On June 27th, 1977 the newly-formed Gilmer Public Library Commission held its organizational meeting; at that time officers were elected and the Commission began to function. Newly-elected officers and members are: Mrs. Elizabeth Turner, president; Mrs. Estelle Murphy, secretary; Dr. John D. Hymes, Jr., treasurer; Dr. S. Thomas Wilkerson, and Mr. William Piercy.

The Commission decided that its first function should be to hold open meetings for ALL residents of Gilmer County to learn more about the services and functions of a public library. They feel that these



After a one day on-campus orientation, WV Field Studies set up the berries and blueberries which are a-deep within the cave. first of three base camps in the Monongahela National Forest on Tuesday, July 19. For the next two days students were involved in exploration of the Bowden Cave system, studying the operation and management of the National Fish Hatchery, and extended study of the plant and animal life of the region. It was at this first camp site that the campers became seasoned adventurers when a rain storm completely soaked clothing and bedding.

Tennis enthusiasts should don their sunglasses, sneakers, and racquets as four new tennis courts have been completed and readied for public use. Located on Mineral Road, the royal blue courts contrast sharply with the old asphalt court behind the Administration Building, in that the surface is much smoother than the old cracked surface. Also, modern technology has enabled the courts to be fully lit at night with a minimum fee of twenty - five cents per half hour. Currently, this added attraction is inoperable until signs are erected explaining their proper use.

According to Mr. Robert Gainer of the Office of Administrative Services, the signs should be erected before the fall term begins. His explanation for the delay in use of the lights is that until proper procedures are instructed to individuals for their use, a person may waste too many quarters trying to get an expired light back on.



Program Is Ended

Glenville State College participated this summer in the Governor's Summer Youth Program. The program is open to economically disadvantaged youth between the ages of 14 and 21.

Five students participated in the program on the GSC campus. Their jobs began on June 21 and end today August 5.

The purpose of the program is to enable the participants to explore career opportunities. The students were encouraged to work and develop proper work habits and job safety. They worked 32 hours a week at \$2,30 an hour.

Glenville became a part of the program by agreeing to employ participants. All sub-sponsors are units of local government, state agencies, or private non-profit organizations. The program is operated by the Governor's Man Power office in Charleston. Funds are provided by the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973. Students were referred to sub-sponsors by the State Department of Employment Security.

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
