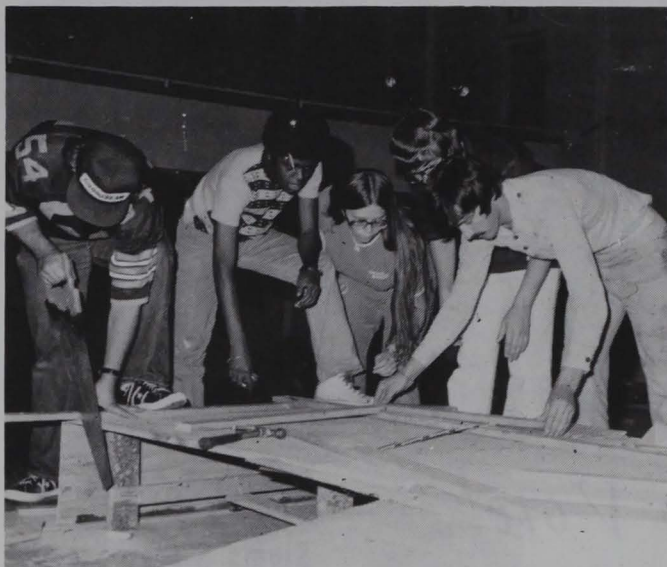
53 Units Collected

Committee Searches

The search for a successor to Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, president of Glenville State College, will begin this week, Dr. Ben L. Morton, Chancellor of the Board of Regents, announced today.

The West Virginia Board of Regents recently authorized formation of the committee. The group is to recommend to the Board three to five candidates to succeed Dr. Wilburn who is scheduled to retire June 30, 1977.

Dr. Morton was designated by the Board to serve as executive director of the search and screening process. He said policy regarding personnel precludes the committee and its members from revealing names of candidates or the status of individuals under consideration for the Glenville presidency. Public announcements will be channeled through the committee chairman in concert with the Chancellor's office in Charleston. The chairman is to be selected during the organizational meeting.

The committee is comprised of eight persons from the college fac-

ulty- administration organization, three students, one member of the college's support staff and five members of the alumni association.

Forestry Students Involved In Study

On September 23 and 24, fifty nine forestry students went on a field trip to study vegetation that is not found in this area.

These students are enrolled in Forest Technology 108 (Dendrology) and Biology 252 (Botany Lab). They were led by Dr. Edwin Gratton, Dr. Robert Deal, Mark Hornish, Michael Bondi, Mary Ross, and Darrell Dean Jr., all of the Forestry and Biology Departments of GSC.

On Thursday the group traveled to Hills Creek Falls, ten miles east of Richwood. This is the highest waterfall in West Virginia. From there they traveled to Cranberry Glades to study the bog vegetation. They journeyed on to Roth Kugel Plantation, near Thornwood, to study the old Norway spruce and larch in West Virginia. The night was spent at the Science Youth Camp in Thornwood.

Friday the group rented Cass Scenic Railroad and rode it to the top of Bald Knob. On the way down they stopped three times for a vegetative study of the high elevation plants. During these stops they divided into groups to hike around the area and identify various plants.

WGSC Schedules Oct. Broadcasting

WGSC Radio will go on the air for the semester on Monday, October 4, 1976, sometime in the afternoon, according to Station Manager Janet Griffin. "We have had many problems getting started this semester the main one being that Governor Moore has neglected to take action on our Intercollegiate Broadcasting System dues, preventing us from going on the air until we looked into the situation. We are happy that things are straightened out and we are now looking forward to our first day of broadcasting," Griffin stated.

Last year the average number of employees at WGSC was fifteen. So far this year a total of thirty students have applied for work. There are three paid staff members, but mainly the station is run by volunteer workers.

Many changes in the format will take place this year. The staff is striving for a more sophisticated sound as college radio on a more intellectual level should have. "Upperclassmen at GSC probably won't recognize this year's format compared to the last several years," commented Format Coordinator Bryan Deever as he explained the new format for WGSC. "We're effecting a radical change here at the station this year especially with our format. We would be foolish to try to compete with the higher wattage Top 40/Disco programming of the local stations so we're delineating those particular singles that constitute that market and aiming our programming here in a different direction. We'll feature some Top 40 groups with other cuts from their albums which you as a listener would never hear on commercial stations as well as a lot of music that is decent but never makes a big splash on the market because of bad management or a lousy p.r. Of course we'll also program a wide selection of music from groups like Return To Forever, PFM, Genesis, Passport, Gentle Giant plus the solo albums cut by the outstanding musicians of all these and other groups. We'll give a big slot to the more "laid back" music from Pure Prairie League, Jackson Browne, John Prine, Gordon Lightfoot, Eagles, Loggins and Messina, Melissa Manchester, Seals and Crofts, the Doobies, Chicago and many other bands and

Class Excursion Explores Forest

On Wednesday, September 29, the Applied Silviculture Class, under the supervision of Charles R. Sybolt, took a trip to Coopers Rock State Forest in Monongalia County. They toured the forest, guided by Dr. Kenneth Carvell, a professor of the Division of Forestry at West Virginia University.

At the state forest they inspected an area where about twenty years of harvesting has taken place. At this site they inspected timber improvement practices and regeneration following the cutting and harvesting. Methods used at this forest consists of clearcutting, selection, thinning, and pruning trees, and planting new ones.

Pioneers

Pounded

Our Glenville State Pioneers were pounded last Saturday night by an obviously stronger and more talented Salem team 35-3 at Catalano Stadium in Salem. Approximately 3,000 football lovers watched as Salem used a strong defense, quick running backs, and penalties to completely thwart the G-Men.

The Pioneers took the opening kick off and marched steadily down the field, mostly on the arm of Tom Cowen and hands of Terry Harvey. But the drive bogged down and a field goal by Kirk Kresowaty fell short and the writing seemed to be on the wall. After an exchange of punts, Salem scored on only two plays from their own two-yard line. Larry Riley took the honors by running the last 78 yards while breaking away from several would-be tackles. After this, Glenville could not get its offense untracked and had to settle for a fine 44-yard field goal by Kresowaty in the first quarter for its only tally of the game. Not only did the Pioneers not score in the last three quarters, they rarely threatened. Lee Hodges, who went into the game leading the conference in yards gained, could pick up only 58 yards in 19 carries. Besides this, three Glenville players were held to negative yardage. It seemed that every time we

did gain good yardage we would be penalized fifteen yards for uncalled for infractions of the rules. In fact, it seemed that the contest was no more than a three month late celebration of Flag Day as there seemed to be more penalty markers dropped than Salem running breaks.

From what I have seen or heard so far, Salem has got the best team in the conference. They are hard hitting on defense and strong on offense. They have two fine running backs in Larry Riley and Rick Anderson, and a big quarterback who can both run and throw. On the bright side for Glenville, turnovers were cut down immensely. We had only one, and that came in the form of an interception after the game was already decided. There were no serious injuries that will keep anyone out of action for an extended period of time so maybe Glenville came out of the game a little more mature and healthy for Fairmont.
