Summer job opportunities with the federal government are also available. Different jobs with different departments within the Federal government are open and the information about each department is contained in a pamphlet in the Placement Office.

They also have two magazines, Equal Opportunity for minority students and the Collegiate Woman's Career.

A recruiter from the West Virginia Civil Service will be on campus and available for interviews on November 30, from 9:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Anyone interested in a pamphlet on the Civil Service test can get one in the Placement Office. They are free and give general information on the test.

ginning the fall semester. Another change that can be noted is a oneweek fall vacation which covers the week of Thanksgiving. In Appalachia, Thanksgiving is traditionally a time of close family relationships. A oneweek vacation at this time seems appropriate. Between first and second semesters there is approximately a three-week period of time. The College Administration is taking all possible steps to conserve energy and cut utility costs. During the time between semesters, energy comsumptions will be held to an absolute minimum. In past years, and in the current

year, there were two breaks in the Spring Semester: Easter vacation and and spring vacation. In the next two years there will be one vacation which will occur during the Easter holiday. One long vacation seems appropriate instead of having two short vacations. This will preserve continuity in the semester.

Commencement will occur one week later in 1978 than in 1977. Summer school 1978 will begin on June 12 and end on August 11, 1978. There will be two weeks between the end of summer school and the beginning of fall semester. As stated previously, an attempt has been made to establish a reasonable balance between work and vacation.

Glenville State College will unveil its 1976-77 basketball team tonight when it participates in the 19th annual Shrine Tournament at Weston. Glenville will face Alderson-Broaddus in the second game of the tournament at 9 p.m. Salem will face W. Va. Weslyan in the first game at 7 p.m. The Pioneers have had much success in this tournament since it was founded in 1958. They have finished either first or second more times than not. They have finished fourth only once in the tourney's 18 year history. This year should be no different as the Pioneers should go into the tourney as one of the favorites. The G-Men finished third last year after losing to A-B in the first round but coming back to defeat Salem in the consolation game.

Coaches Lilly and Carney will take seven letterment into this campaign after losing only two seniors (Randy Hess and Randy Datcher) off of last year's squad that finished with a 12-16 record. The returning cagers are:

Greg Arnette, a junior and 2 year letterman from Charlottesville. Va., who averaged 9.1 points and

3.7 rebounds a game last year. Tom Coates, senior guard from Pittsburgh, Pa., who has lettered once while at Glenville. He carried a 16.8 scoring average while pulling down 7.6 rebounds a game. He also led the team in assists with 79. Robert Hawkins is a senior for-

ward from Brandywine, Md. He has earned 2 letters as a cager, and last year averaged 5.8 points a game while serving as co-captain for the Pioneers.

Nitro, who averaged 1 point a game

from Gassaway managed to letter as a freshman while averaging 3.1

Calvin Page, a sophomore guard hailing from Upperville, Va., averaged 2.3 points while nursing a bad ankle for most of the season.

Charles "Stretch" Warner, also from Upperville, Va., won a letter his freshman year while averaging 10.3 markers.

Roger Dingy, a junior forward from New Haven is a one year letterman who averaged 13.1 points a

Thomas, who played his high school ball in Maryland and Ernest Gilliard from Princeton High School.

The winners of tonight's games will play tomorrow night at 9:00 for the championship with the losers meeting at 7:00 in the consolation game. Tickets for both rounds may be purchased at the door.
