It Pays 'tho It Costs

Everyday life seems to be getting more complex. Everytime we turn around there is another appointment to keep, a paper to write, or another book to read. But far worse than these required tasks are the endless piles of forms and paper work that we must correctly execute. One such requirement for the majority of GSC students is the National Teacher Exam (NTE).

Facing the prospect of paying an astronomical \$22.00 for what I considered to be a bureaucratic formality, I decided to find out exactly why and for whom I was taking this marathon-of-a-fact test.

When one wants to find out an answer to a specific question in an even more specific area, one should go right to the person who has the most authority in that field or he runs the risk of getting the authoritative "run around." Therefore, I went to Dr. Adkins. Through my interview with Dr. Adkins, I discovered that this was one instance that my ignorance of the information had caused me undue aggravation.

In the past the NTE was used by employers as a cut off mark for prospective teachers. Now the results of these tests are less important to the individual, but as the job market for new teachers tightens, a good score may make the difference. A low score on the test might mean a little embarrassment for the individual, but it would mean far more in its reflection of the institution which conferred the degree on the individual.

GSC uses the NTE for self-assessment of its instructional programs. In other words, if enough people do poorly on the exam, it is an indication that the professors have not done their jobs. The scores are also compared to National averages and are used to see how well GSC stands in relation to other colleges. If GSC students as a group would achieve a high score it would increase the National standing, and in turn it would increase the value of our degree.

The National Teacher Exam is one example of a formality which serves a purpose. We could all learn so much more if when something doesn't make sense, we would just ask. Since the majority of you will at one time or another have to take the NTE, please do your best. It will benefit us all.

The Brothers also held a community project Saturday morning and washed windows on Main Street.

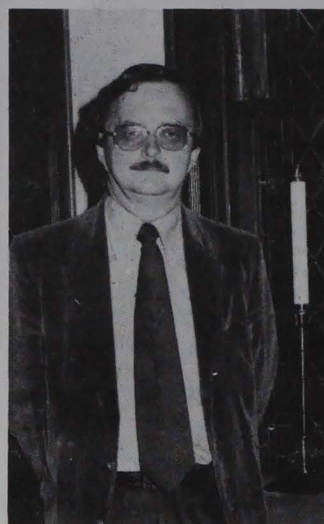
TKE

French Film On Agenda

"Charming, exciting, lively, and spicy"—"Will rank among the great lyric achievements of the screen." These words of praise are typical of viewers' reactions to the next film in the Cultural Affairs Committee series.

"Jules and Jim" is perhaps the finest film of the great French director Francois Truffaut. The fourth in this fall series of foreign films, it will be shown in the Auditorium Wednesday, October 13, at 6:00 p.m.

It depicts a twenty-year relationship that begins in 1912, when Jules, a German (Oskar Werner), and Jim, a Frenchman (Henri Serre), find themselves in love with the vibrant, capricious Catherine (Jeanne Moreau).

Her marriage to Jules is not a success, and neither is her subsequent relationship with Jim. But as critic Pauline Kael has stated, "when Jules and Jim are with Catherine they feel alive. Anything may happen—she's the catalyst, the trouble-maker, the source of joy. She is the enchantress who makes art out of life."

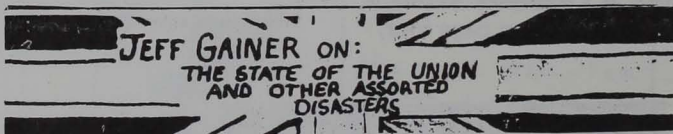
Catherine is a free spirit whose domination of the two men eventually leads to tragedy, a catastrophe that she herself devises.

Filmed in black and white (with English subtitles for American audiences), this 1961 movie achieves poetic cinematic effects. Glenville viewers who have seen "The Loneliness of the Long Distance Runner" and "The Seventh Seal" will be interested in comparing film techniques.

Dr. Christopher Orr, chairman of the Cultural Affairs Committee, and Instructor John Collins have been in charge of the series, which will include three more films: "Blow Up," October 20; "The Producers," November 17; and "La Strada," December 8.

The remaining films will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Dress rehearsals for the College play necessitated the change in time for "Jules and Jim" which will be shown at 6:00 p.m.

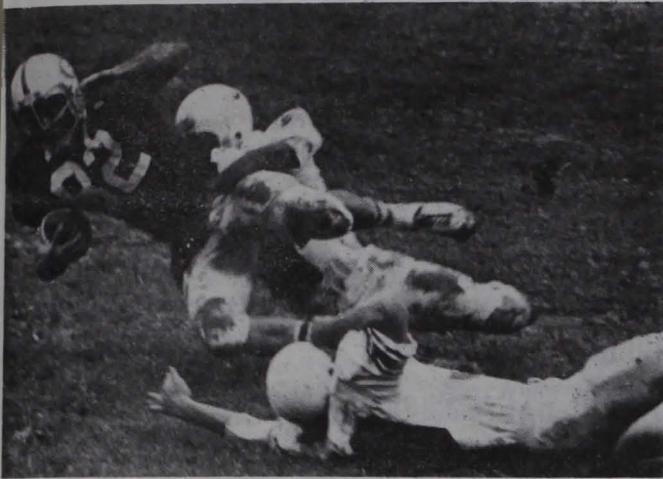
All students will be admitted free with I.D. cards, and faculty will pay \$1.00 admission.

G-Men Defeat Fairmont 7-6

The Glenville State Pioneers stopped a Fairmont two point conversion in the last minute of play last Saturday to come away with a 7-6 verdict at muddy Rohrbough Stadium. The game was marked by solid defenses and bad footing by both teams.

The game was deadlocked the whole afternoon at 0-0 (It reminded me of the Madison game of last year) until Lee Hodges capped off a 65 yard drive late in the fourth quarter with a 12 yard spurt up the middle for a touchdown. After Kurt Kresowaty kicked the extra point our Pioneers had an apparently safe 7-0 lead with only three minutes left in the game. But Fairmont was not finished as they connected on a 45 yard pass play on the first play from scrimmage; after our touchdown to put them in excellent field position at our 30 yard line. Glenville's defense then tightened up but the Falcons finally scored on a third down pass of 21 yards. Fairmont then elected to go for the win instead of the tie, but the pitchout was fumbled and the runner was sacked in the backfield, allowing Glenville to run out the clock and preserve the win.

The fact that the Pioneers missed the services of linebacker Rick Reidl while he was out the last two weekends with a knee injury was sorely evident Saturday. Reidl was all over the field making jarring stops (7 tackles and 6 assists for the day) to spark the violent Pioneer defense. On offense, Leandis Hodges picked up 102 yards in 23 carries including a 12 yard TD gallop. Hodges is now averaging 5.7 yards a carry. Defeating Fairmont last Saturday meant continuing our mastery over the Falcons as we have now beaten them 3 out of the last 4 years. Now if we could just do that in basketball...

The Bobcats come into this game with a 1-4 record after getting their first victory of the season last week with a 23-0 shellacking of W.Va. Tech at Buckhannon. We defeated Tech 23-8 for our first win of the season.

In past years Glenville fans may have thought of Wesleyan as a soft touch, but not so anymore. This is evidenced by the upset they handed us at our Homecoming last year in

overtime, 21-15. This weekend is the Bobcats' Homecoming and I think it would be nice if we could return the favor to them. Wesleyan's poor 1-4 record could be deceiving since they have already played Shepherd and Concord, two tough opponents, and must face Salem at Salem next week.

Golfers Place Third in Match

The Glenville linksters have played two golf matches within the last week and a half and so far are playing up to all expectations.

They traveled to Canaan Valley last Wednesday (Sept. 29) and competed in a five team match, finishing third. The only disappointing thing about this was that they failed to defeat any of the (out-of-state) teams entered in the contest. Madison, Va. won the tournament with a team score of 378. California, Pa. had a 384, and we followed with 386. Davis & Elkins and W.Va. Wesleyan finished fourth and fifth respectively. Greg Delprince, a freshman from Ohio, led the pioneers with an 18 hole score of 75. He was followed by

Terry Crislip with 76, Jim Brady, 77, Rick Simmons and Jimmy Scott both shot 79 and Bill Hess, another freshman, finished with 81.

This past Monday (Oct. 4) Glenville journeyed to California, Pa. to play in a 15 team tournament at the Nemacolin Country Club, sponsored by California State College of Pennsylvania. Here they tied for second with California at 384. Indiana, Pa. won the match with a team total of 378. Delprince once again led the way for the Pioneers by shooting a 74. He was followed by Crislip, Brady, and Simmons all with 77. Jimmy Scott finished the scoring with a 79. The golfers' next match is next Monday at Martinsburg with Shepherd being the host.

Pioneers-Not Ours-Win In Marietta-GS Battle

The girls' volleyball team traveled to Marietta for a 3 o'clock game with Marietta College Wednesday at the college gymnasium. The Pioneerettes are led this year by co-captains Shirley Murphy and Kim West, two returnees from last year's team.

Marietta won the best two out of three match by winning the first game 15-9 and the second game 15-13. The Glenville girls were in both games until the last point but could not come up with a win of any games.

Justice Neely Speaks At GSC

Justice Richard Neely spoke in the Little Theatre October 6 at 7:30. His lecture, "Constitutional Law and Its Role in Political Courts," concerned the appellate courts set up by the federal government for a rapid method whereby the common citizen can seek a needed change, as in the Brown Vs. the Board of Education case, the landmark Supreme Court Decision that ended segregation in the schools. For example, had this problem been given Congress, it would have probably been killed by the Southern senators. Therefore, it is necessary to provide a means of review of laws to judge their constitutionality that is more rapid and

direct than the legislative route.

Dr. Joe Darnall arranged Justice Neely's lecture for the Political Science Department. Justice Neely was elected in 1972, and according to the Associated press, and is the youngest appellate judge in the English speaking world. At 34, he has served as a captain in the Army and served in Vietnam. He graduated from Yale Law School in 1964 and was elected to the West Virginia House Of Delegates in 1970. His election as Justice in 1972 will be a full twelve year term, ending in 1984.

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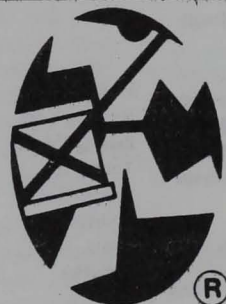
