

Chancellor Morton Delivers Address

Chancellor Ben L. Morton, West Virginia Board of Regents, will participate in the One Hundredth Second Commencement of Glenville State College which will be held on Friday, May 14, 1976, at 11:00 a.m., in the College Gymnasium. Dr. Morton holds the B.S. and M.A. Degree from Ohio University and the Ph.D. from the University of Michigan Center for the Study of Higher Education. From 1974 to the present, Dr. Morton served as Chancellor of the West Virginia Board of Regents. From 1970 to 1974, he was Executive Officer of Illinois Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities, and from 1964-1970 Chancellor Morton served as Executive Secretary of the Missouri Commission of Higher Education, the Statutory State Planning and Coordinating Agency, and disequated state agency for a number of Federal programs.

Dr. Morton has served as president of the Association of Executive Officers of State wide Boards of Higher Education in 1969-70; served as Missouri Commissioner to the Education Commission of the States, and is listed in *Who's Who in America*.

A total of 345 will receive degrees at this commencement. Nine will be graduated with the Bachelor of Arts Degree, the Bachelor of Science, 6; Bachelor of Arts Business Administration, 32; Bachelor of Arts in Education, 194; Regents Bachelor of Arts, 20; Associate in Arts, 24; and Associate in Science, 60. Seniors Prepare To Be Graduated

On May 14, 1976 at 11 a.m., 345 graduates from Glenville State College will receive their degrees.

Seniors are to report to Pioneer Center no later than 10:15 a.m. Those required to travel some distance should budget time so as to arrive before 10:15 a.m. This is important!

Wear caps with tassels on right. Men remove caps for Alma Mater, invocation and benediction.

At the signal from the Dean, class stands as he presents them for degrees. Remain standing. President confers degrees. Move tassels to left at conclusion of President's pronouncement. All except first row be seated.

Immediately after this, the first row begins to move toward stage in close order. Other rows follow. Hand your name card to Dean at edge of stage. After receiving degree, move quickly across stage and return to original seat. Remain standing until last senior in your row returns to his seat. During Recessional the class moves out first. Faculty follows the class.

All persons will receive Diploma Covers only at Commencement. Pick up your diplomas in Clark Hall 101 (Cont. on page 4)

President Wilburn has announced that the West Virginia Board of Regents, at their recent meeting, has approved the low bid to Central General, Inc. of Vienna of \$514,911 to complete the athletic complex.

The complex, on Mineral Road in Glenville, has been under construction for some time and hopefully will be completed by this fall. It will include an 8-lane, all-weather track, football field, four tennis courts, and lighting for night events. It will seat 3500 people on one side and has space for temporary bleachers on the opposite side.

Erwin's Painting Chosen Exhibit

Debbie Erwin, a December '75 GSC graduate, is now exhibiting a painting in *Mainstreams '76*, the Ninth Annual Marietta College International Competitive Exhibition for Painting and Sculpture. The show opened April 3 and will run through May 17, 1976.

Ms. Erwin's painting is one of 216 works of art selected from 2,698 entries submitted by 698 artists. Only one other West Virginia artist is among the 165 artists selected representing 35 states and Canada.

Miss Erwin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Erwin of Glenville, graduated Summa Cum Laude with an Art Comprehensive major in December. She recently received the Charles Whiting Art Award and will attend West Virginia University graduate school in the fall to work toward a Master of Fine Arts degree.

During her years at college, she went on a four-week painting class trip to Nova Scotia under the direction of Mr. Charles C. Scott of Glenville State College. Last spring Miss Erwin attended a painting class at

Canaan Valley which was under the direction of Mr. William Gerhold.

CENTER UPLIFTS FACE

New Computer Installed

The Computer Center has completed the changeover from an IBM system 3 computer system to a Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC) PDP 11/40 computer system. The new system can contain up to 124 K words of memory and has the capacity to process programs written in three languages: RPG, FORTRAN, and BASIC. Among the peripheral equipment is a video display terminal, VT50, a card reader, CR11, and a line printer, LPII. The video display terminal has a keyboard, similar to a typewriter keyboard and a display screen, displaying up to twelve lines with a line length of 80 alpha or numeric characters. It can be used to compose, edit and forward messages to the computer; retrieve and update data contained in computer files; receive data and instructions from the processor; and perform on-line debugging. The card reader is a desk-top unit and can read 1000 cards/minute. The line printer prints 300 lines per minute. Both of these units are much faster than the IBM units they are replacing.

The Computer Center expects three additional terminals to be installed shortly. One will be a video display terminal, similar to the VT50. The other two will be

hard-copy terminals with paper copy of the communication. When these three terminals are installed we will have access to the IBM 370 system at WVU in Morgantown. This system has a much larger core and has the capacity to process programs written in PL-II, COBOL, SNOBOL, FORTRAN, WATFIVE, ASSEMBLER and other languages too numerous to mention.

We will also have access to their peripheral equipment such as graph plotters and optical scanners. Having these terminals that connect us to the 370 at WVU makes us part of the West Virginia Network for Educational Telecomputing (WVNET). This network encompasses 12 West Virginia colleges and WVU. The network consultants at WVU have been helping the Computer Center throughout the network to adjust to the changeover from their old systems to the new DEC systems with additional IBM 370 systems terminals. These consultants coordinate communication throughout the network and distribute the appropriate information to facilitate using the equipment in Morgantown.

Anyone wanting to use the system should have a copy of the Computer Center's user's guide, which is available at the Computer Center.

All in all, I'm sure the children were ecstatic. To get to touch a real live tree or to be hugged by a big tall dog or even to dance with a dancing bush is a thrill known to few in this area.

As usual, Ms. Kobuszewski did a lovely job of directing the cast, the stage construction and the entire production. Two Help In Campaigns


Two GSC students have been contributing to the gubernatorial campaigns for two of the Democratic candidates, making ready for next week's May 11 Primary.

R. G. Pearson Talks To Class

State Treasurer Ronald G. Pearson spoke to classes at Glenville State College on Wednesday, April 29, regarding an investment policy recently adopted by the State Board of Investments that will ensure that all State funds are invested on a daily basis. The investment tool now being used to invest State dollars to the last possible hour is the 21-hour Repurchase Agreement. A Repurchase Agreement is a contract whereby government securities are purchased from a financial institution—banks, brokers, etc.—for a certain period of time; and, at the end of that time, repurchased by the selling institution for the original dollar amount plus interest earned.

Pearson explained that a large volume of checks are processed against the State's major depository banks on a daily basis. Because the Treasury's book balances do not reflect checks not yet cashed, an amount of available monies referred to as "float" is created. In past years, these funds were never invested for the State. This year, approximately three million dollars will be earned by this one new investment tool initiated by Treasurer Pearson.

The Treasury contacts each major depository bank on a daily basis to determine the State's actual cash balance. Any monies not to cover charges against State accounts during that banking day, i.e., the "float", are then invested for a period of 21 hours by purchasing government securities owned by these banks. A contractual "Repurchase" agreement is made with each bank for the repurchase of these securities from the Treasury Department at an interest rate which is determined daily.

Through the use of this 21-hour investment program, "idle" funds are invested down to the hour that they are needed to cover checks being processed against them. Pearson stated that the 21-hour investment maximizes every dollar of our taxpayer's money.

There are three State officers on the State Board of Investments: Governor Moore, Auditor John Gates, and Treasurer Ronald G. Pearson. Pearson said this program was made possible by the close coordination of Governor Moore and Auditor Gates. The Auditor and Treasurer have worked together to revise old State accounting systems that in the past made it difficult to make short-term investments.



Forensics Team Finishes Seventh

The Glenville State College Forensics team, coached by Assistant Professor of Speech Katherine Leising, achieved what many considered an impossible goal last weekend by placing seventh in the nation at the National Forensics Association's Individual Events Finals held on the campus of California State University at Los Angeles.

The significance of this feat becomes apparent when considering that 128 colleges and universities from 33 states attended the national contest and Glenville won out over 121 of these schools including Princeton, USC, Ball State, U. of Florida, U. of Wisconsin, Oberlin College, Clarion State College, Ohio State University, U. of Arizona, U. of Toledo, Georgetown College, Ky., West Point Academy, Wright State U., Dayton, Ohio; State University of N.Y. at Pittsburgh, California State University at Los Angeles, and Marshall University, Parkersburg Community College and West Liberty State College to name only a few. This, of course, made Glenville the top W.Va. school in attendance.

Glenville achieved this high national ranking with only a six man team. With this six member team, Ms. Leising was able to generate 36 entries, (a remarkable total) and was able to make all six people pentathlon, (an equally remarkable feat). The Glenville team totaled 156 sweepstakes points and all these points came without any entries in either Impromptu or Extemporaneous Speaking. The ideal is to have at least three entries in all categories since each school's top three in each category count toward sweepstakes points. Glenville, unfortunately, has no Impromptu or Extemp Speakers.

The contest itself turned out to be a grueling ordeal with four preliminary rounds, quarter finals, semi-finals and finals squeezed into three days. The contest ran far behind schedule causing speakers and judges to begin at 8:00 a.m. and finish not often before 10:00 p.m. This was continuous contest with no lunch or dinner breaks. For those pentathlon entrants and for the coaches who served as judges, this turned into an endurance test.

Individually speaking, Glenville scored another unprecedented victory for a national finals by taking the top 3 positions in one category: After Dinner Speaking. The first place After Dinner award was nabbed by

Mark Hickman, second place by Brenda Henthorn, and third place by Judy Ditlow. Dorothy Wright, last year's second place winner, also semi-finaled in After Dinner Speaking. Cheryl Tintera, of the Marietta, Ohio School System, who accompanied the team, said: "These victories are the direct reflection of the desire to achieve, talent, and supreme knowledge of how to go about winning. I've watched GSC teams for 3 years—Coach Leising deserves a lot of credit."

Adding to the sweepstakes final were Dorothy Wright's and Tina Crump's quarter-finalist placement in Prose Interpretation; Dorothy Wright's quarter-finalist position in Poetry Interpretation and Dorothy Wright's and Mark Hickman's quarter-finalist position in Drama Duo Interpretation. What this means is that all of these entries were in the top 24 in those categories in the nation. In Prose, there were 240 entries, in Poetry 225 and in Duo, 156. To be in the top 24 in categories of this size is still a great honor.

This tournament prematurely concludes the forensic year for Glenville. Thanks again must go to President Wilburn and all those alumni, businessmen, and friends of the college who contributed so generously toward getting the GSC team to L.A. Thanks, also, to Cheryl Tintera for so graciously helping out all year with judging and transportation to and

from contests and to her principal, Mr. Larry Slater, for graciously allowing her to attend the contests. Thanks, finally, to the John Stemples for so often opening their home to the team.

GSC Announces Fee Increment


The fee schedule at GSC has undergone some changes. Tuition and fees have been raised from \$137.00 to \$148.00 per semester for In-State students. Out-of-State students' tuition and fees are raised from \$587.00 to \$598.00.

The price of Board has been raised from \$342.00 to \$360.00, but room rent is the same. A change has been made in the Board plan, also; there is just one meal plan. This plan consists of three meals daily, Monday thru Friday, and two meals on Saturday and Sunday.

The raise in fees of \$11, which accounts for the only rise in tuition and fees, was voted on and approved by the students this year. This fee will now go for more and better entertainment on campus, as well as to improve athletic equipment and activities. The user fee that was in effect has now been done away with. However, this user fee is still accountable to faculty and staff.

The security guard position consists of a 40 hour work week of night shift from 11 p.m. until 7 a.m. and the salary will be \$2.50 an hour during a six month probationary period, then the salary becomes \$500. per month. He will receive all regular college employee benefits.

A high school graduate is preferred with unclassified work experience. Ability to relate and communicate with persons face-to-face and over the telephone is a must. Must be able to accept responsibility readily and become aware of security procedures through in-service training.

The duties for this position include guarding residence hall entrances against trespass of unauthorized persons, checking identity of students entering the residence halls, answering the college phone after 11 p.m. and transferring incoming calls to proper extensions, reporting and referral of security problems and some maintenance assignments between semester breaks.

Requirements for the position are an Associate Degree or equivalent of experience with typing proficiency, ability to meet public and work with faculty and division chairmen and short hand helpful.

The duties include the processing of admission applications, handling of all admissions correspondence, the conducting of day to day business at the window in the Registrar's office, receiving all incoming calls to the Office of Academic Affairs, and serving as general assistant to the Associate Academic Dean.

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
