere 30 seconds, a truly well-spent half minute.



The head count at Glenville State College is 14.2% lower or 230 less than last semester's.

# Flirting With Death?

A race car driver zooming around a track at 200 miles an hour risks his life to break speed records. Another man builds a lightweight vessel and sails off on a one-man voyage across the ocean.

Most of us are amazed at such perilous feats. But we're unaware that we flirt with death just as much as these daredevils. We think of life as a gamble and find it convenient to ignore the odds. Health experts give us good advice about living and eating habits and we disregard it.

Take heart disease, for example. It can affect anyone who delights in these risks: A pack or two-pack-a-day cigarette habit; no concern about high blood pressure checkups; a diet laden with saturated fats and cholesterol; a problem with overweight; and an aversion to exercise. Remember, not only do the elderly die of heart disease, anyone can.

By modifying these risk factors, the Gilmer County Heart Association points out that it's possible to eliminate or reduce the chances of heart attack or stroke. Unfortunately, for some, there are certain risk factors which can't be altered—heredity, sex, age, and race. Some families have a tendency toward heart attack or stroke. Men suffer heart attacks earlier in life than women, and the likelihood of heart attack increases with age. Black Americans run a higher risk because they're more likely to develop high blood pressure.

It's never too late to reassess your lifestyle and cut down your risk. The American Heart Association

# Men Rank 6th In 50

The Glenville State College men's and women's bowling teams competed in the ACUI Region Four Tournament last weekend in Morgantown. The men's team placed an impressive sixth place in the 50 team field while the women's team finished well back in the pack.

George Washington University won the men's tournament while the mighty women from Penn State walked away with the women's title.

The Pioneer men were led in the nine game tourney by senior Tom Newberry who had a pinfall of 1806 and an average of 200. Newberry was followed by Sam Ferrell who had an average of 189. Next for the G-Men was freshman Dave Twyman with a 180 average, followed by Mike Hickman with a 165 average, and Mark Smith who bowled an average of 160.

The Pioneer women were led by Karen Goodall who had a nine game pinfall of 1515, which was an average of 168. Debbie Curry followed with an average of 157. Other G-Women competing were Phyllis Taylor, 145; Debbie Stalnaker, 144 average; and Christie Nida, 128 average.

Newberry, for the Pioneer men, placed third in the entire competition. If the G-Men had placed first or second in this event, they would have won the right to compete in the United States team trials for the International Cup.

The Pioneers will compete in the 3rd WVIAC Bowling Regional tomorrow in Clarksburg. The tournament starts at 1:00 p.m.

Apart from the standard English dictionaries that one ordinarily consults for spelling, pronunciation and meaning of words, there are several more specialized dictionaries whose services vary from indicating syllabication to defining non-standard English, Anglicized terms, odd phrases, proper names, as well as abbreviations and acronyms. The knowledge of these specialized dictionaries may aid one in securing information quickly and more accurately.

The dictionaries that will be discussed here are selected dictionaries dealing with idioms and terminology that have appeared in common English use fairly recently. These have come from other nationalities and races, and are used much in speech and writing today.

One of these is The Dictionary of Foreign Terms in the English Language, by David Carrol, (Hawthorne, 1973)-R422.4/C319. While the adoption of foreign terms into the English language is not a new phenomemon, it is becoming more common to use terms that are not wholly Anglicized. For example, in this dictionary, foreign terms assimilated into the English language are entered in Roman type, VIZ: Tableau (silent arrangement of people); vis-a-vis

tive to the question and not to the author or printer); modus vivendi (life style); and joie de vivre (joy of living). Most words in this particular dictionary are those not yet assimilated into the English language, but still considered foreign terms. Yet these words are so frequently encountered in writing and in speech that one needs to know them. For example: modus operandi (method of operation); in loco parentis (in the position of a parent); de riguer (according to set of rules or manners strictly required by etiquette); This is a handy dictionary that helps one to locate these terms easily.

Two dictionaries that define much of the terminology of the Afro-American culture are Dictionary of Afro-American Slang, by Clarence Major (International, 1970)-R427.09/M234, and Black Jargon in White America, by David Claerbaut (Eerdmans, 1972)-R427.9/C583. In the first book, words are dated as to decade of origin, as 1930's, 1950's and so on. In the second book, the words are identified by part of speech. Definitions tend to be more precise in the Claerbaut volume, giving examples of use as well. Many terms in both volumes are quite familiar today.
