Student Grievance Policy, Procedure Reviewed

In accordance with section 86.8 (6), Title 45, Subtitle A, Part 86, of the Code of Federal Regulations, Glenville State College gives notice of the procedure for students bringing sex discrimination grievance under Title IX, Education Amendments of 1972.

I. Student grievance in relation to student programs and services is to be directed to The Committee on Student Life and Welfare. The procedure is as follows:

1) Any student who believes that he has been treated unfairly by sex discrimination in student programs and services may ask for a hearing before The Committee on Student Life and Welfare by contacting the Dean of Student Affairs.

2) The decision of The Committee on Student Life and Welfare may be appealed to The President of the College. Such appeal must be in writing, setting forth the areas of disagreement with the committee and must be filed with The President within five (5) days of the decision of the committee.

3) The decision of The President of the College may be appealed to the Chancellor and the West Virginia Board of Regents.

II. Student grievance in relation to the instructional program is to be directed to the Academic Affairs Committee. Refer to the Dean of Academic Affairs.

The procedure is as follows:

1) Any student who believes he has received unfair treatment based on sex discrimination in his instructional program may ask for a hearing before The Academic Affairs Committee by contacting The Dean of Academic Affairs.

2) The decision of The Academic Affairs Committee may be appealed to The President of the College. Such appeal must be in writing, setting forth the areas of disagreement with the committee and must be filed with The President within five (5) days of the decision of the committee.

3) The decision of The President of the College may be appealed to the Chancellor and the West Virginia Board of Regents.

Women's Cage Team Named



Returning lettermen from last year's team includes: Patsy Groves, a sophomore from Summersville; Janet James, a sophomore from



Coach Lilly started his twelfth regular season as head basketball coach at GSC last night when he led his troops into the season opener against W. Va. State at Institute. Both teams came into the contest with two game experience which they received in preseason tournament. Glenville (1-1) went into the affair after splitting in the Shrine Tournament while State is 0-2 after finding the sledding rough in an out of state tournament.

Despite the 0-2 record, W. Va. State is always a tough opener for our ball team. We have not defeated them in the last three years. (That's six straight losses!) and playing

at Institute has never been a treat.

The gymnasium has appropriately been tagged "The Pit" because of the gladiating feeling one gets while performing. A visiting team winning there is almost about as rare as Tampa Bay winning a football game.

Lilly, who has a lifetime record of 179-124 while at GSC, will send a seasoned team into this season with hopes of improving on last year's record of 12-16, and accomplishing a lot more.

Next week the G-men travel to Charleston for a game with Morris Harvey on Thursday night. Next Saturday the Pioneers open their home season against powerful Fairmont.

Glenville Shines In Tourney

The Glenville Pioneer basketball team fared very well in the 19th annual Shrine Tournament held in Weston on November 19 and 20 as they beat Alderson-Broadus 97-89 but lost to W.Va. Wesleyan in the championship game by a score 91-87.

Glenville dominated the Friday night victory over Alderson-Broadus as they led the whole game. Tom Coates led the way for the Pioneers with a dazzling shooting performance of 13-19 from the field and a total of 28 points for the night. He also led the team with 14 rebounds. Wayne Washington, Robert Hawkins, and Charles Warner were also in

double figures with 19, 13, and 10 points respectively. Mike Chatman led the Battlers from A-B with 28 points, but Dave Gandee ended up being the crowd pleaser as he seemed to hesitate to shoot from anywhere inside of 25 feet. He ended up with 12 points and all of them were of the long range variety. While the G-Men were defeating Alderson-Broadus, W.Va. Wesleyan completely thwarted Salem to set up the pairings for Saturday night's championship game.

In the championship game the Pioneers jumped out to an early lead but were unable to hold onto it as the bigger Bobcats from Wesleyan outbattled us on the offensive boards.

The G-Men trailed by 5 at half-time and trailed by as much as 12 in the second half but came back to cut the lead to one point and finally tied it, but could never get the lead. The game was finally decided in the last 30 seconds on Wesleyan foul shots and Glenville had to

settle for second in the tournament.

Glenville was not able to keep up the horrid shooting pace which they set Friday night with a .568 shooting percentage. Saturday night they could manage only a .434 percentage. 
