THE 1976 NAIA CHAMPION BOWLING TEAM

Fredin Elected AAUP Officer

The Spring meeting of the West Virginia Conference of American Association of University Professors was held last weekend, April 9-10 on the Concord College campus. At the banquet on Friday, Dr. Espy Miller was given special recognition for his service to AAUP as chairman of the Advisory Council of Faculty to the West Virginia Board of Regents.

At the Saturday business meeting, Dr. Lowell Fredin, associate professor of English at Glenville State and local AAUP president, was elected secretary of the West Virginia Conference for 1976-77.

AAUP, according to Dr. Fredin, is the nation's most active and highly influential organization in higher education. Approximately 500 members comprise the state membership, and the local chapter of 32 members is one of the most active in the state. Local officers include president Fredin; vice-president Dr. Gary Gillespie; and secretary-treasurer, associate professor Virginia West.

This is Glenville State College's sixteenth year in hosting the West Virginia Collegiate Art Exhibition. The exhibition is open to all undergraduate students of West Virginia colleges and universities. There are seven classes and a total of four entries may be submitted. The classes are oil painting, watercolor, sculpture and ceramics, graphics, drawing, mixed media, and photography.

Works must be original and completed after March, 1974. All works must be suitably framed and wired for hanging. Paintings, prints, and drawings must not exceed four feet by six feet. Sculptures should not be in excess of 100 pounds.

All entries must be in by April 24. The entry fee for the exhibition is \$3. Cash awards will be given to outstanding works in the exhibition regardless of entry classification. Last year over \$650. in prizes were awarded.

GSC Bowlers Win NAIA Tournament

The Glenville State College Bowling Team has emerged as NAIA champions this year through an unusual set of circumstances.

West Liberty State College was the Area VI representative to the National Tournament. Seven (Dams in the national tourney are area champions; the eighth team is chosen "at large" in the area of greatest participation (àgain Area VI). Glenville State was invited to participate and was considered the 'Dark Horse' team of the tournament. Each area winner bowled each school represented twice. Teams were rated by pinfall plus 250 bonus pins if they won.

West Liberty was Glenville's first opponent and Glenville lost the first game by nine pins and lost the next game. They they lost one to Oregon College of Education and won one; did likewise with Southwest Baptist, finally winning both games with Saginaw Valley (Michigan). At the end of the first day, Glenville has won four and lost four games, for a fourth-place rating. Sam Ferrell was in the number 2 position with a 201 average., with Paul Woods of Clarion State in first place with a 203 average.

On the second day, Glenville Strate beat Winona State (Minnesota) twice, and HardingCollege (Arkansas) twice. (Harding has been to twelve of the fifteen annual tournaments.) Glenville State then lost one and won one in their contest with Clarion State (Pa.), who were national champions in 1974 and beat GSC in area playoffs that vear.

In the final round, the Pioneers defeated Oregon, to win with ten wins and five losses. The Cinderella team did the impossible - - never before has a team won the National Championship while losing five games. Oregon was second; West Liberty, third; and Clarion State, fourth.

At the end of fifteen games, Sam Ferrell, GSC, had accumulated a pinfall of 3030 with games of 259, 246, 235, for a high average of 202. A senior physical education majorfrom Pt. Pleasant, Ferrell was named Outstanding Bowler of the Tournament and was named to the NAIA All-Tournament team.

Ferrell and teammate Tom Newberry placed second in doubles with 215 and 193 averages, respectively. West Liberty team members, Doug Tuskey and Bernard Lilley won by nine pins, with Clarion State coming in third.

Friday, April 23, 1976

Tom Newberry, a senior physical education major from Parkersburg finished with a 187 average in the tournament to place eighth of the forty bowlers. He received a plaque and was named to the All-Tournament team.

David Twyman, a freshman from Parkersburg, is a physical education major and is a member of the College Golf Team. His average was 183 for the tournament.

Mark Smith, also a freshman from Parkersburg, is a Business Administration major and bowled an average of 179 pins in the tourney.

Mike Hickman, a freshman from Dunbar, is a physical education major with a 166 average in the tournament.

Dr. Robert Dollgener, the Bowling Coach, is also Athletics Director and Professor of Health and Physical Education at GSC where he began work in 1967. He holds a M.Ed. degree from North Texas State University and a P.E.D. from Indiana University. He also serves as chairman of the Division of Health, Physical Education and Safety. This is Dr. Dollgener's ninth year with the nine-year-old bowling team. He cites proudly that this was the third trip to the nationals for his teams. They placed fourth in 1970 and



GSC Keglers Finish Fourth



The Glenville Pioneer golfers finished a disappointing second place, behind the Concord Mt. Lions, in the Southern Regional at Pipestem State Park.





Small time?' Come Now!

As this is America's bicentennial year, it seems only appropriate to mention the pioneer spirit of the mountaineers who started the move to the western frontier. This rugged spirit helped to mould and expand the U.S. to what it is today. Here, on campus, this pioneer spirit has prevailed in recent years and has reached its ultimate glory through the astounding efforts of the NAIA National Championship GSC Bowling Team. As Assistant Editor to this publication, I would like to take this time to commend the 1975-76 Pioneer keglers, their coach, Dr. Robert Dollgener, and also, to commend those individuals and teams who through their "Pioneer Spirit", have brought national recognition to this institution in past years.

As a prelude to GSC's first national sports championship one should mention the valiant efforts of individual and teams who have strived to achieve excellence in national competition. In March of 1972 the GSC basketball team represented West Virginia in the national championship tournament in Kansas City. This team portrayed great determination and stamina in gaining their berth and fared well as they won their first round game and then were defeated by one point in overtime in the second round.

During 1972-73, the Pioneer football squad went undefeated during the regular season and accepted a bid to the NAIA Division II Championship. The team won their semifinal game under adverse field conditions, then lost a heartbreaker to settle for national runners-up by a close score of 10-3. In 1974, the GSC golf team made the NAIA Final Playoffs in South Dakota and again in 1975 in Texas.

Along with these sports achievements, GSC's Sigma Sigma Sigma sorority attained national recognition by receiving the National Chapter Excellence Award in October, 1973 and the National Sorority Education Award this past month. This is a high honor as there are seventy-five Sigma chapters in the nation.

To further the list, in 1974, and again in 1975, the GSC Forensics Team placed fifteenth and nineteenth, respectively, in the National Finals. In 1974, Ms. Skip Kincaid, a former GSC student, placed fourth nationally among 212 contestants in Poetry Interpretation. Ms. DorothyWright, in 1975, received the national second place trophy in After Dinner Speaking. This year's fivemember team is representing the college in the national tournament held in Los Angeles, California.

Thus, we reach 1976 - the year for Americans, and a so-called age of apathy - to receive national recognition of the highest calibre by our Pioneer bowling team, headed by Sam Ferrell, the Outstanding Bowler of the Tournament. This team, along with those GSC teams and individuals in the past, should be most highly commended for that rugged spirit needed to achievenat'l recognition. Thanks to individuals like these, Glenville State should be redeemed in the eyes of those who abruptly pass it off as small-time.

Longwood College has been called the "mother of sororities", since four sororities-Kappa Delta, Sigma Sigma Sigma. Zeta Tau Alpha, and Alpha Sigma Alpha-were born by their observances of fraternity life at a man's college which was located only a few miles from Farmville. The eight founders: Sallie Michie, Louise will observe Ritual Week. Davis, Elizabeth Watkins, Martha Trent Featherson, Lelia Scott, Margaret Batten, Lucy Wright, and Isabella Merrick were a close circle of friends. They first organized a club in 1897, then, with the help of a fraternity man from the neighboring college, drafted a constitution and established Sigma Sigma Sigma in 1898.



At 6:30 p.m., the banquet will be held. Also honored at the banquet will be Mrs. Elizabeth Turner who will receive the Alumni Service Award.

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

> The end of the ten year period of time to use the GI Bill is approaching for those veteran students who were discharged prior to 1966. This means that benefits will expire for those veterans on May 31, 1976.

Any veteran who falls into this category and who plans to go to summer school should stop by the Office of Academic Affairs and be certified for the first session of summer school. This will allow payment for the remainder of May. Otherwise, the veteran will be paid only for the first 14 days in May.

Veterans who plan'to draw full benefits during the summer sessions must enroll for six credit hours, and must be enrolled for at least three hours each session. Veterans who want to draw uninterrupted checks during the spring and summer should notify Mrs. Stump of their intention to attend summer school by April 15, 1976.
