Heart Fund Nets \$1,620

Gilmer County Heart Association has collected \$1620.30 toward its goal of \$2100 this year. House to house solicitation, business contributions, and special events have not been completed to date, according to Mrs. Garnett Taylor, County Chairman.

A breakdown of monies collected thus far includes: house-to-house, \$1016.90; envelopes recieved, \$84; business, \$274; special events, \$55.40; organizations, \$5; and memorial gifts,

Dr. Darnall has received application blanks for the Fall Semester 1977 Public - Service Internship. The program will continue for a period of sixteen weeks or one semester. All interns will receive 15 hours of college credit upon satisfactory completion of the internship and a weekly salary. The program is open to full - time juniors and seniors.

Spelunking Course May Be Expanded

According to GSC instructor Mr. Jim Meads, the interest in the cave biology field course has been fantastic and additional courses may be planned in the future. The first spelunking field trip will be conducted on Saturday, March 26. The purpose of this trip will be to acquaint the students with the commercial aspects of West Virginia caverns.

Smokehole Caverns, located in Grant County will be toured Saturday morning. This is an active cavern and will allow the students the opportunity of observing a variety of cave formations. The Main Room, with its abundance of beautiful stalactites, is worthy of the title - "The Room of a Million Stalactites." Smokehole Caverns was opened for commercial purposes on May 30, 1940.

Two additional caverns will be explored. Seneca Caverns, developed for commercial use in 1930, is located in Pendleton County and will be the first cavern that will be visited during the afternoon session.

The third cave that will be explored is the Stratosphere Balloon Cave which is named for the large ribbed flowstone mound that extends twenty - five feet to the ceiling. This will be a unique experience for the student since this cavern was formerly commercialized. This cavern is located 200 yards from Seneca Caverns and is one of the oldest known caves in West Virginia. Bishop Francis Asbury described it in his journal for July 21, 1781. While the formations in the Stratosphere Balloon cave are well worth the visit, of equal interest is the fungus action on the old wooden stairs and walk. Large sheets of white slime fungus hang from the railings

Additional spelunking trips are planned throughout the term. The Sinks of Gandy, Carter and Cascade Caverns in Kentucky, and selected Pendleton County caves will be ex-

National Nutrition Week Celebrated March 6-12

"Nutrition: Foodway to Fun and Fitness" will be emphasized during the fifth annual National Nutrition Week, March 6 - 12, 1977, sponsored by the American Dietetic Association.

Maintaining nutritious eating haits and keeping active enhance a body's health and state of mind. Practicing both can actually be fun!

Nutrition need not be monotony. Persons can vary their daily food intake because of the many components which make up a balanced daily diet. In this diet, meals and snacks should be built upon milk and dairy products, meat and fish, fruits and vegetables, and enriched or whole-grain breads and cereals.

Exercise need not be limited to calisthenics. Walking, bicycling, and swimming are some pleasant and effective ways to burn up calories and shape up bodies.

Conveying this National Nutrition Week message to the nation is jointly undertaken by ADA and its state and local affiliates. The approximate 31, 250 dietitians who are ADA members work in hospitals, universities, industry, and federal, and local health agencies.

"Nutrition: Foodway to Fun and Fitness" will adorn many of these facilities in March.

Although National Nutrition Week spans 7 days, the practice of eating properly and exercising regularly should apply for lifetimes. As Clara Zempel, R.D., A.D.A. Executive Director, points out: "Our nation emphasizes the necessity of good nutrition for the health of its people. Members of the American Dietetic Association and allied associates are urged to continue to stress that each person of every age pursue a balanced diet and moderate exercise for optimal strength and vitality.

The 1977 version of GSC basehall will take its southern trip next week while everyone else is enjoying a needed Spring Break. It will be all business for the baseball team as they try to make a better mark for themselves than they did last year, when they not only lost all seven games while down south, but were heaten handily in each one of them. The baseballers start their journey with a game at Erskine College in South Carolina. They will then go on to play a game each day except Wednesday, finishing against Madison College of Virginia next Saturday.

The baseball team suffered through - 24 season last year, but have the earmarks of bettering that record this year. Coach Belcastro didn't get to recruit last year, having to depend on walk - ons to carry much of the load. But this year is dif-

ferent with 10 freshmen recruits and walk - ons to go along with 6 lettermen and various upperclassmen walk-

The 6 lettermen returning on this year's squad are Captain Tim Shepherd, a senior first baseman; Scott Anderson, a senior outfielder; Tom Mathias, a senior outfielder; Roy Alltop, a junior pitcher; Ralph Smith, a junior pitcher; and Dale Stover, a sophomore second baseman. There are also two junior college transfers on this year's team who lettered last year at their respective schools: Bill Chichester (third baseman) and Tom Shreve (pitcher).

There are nine players missing from last year's team. Three seniors graduated last year (Buddy Jarrell, Terry Baker, and Rick Vass), and 6 other players did not return for

This year's team is shaping as one

with more depth and stability. Coach Belcastro has six front line pitchers, who he feels can start on any given day. There is also a big battle going on for the catching position where freshmen Pat Beebe and Joedy Moots have both shown the ability to get the job done. Infield positions seem pretty well set with Tim Shepherd playing first, Dale Stover at second, either Fred Smith or Randy Newlon at short and Bill Chichester at third. Outfield positions may be juggled around a bit, but look for Scott Anderson, Gary Nottingham, Tom Mathias, Tom Keene, and Moochie Bennett to share most of that load.

After returning from the southern trip next week the Pioneers open their regular season at home with a single game against Point Park next Tuesday and a double header against Morris Harvey next Saturday. Game time for these games is 1:00 p.m.

Pioneerettes End Successful Season

The women's basketball team finished a highly successful season last week by competing in the W.Va. Women's Basketball Tournament. They found some success in this, too. winning their first round game over Fairmont before losing to powerful Marshall in the quarterfinals.

Wednesday afternoon the ladies overpowered the Fairmont Falconettes 70 - 46 to advance in the tourney. That made two wins for GSC over rival Fairmont in less than a week. Debbie Grogg, who had an outstanding tournament, led the Pioneers with 18 points and 20 rebounds. Kim Short, Kim West, and Kim Roten scored 12 points each to round out the double figure scoring for the G-Women. Karen King led Falconettes with 15 points.

Thursday afternoon our women advanced to the quarter finals against Marshall U. The ladies played hard but couldn't overcome the strength of major college Marshall, losing 75. - 65. Debbie Grogg once again led the Glenville attack with 23 points enabling her to average 20.5 points for the tournament. Kim West added 18 points to the cause (15 point tournament average), and Kim Short contributed 10. (11 point tournament average). Mary Lopez, a flashy guard, scored 27 points, and proved to be too much for our ladies to handle.

This tournament ended Glenville's most successful girls basketball season with a 12 - 6 overall record and 8 - 3 conference record. Coach Davis's squad can look forward

Slalom Course At Snowshoe

Snowshoe announced that it will hold its first annual College Invitational Race, Sunday, March 13th. The race is a giant slalom course set on the challenging Cup Run slope. It will be 360 meters in length with 48 gates, utilizing 1160 feet of Cup Run's 1500 vertical feet. All colleges in the middle Atlantic area are invited to send teams to participate.

The race is primarily a team event, but medals will be awarded for the first three individual finishers with the best time in both women's and men's divisions. Each team can have a maximum of six members per team with the best four times for the final winners. Individual medals will be awarded to the first, second, and third place team finishers with a team trophy to the best team.

Each racer will have one run which will count for both individual and team event.
