


6. The slaves were freed, but Lincoln didn't sign the Proclamation that emancipated them. Somebody shot him anyway.

Susan Martin and Linda Fullen are seen as counselors at the local Youth Opportunity Camp.



He remained valiantly silent until the British put a gun to his head, whereupon, he promptly spilled the military beans. The British soldiers were so grateful to Revere that they offered him a position in the Royal British Army. Since he didn't know the words to "God Save the King," Revere declined their offer, but graciously, as well as nervously, accepted their thanks. He was charged with cowardice in the face of the enemy, but for unknown reasons, was never tried.




