The Choir of Glenville State College will leave for its annual fall tour on Wednesday, November 17. This year's tour includes ten concert programs.

Travelling in a chartered bus, the Choir will visit schools and churches in nine West Virginia counties: Doddridge, Ritchie, Pleasants, Tyler, Harrison, Marion, Wetzel, Marshall, and Hancock. A program in two schools is planned for each day. The evening programs will be sung in churches in St. Marys, Mannington, and Weirton. Those churches will serve supper and provide housing for the member of the choir.

On Saturday, November, 20, the choir will travel to Columbus, Ohio, to sing in Epworth Church on Sunday. The church will serve lunch before the trip back to Glenville and home on Sunday afternoon, November 21.

In closing, the time I have spent at Glenville has been most fruitful. Most importantly though, I have recieved quite an education. The only advice I would attempt to give anyone is that GSC has more to offer than most ever realize. It's the responsibility of the individual to selectively choose the activities which help him to grow and mature optimally.

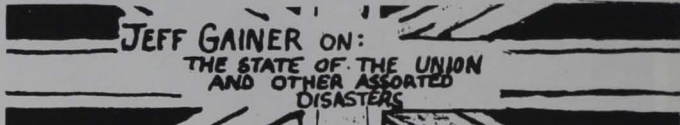

Pioneers Lose Finale

The Pioneers lost their season finale in a heartbreaking way when they were defeated in Athens last week by the Concord Mt. Lions, 24-21. The contest ended a disappointing season for the young Pioneers who finished with a 3-7 record.

The G-Men, who were not given much of a chance of winning the game fought the Mt. Lions down to the wire in showing their best performance in a loss this year. They played Concord even and have no reason to be ashamed of the performance they gave.

Rocky Graves, a reserve kicker who was forced into action when Kurt Kresowaty quit the squad earlier this year, kept the Pioneers in the first half with two field goals, the second one being a booming 47 yarder. The two teams went into the dressing room at halftime all knotted up at 6 a piece.

The second half turned into an offensive battle with Concord scoring two touchdowns and a field goal and Glenville tallying two T.D.s. The Pioneers' first touchdown came when Lee Hodges broke an 80 yard

run through and past the Mt. Lions defenders to bring the G-Men back within 3 points in the last minutes of the third quarter, 16-13. But Concord came back to score midway in the fourth quarter to take a 24-13 lead that stood until about two minutes were left in the game. At this point Mike Reed went in from the one to cap a sustained drive that helped bring us back to within three points (after Tom Phillips ran for a 2 point conversion) at 24-21. Graves then attempted an onside kick that was unsuccessful and Concord was able to run the clock out.

Junior Leandis Hodges helped to end the season on a promising note as he romped for 233 yards on 34 carries. This will put him in a close race for the conference rushing title with a season total of 1351 yards. He and Larry Riley of Salem gave neck and neck and the winner will be determined when they decide how many yards Riley rushed for last Saturday • (I've heard about three different totals and it seems to me that Lee might be getting rooked!) Dave Harsh once again led the defense with 7 individual tackles and 9 assists.

Glenville improved slightly on last year's record of 2-6-1 with their 3-7 ledger this year. Now the coaches must go out and start building for next year in hopes that they can get the football program here back on solid ground.

Final Ind. Statistics

Final team statistics are now in for this year and they show some revealing facts. The Pioneers were outdone in almost every aspect of the game by their ten opponents. We were outscored by out opponents 253 to 111. Total yardage went to our opponents by a 3567 to 3345 margin. Opponents got 156 first downs compared to our 121. We were assessed with more penalty yardage, 776 to 599. We were outpassed by our opponents who had a .442 completion percentage compared to our .434. We were also intercepted more than our opponents (20-15). Our opponents' punts averaged 35.5 yards compared to our 32 yards, and the punt return average was also higher for the opponent.

The G-Men did outdo their counterparts in two departments of the game. We averaged 17.5 yards a kick off return compared to our opponents' 14. We also lost fewer fumbles than our opponent by a figure of 19 to 18.

Lilly's Cagers To Scrimmage

The 1976-77 Glenville State College basketball team will get its first taste of outside competition when they participate in a scrimmage against the Alumni Saturday night at 7:30 in the college gymnasium. The squad has been practicing hard in anticipation of the upcoming season and this outing will help them to break the monotony of everyday drills and will give them some playing experience under game conditions. The Alumni scrimmage will also help Coach Lilly and Coach Carney to prepare their boys for the Shrine tournament that takes place in Weston next week.

The Alumni roster will be full of names of players that you have read about in past years, but have never had an opportunity to see play. Among these will be Steve Datcher, Earl Hawkins and Jackie Robinson. Tomorrow night's scrimmage will also be your only chance to see St. Francis transfers Ralph Ledbedder and Corey Gadson play before they become eligible second semester.

Admission is free, so come up and see this annual event that has become almost as important on this campus as education itself.

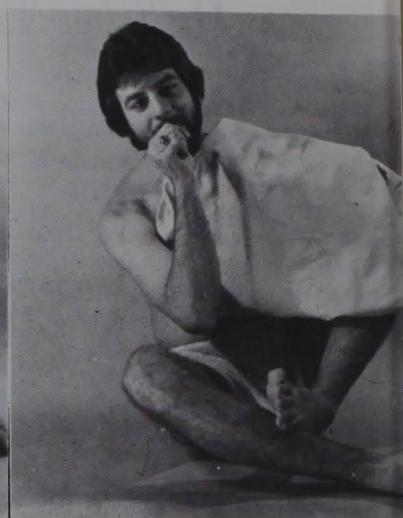

Mr. Curl had to say. They talked with him afterward and later brought him onto the campus as a consultant. While here he went over lighting and heating in all the buildings on campus.

The suggestions he gave that we were able to carry out were put into effect last year. These were cutting down the size of light bulbs and reducing candlepower in classrooms. This was done all over campus-in the dorms, Pioneer Center, and in all classrooms.

These will be changing the water heating systems and also cutting back the amount of hot water used with a different type of shower head. These are being ordered at this time.

There is also an effort being made at controlling the temperature in classrooms and offices. The temperature will be maintained to between 68 and 70 degrees. In early October there was a meeting of all custodians and maintenance crews. At this meeting it was decided to have one person in charge of maintaining the level of heat in
