
Ms. Charlotte Eary

Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) is for you-the future teacher and the present teacher. In the CEC, college students and teachers can work with these children who need extra help and more understanding. Through working with exceptional children, teachers can learn to cope with problems which arise in regular classrooms. Teachers will also be better equipped to recognize problems and to adjust their programs to meet the exceptional child's needs and still teach the rest of the class.

By becoming a member of the CEC, there are unlimited opportunities for service since the chapter and federation goals include the following: 1) public awareness and acceptance of exceptional children; 2) professional growth and standards; 3) recruitment to the profession; 4) interchange among discipline; 5) interagency coordination; 6) legislative involvement; 7) direct services to children; and 8) professional fellowship and interchange of ideas.

Members of the CEC are people who are engaged in professional work related to the education of exceptional children. Also, fulltime college and high school students are members of the CEC. In fact, any person interested in exceptional children and their education can be members of the CEC.




