Congress Election To Up Student Fees

A quorum was established at the special Student Congress meeting held Wednesday, Jan. 26. At this meeting the congress voted to bring the issue of raising the activity fee before the student body. The Student Congress has proposed the referendum, but only the student body can determine whether it passes or fails. The activity fee is paid by all full time students. If passed, the total increase would be \$7.00 per semester, which is broken down into: a \$2.00 per semester increase for the yearbook, and, a \$5.00 per semester increase in the atheletic fee.

The ballot will be set up in the following manner: Issue A: Do you favor the continuation of the yearbook with a \$2.00 increase in fees per semester?

A No vote means the yearbook will be discontinued. Issue B: Are you in favor of raising the athletic fee \$5.00 per semester?

Halftime Talk

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following comments are exerpts from an article written by Jim Riffle, Sports Information Director at Glenville State College concerning the recent success of the Pioneer basketball team.

People in West Virginia and especially people in Salem, Fairmont, Wheeling, Philippi, Institute and Bluefield are curious. People in Beckley, Buckhannon, Charleston, Elkins, Montgomery, and Shepherdstown are talking. But the people in Glenville are shouting. The reason for all of these emotions, well, it has to be the surging Glenville State College Pioneer basketball team

Since the beginning of the second semester, the Glenville State team has not lost a game in 7 starts and those 7 wins include an 84-82 overtime win against Morris Harvey in Glenville; a 76-73 win over Davis and Elkins in Elkins: a 63-58 win over West Virginia Tech at Glenville, an 89-88 win over Concord at Glenville; an 88-55 win over Beckley at Glenville; a 92-73 win over Shepherd at Glenville; and an 86-80 win over West Virginia Wesleyan in Buckhannon.

What could cause such an abrupt about-face? For the Glenville State College basketball team, many things can be cited. Probably the most important ingredient is a 6'6", 210 pound center named Ralph Ledbetter. A transfer student from St. Francis College in Pennsylvania, Ledbetter has been outstanding for the Pioneers.

Ledbetter has scored 144 points averaged 20.6 points per game for the seven games he has played with a field goal percentage of 55.3. He has gathered in 66 rebounds for an average of 9.4 rebounds per game. Ralph has also recorded 23 assists in 7 games.

BY DOUG MARTIN Ledbetter has added a new

dimension of leadership to the Glenville State team. He is respected by his teammates and opposing players and coaches. His presence and importance is immediatly noted in a game. Ralph's brother, Kenny, was a basketball player at Glenville State and graduated in 1972.

The other members of the team are playing different roles since Ledbetter became eligible. Tom Coates, a senior co-captain and leading scorer has become more valuable to the team because he does not have the same responsibilities of scoring and rebounding as he once did. Coates has more lee-way for ball-handling and getting free for shots rebounding with the addition of Ledbetter. Coach Gary Hess of West Virginia Wesleyan commented after the Glenville win over the Bohcats that his team might have won despite the play of Ledbetter if it had not been for some determined play by Coates.

The players are aware that each game must be played at full speed and each is as important as the next. They will not be able to by-pass one opponent to get to a contending team. Every win is important and Coaches Jesse Lilly and Tim Carney are preparing for the Salem game on The Coaches have January 27. reminded the team of the 82-63 win Salem gained over the Pioneers on December 13.

The Pioneers keep plugging right along with win after win as they continue to put down opponents as easily as Rockefeller defeated Underwood. The G-Men were at it again last weekend playing two games and coming away with two victories, one at home and one on the road. Friday night the Pioneers hosted

the Shepherd Rams who turned out to be an easy victim. The passive Rams could not seem to muster much of an attack without their leading scorer, Rod Sewell, who is out with an injury. Glenville never trailed in winning their sixth game of the season, to put their record at 7-7, winning 92-73. The Pioneers held a 14-6 lead at the twelve minute mark as both teams struggled with cold shooting hands. Glenville opened up to a 10 point lead at the 10 minute mark, but Shepherd using

a sticky man-to-man defense cut the lead to four with just over 5 minutes to go in the half. But this proved to be as close as they could get as the Pioneers took a nine point lead into the dressing room at halftime.

Glenville continued to steadily increase their lead throughout the second half. Wayne Washington hit 5 straight points to put us up by 12 at 55-43, and our lead was never less than 10 after that. We got our first 20 point lead with 4:40 to go in the game at 77-57. Coach Lilly substituted freely with everyone seeing action. Gary Nottingham hit a 15 foot jumper at the buzzer to give the Pioneers their final margin of victory, 92-73.

The game was closer than it may seem by the score. Shepherd outrebounded and outgoaled our G-Men but the Pioneers won it at the foul stripe where they shot 30-35 compared eight point lead and put the game to the Rams mediocre 9 of 16. Washington led the Glenville scoring

with 27 points, while Ralph Ledbetter added 20, Tom Coates 14, and Charles Warner 10. Ledbetter led in rebounding with 14. Gilbert Allen was high in the scoring depart- their improvement in conference ment for the Rams with 22. Last Saturday night the Pioneers

But the "Cats" weren't finished as they threw a full court press on the Pioneers that enabled them to cut the lead to 4 points in less than four minutes. (76-72) But the Pioneers were able to hit two quick buckets to build an on ice. The final margin came on a

86-80.

Ledbetter led our scoring with a season high of 27 points. The Pioneers managed to put four other people in double figures. Wayne Washington tallied 18, Warner 15, Tom Coates 14, and Joe Knicely 10. Thomas and Bates both popped in 19 for Wesleyan.

The Pioneers' record now stands at 7-4 in the conference and 8-7 overall not counting last nights' game with Salem.
