**Senators - at - Large:**

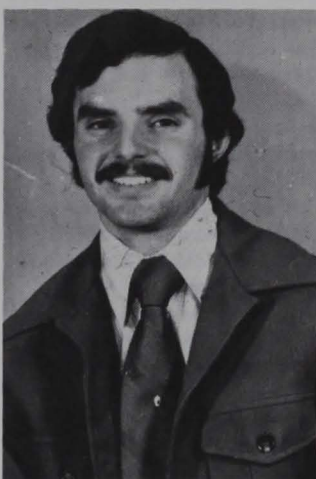

## Bugliosi Well Received by Audience

Vincent Bugliosi, prosecutor of the Charles Manson murder trials and co - author of **Helter Skelter** spoke to an audience of approximately 450 in the GSC Auditorium March 10. Bugliosi was scheduled to arrive in Charleston at 3:52, but his flight was cancelled. He arrived 45 minutes late but the audience seemed willing to wait.

Bugliosi was announced by Student Congress President, Tim Butcher. Bugliosi was so well received by the audience that his proposed speaking time of 50 minutes was extended to two and a half hours. The audience was most interested in Charles Manson and the "Family", though Bugliosi's present concern is reopening the files of the assassination of Robert F. Kennedy. At the time of the assassination his involvement in the case was limited, he only prepared a search warrant for Sirhan Sirhan's car. When asked if Kennedy's assassination was the end result of a conspiracy, Bugliosi responded, "I just don't know - now, I feel there could be." Bugliosi says his "gut feeling . . . visceral feeling" which he bases on intuition rather than evidence, is that Sirhan acted alone. The evidence points, he says, in the other direction.

"Sirhan is guilty as sin - there is no question that bullets from his gun struck someone." There was a second gun present. Information has not been released concerning whether the second gun was fired or not. Bugliosi said, "unbelievable, LA PD did not testfire the second gun... I do not suggest directly that this gun had any connection with the assassina-

tion, I'm simply saying that there were two guns there. Again, I'm not suggesting a connection, I'm only saying it should have been testfired."

"LAPD has inexcusably destroyed some of the evidence," Bugliosi went on, "You just don't destroy evidence you put a tag on it and put it in a box... but you don't just throw it away-it's inexcusable."

The key to whether more than the eight shots from Sirhan's gun were fired is in an audio tape made by Channel 7 in Los Angeles. The tape however, is in the possession of the FBI.

Bugliosi summed up his feelings regarding a possible conspiracy by saying, "If there is a group of people in America cutting down people running for president, I think the people should know about it."

Coach Belcastro pointed out that this team played well against the likes of Baptist, Wake Forest and The Citadel, all of these teams being NCAA affiliated.

Another encouraging thing was the defense played in the field this year. This time last year the Pioneers were averaging 6 to 7 errors a game but this year the team is averaging only 3.5 errors a game, which is good considering the practice time they've had and the competition they've played.

Here's the rest of the wrap up news from the southern epic.

Belcastro cited four freshmen that aren't playing regularly now but should help the team by midseason. They are infielders Randy Whytsell and Fred Smith, Catcher Joedy Moots and pitcher Ted Valentine.

Only two seniors and two freshmen make up the starting nine. The rest are sophomores and juniors. As Coach Belcastro put it, "If everybody sticks around we should be solid in years to come."

The Pioneers played against three possible pro prospects during the trip. It seems that Mark Parrish, an outfielder from Baptist College has a chance to make it, as do two stars from Madison: Tod Winterfelt, an

outfielder; and J.W. Mitchell, a shortstop.

The baseball team would like to thank Coach Riffle for his help in driving and being "a jack - of all trades" while on the trip.

## Golf

Our golf team will begin its quest for its third conference championship in four years when they open their season next week. They will compete in a Central Regional next Wednesday and Thursday at the Ox-bow golf course in Belpre, Ohio. The linksters have a veteran line-up back, plus a talented freshman. # GSC Baseball Team Takes "Long" Trip

The Glenville Pioneer baseball team has returned from its second annual southern baseball tour and has once again failed to win any of the seven games played. This in some ways has to be expected since most of the teams the Pioneers faced had 10 to 15 games under their belts while our squad has only gotten to practice outside four or five times before the trip was made. Although losing all seven games, Coach Belcastro pointed out that the team looked alot better on this trip than last year's when they were completely humiliated. There were a couple close games this year that the G-Men could have won if they could have come up with the big hit when they needed it, or cut out the opposition's big inning.

Here's a game by game rundown of how things went last week:

Erskine College - 9 Glenville - 3

The Pioneers started the trip with a game against Erskine College of South Carolina. Erskine jumped out into an early lead and kept it, Tom Shreve started and absorbed the loss. Erskine collected 90 hits to our six. Second baseman Dale Stover had 2 of these hits, with 2 singles in 3 times at bat. The big blow for Glenville was a 2 run homer by Scott Anderson. This was Anderson's first and last hit of the entire trip. The Pioneers looked good in the field making only 1 error.

Francis - Marion - 14, GSC - 1  
The Pioneers' next game was the next day on astroturf against Francis-Marion. The team got no field, or batting practice before the game and it showed as the team made 7 errors in the field and produced only 1 run. Bill Chichester collected this RBI during a 2 for 3 batting day. Francis - Marion got 5 runs in the bottom of the third off of loser Roy Alltop to blast the game wide open.

Coastal Carolina - 17, GSC - 4

Things were looking up in this game played Monday, as the Pioneers took a 4-0 lead into the bottom of the third after scoring 3 runs in the first inning. Then the roof fell in as Coastal Carolina got to starter and loser Tom Keane for 6 runs in the third. Gary Nottingham came in to do a good job of relief for 2 2/3 innings before Coastal finally got to him. They scored all their runs in bunches, picking up five more in the 7th and 6 in the 8th. Right fielder Bill Chichester once again led the Pioneer hitting attack with a 2 for 4 day. Errors were cut back on this day with only 3 Glenville miscues being made in the field.

Wake Forest - 4, GSC - 2

The Tuesday game may have been the Pioneers' best effort. We fell behind 2 - 0 in the first inning and then couldn't put enough hits together to catch up. The Pioneers collected 6 hits and both teams made four errors. Ralph Smith picked up the tough loss in going the distance.

Baptist - 7, GSC - 3

After a day off, the team continued to play well, again committing only 3 errors (Third baseman Rick Wallace had 2 of them) and losing only because of a big inning by the opponent. We got our second "long ball" of the trip when catcher Pat Beebe unloaded a 2 run shot in the top of the fourth to tie the game at 2. We took the lead in the fifth, 3-2 and held it until Baptist came up with 4 in the bottom of the sixth. Coach Belcastro pointed out that we were routed twice by this team last year (17 - 1 and 11 - 1) and this year's contest showed alot of improvement.

The Citadel - 3, GSC - 1

The Pioneers continued to play good ball on Friday, but once again the failure to get timely hits was their downfall. An inside - the - park home run put us down 1 - 0 in the first but we tied in the top of the second before going behind to stay in the bottom of the second 2 - 1. Ralph Smith picked up the loss despite giving up only 8 hits in 8 innings. Our attack included 5 hits, 2 of them belonging to Dale Stover. Once again the Pioneers recorded 3 fielding errors.

Madison - 10, GSC - 1

After playing Friday, the Pioneers traveled all night in order to reach Harrisonburg, Va. for their Saturday game with Madison. After getting only 5 hours of sleep the G-Men played lethargic ball as Madison whacked 16 hits. Tom Shreve started and picked up the loss. Glenville had their biggest hit output of the tour, collecting 10 but could only put together one run. Captain and first baseman Tim Shepherd snapped out of a mild slump, hammering out 3 hits in four trips to the plate.

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In evaluating the southern swing, Coach Belcastro believes he's found a solid starting line up consisting of Pat Beebe behind the plate, Tim Shepherd at first, Dale Stover at second, Randy Newlon holding down short, Rick Wallace playing the hot corner and Scott Anderson, Gary Nottingham and Bill Chichester in the outfield. He also thinks he has three solid pitchers who proved themselves: righthanders Ralph Smith and Tom Shreve and lefthander Tom Keane. Righthander Roy Alltop began the week as a top hurler but developed arm trouble.

Gary Marks, a junior Accounting major from Grantsville won the Collegiate Power Lifting State Championship by lifting a total of 1115 pounds. He accomplished this in three different kinds of weightlift-

ing. He lifted 345 pounds in the squat, 310 pounds on the bench and 460 pounds in the deadlift. Gary, who weighs 210 pounds was second in the state last year in AAU weightlifting competition.

Mike Johnson won the Collegiate Mr. W.V. competition in Parkersburg. Johnson, a 217 pound sophomore from White Sulphur Springs, won the competition through different poses that were judged by experts.

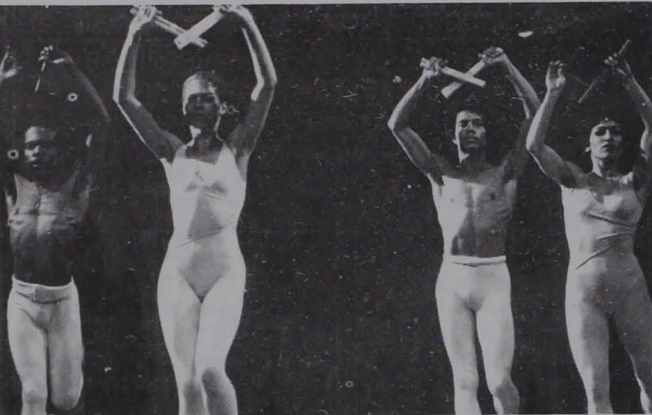

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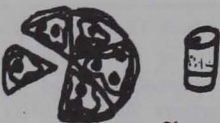
