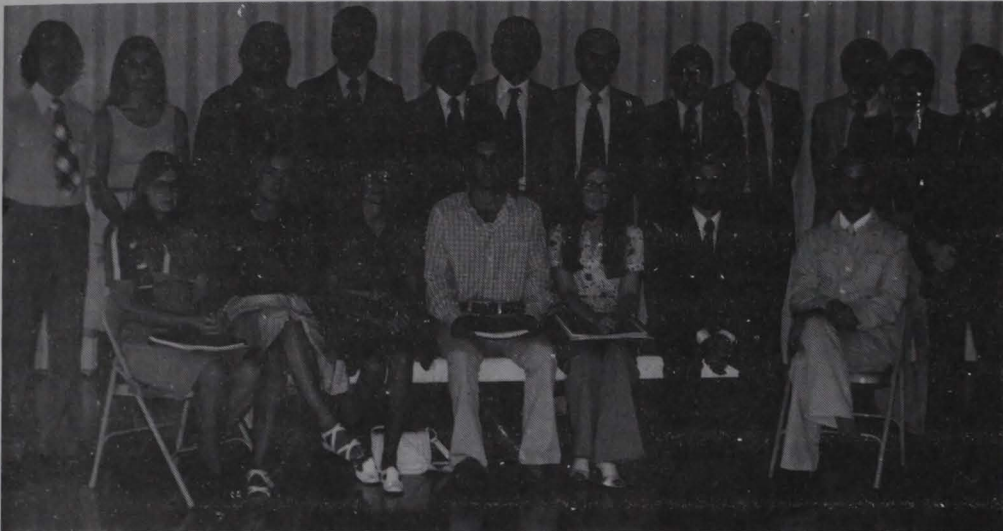

Three Students Represent GSC

Three Glenville State College students are among 22 from seven public colleges and universities who have been selected to participate in the Board of Regents Public Service-Learning Internship program for the fall semester.

Michael Gherke, Dawn Neva Lusk, and Dennis Miller have been named, according to Board of Regents Public Information Officer, John Hendrickson.

State students have been assigned to 14 state government agencies and the Regional Development Authority. They will begin their internships September 1, 1976.

The internship program was instituted by the Regents during the past spring term. Students who are classified as juniors and seniors are eligible to participate and those who are accepted are paid a stipend of \$85 per week for 16 weeks.

Dr. Ben L. Morton, Chancellor of the Board of Regents, said, "This program is proving to be a very effective supplement for campus and classroom experiences. We anticipate that it may well be the start of even broader application of the intern concept."

Dr. John Calles is the state-wide coordinator for the internship program and professor of educational administration at West Virginia College of Graduate Studies.

Students will receive 12 to 15 credit hours for participating in the program.

Dr. Brown Expresses Thanks to Student Body

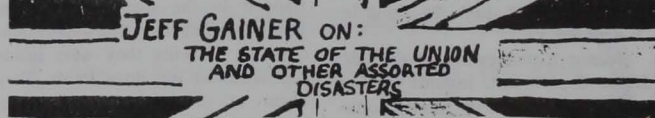

Jerry, Will, Hannah, Gore and Dick,

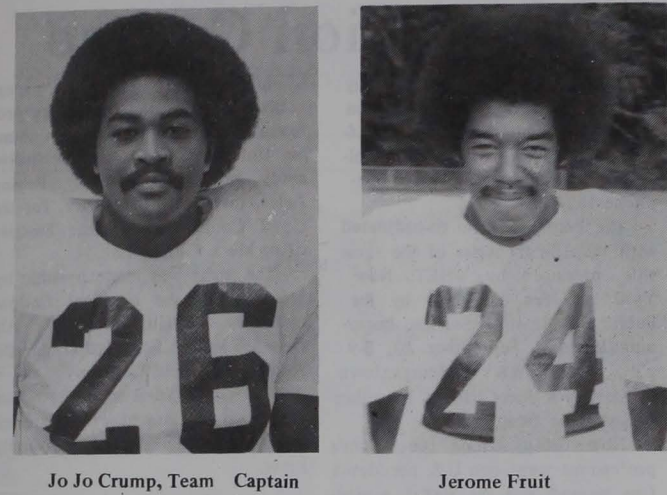

Glenville Travels To Madison

Glenville held its last preseason scrimmage of the year last Saturday at the new practice field on Mineral Road. The scrimmage was played during a steady drizzle with a couple of dozen onlookers. This workout was one of the final tune ups for the team before it heads to Harrisonburg, Virginia to face the Madison Dukes tomorrow in the first game of the 1976 season.

The Dukes have 37 lettermen back including the entire defensive line and backfield except for their quarterback. The game will be played on Astro Turf in a stadium which will seat 10,000 and you can bet that Madison will be anxious to avenge the only blemish on their record last year. After tying Glenville in the first game of the season, they went on to an undefeated season and a conference championship.

Our Glenville team will counter with 10 lettermen returning from the defensive squad and 7 from the offensive, plus a new offensive set that should put more excitement into the Pioneer attack. This will be Glenville's first game on a synthetic turf since the NAIA championship game played at Fairfield stadium in 1973. You can be sure that Coach Adolfson and his squad will go to Harrisonburg with the idea of bringing victory number one back to the GSC campus.

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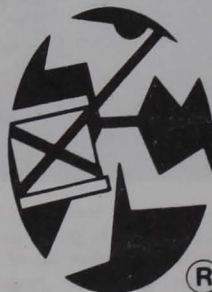


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
