### Speech Team Wins

The Glenville State College Forensics team scored another impressive victory as it won the second place sweepstakes trophy at the Buckeye Invitational Individual Events Tourney held this past weekend at Kent State University, Kent, Ohio. Competing in the tournament which hosted 30 schools, Glenville accrued 102 sweepstakes points with only nine single entries. Defiance College, the winning sweepstakes school, had 18 entries and 134 sweepstakes points in the event. Glenville beat such other schools as Oberlin, Youngstown University, Dayton University, Ohio Wesleyan, and Miami University.

Under the direction of Katherine Leisering, the GSC forensics team won five more trophies, three of them first place, had seven out of ten entries (an impressive 70%) reach the finals, and added three new qualifiers for the National Finals to be held in April in Los Angeles, Calif. Trophies were given only to the top three finalists in each category.

Tina Crump, for the first time in Glenville Forensics history, won the Prose Interpretation category for the second contest in a row. Ms. Crump won Prose two weeks ago at Georgetown College, Ky.

Dorothy Wright scored an impressive victory in Extemporaneous Interpretation of Poetry. This category requires the contestant to interpret a poem or series of poems, and write an appropriate introduction and transition. The contestant has 30 minutes to prepare the presentation. Ms. Wright went through three rounds and finals, and thus had to prepare four separate and different programs.

The Duo Team of Judy Ditlow and Brenda Henthorn took first place in Drama Duo, the first time on a Glenville Duo team, with their superb presentation of a cutting from Noel Coward's Blithe Spirit Ms. Henthorn and Barb Stemple also finaled with their duo, The Bad Seed, finishing six th.

Mark Hickman finaled and placed third in Persuasive Speaking. Judy Ditlow, in addition to her Duo victory, finaled in Informative Speaking, placing fourth and Barb Stemple finaled in Prose Interpretation, placing fifth. A word must be said about the

valiant efforts of Tina Crump and Mark Hickamn in Informative Speaking. Upon arrival at the contest, it was discovered that Informative was the only category lacking enough contestants to make it a qualifying event at the nationals. Informative was short by two contestants. Ms. Leisering offered the services of Ms. Crump, who had been working on an informative speech, but was not ready yet to give it, and Mr. Hickman who had no speech. Minutes before the contest, Dorothy Wright and Mark Hickman collaborated on a brilliant informative effort on "Afros". Mr. Hickman went through three rounds with the speech and even managed to pick up a sweepstakes point, by finishing third in round one. Thus, Tina Crump and Mark Hickman made it possible for Judy Ditlow's finalist placement finish for the nationals.

This week, Glenville will hit the road again to travel to Mansfield, Pa. for yet another tournament. Only part of the team will make the trip:

## **New English Redefined**

In a recent Mercury, dictionaries were described that perform special functions regarding the definitions of words and phrases in the English language. Another dictionary that answers question on new and unusual terms is the BARNHART DICTION-ARY OF NEW ENGLISH SINCE 1963 (Barnhart/Harper-Row, 1973)-R423/B262, which performs a task not unlike the Oxford English Dictionary. It records new terms, old words used in new contexts, and phrases.


"Beautiful People" is a term used much in the late six ties, and recorded in three locations in 1970, according to citations listed in this dictionary. The use of "bar mitzvah" as a verb - to confirm a thirteen-year-old boy in the Synagogue - - reflects a new trend, to make verbs out of many common, and even proper, nouns. "Xerox" is another example of a noun used as a verb. Its usage is recorded by NEW SCIENTIST and HARPER'S magazine in 1970. Terms having to do with life styles, two working parents, new music, technology, and social and ecological consciousness, are evident in this book. "Life-support systems" is an example of a current ecological phrase that came into vogue in the 1970's.

Charles Funk has collected several interesting sayings in his work, HEAVENS TO BETSY! reflects a collection of expressions strange and archaic as well as those in rather common usage. These idioms of the English language have been around a long while, and have interesting origins. One expression not heard much, but which may be remembered by some is "to sit (or stand) like a Stoughton bottle". Mr. Funk devotes three and a half pages to the history of the expression and the man for which it may be credited.

Still to be heard and used frequently are such phrases as "between the devil and the deep blue sea"; "not worth a hill of beans"; "sacred cow"; and "taken to the cleaners". For all expressions included brief origins are given, in an interesting and catchy way. This index is absolutely necessary to this volume; however, indication is not made as to which indexed phrases are main entries in the dictionary, and which are merely mentioned as synonymous with a main entry.

Charles Funk, has, nevertheless, rendered a colorful commentary on the development of the English language. HEAVENS TO BETSY!! may be found in the reference section under number R423/F998h.

### Arnette Sparks **Pioneer** Victory

The Glenville Pioneers closed out their regular season last Tuesday night when they smashed the Davis and Elkins Senators before a hometown crowd, 113-80. It was Glenville's second straight win in as many nights and its twelfth victory of the season against fifteen losses.

The big story of the game was Greg Arnette's performances. The 5' 11' jumping-jack came off the bench with less than ten minutes to go in the game and scored 24 points to thrill the home town crowd. Arnette, who is one of the crowd's favorite, connected on 10 of 14 shots from the floor and 5 of 6 from the foul line.

In the contest the streaking Pioneers jumped out to an early lead and never looked back. The G-Men held a comfortable 53-34 lead at halftime.

In their first contest, the gals from Davis & Elkins pulled out to a 25-6 halftime lead and managed to play the G-Women even the second half to pick up the victory.


Kim West powered in 14 points for the Pioneerettes.


