All freshmen and sophomores will be permitted to purchase Student Driving Permits this fall for the first time. Simmons Addresses Parents' Convocation

The new president of Glenville State College, Dr. William K. Simmons will address the parents of incoming freshmen this afternoon at 1:30 p.m. in the ballroom of the Pioneer Center. Members of the administration will be introduced at this Convocation, also. The college administrators will provide an orientation for the parents and a question - answer session.

Dr. Simmons will be speaking on concerns of the college and the parents. Some of these concerns are discussed in this article. The most important, according to Dr. Simmons, is acknowledgement of the adult status of 18 - year - olds, and the responsibilities that this status entails. "Students are free as long as they are responsible individuals,' he said.

Another important point to be made in this address concerns the Privacy Act of 1974 which prohibits revealing certain types of information concerning a student without that student's permission to do so. There is certain personal information that the college is not at liberty to reveal even to parents. However, the college takes the position that if someone is in danger, his parents will be notified. The college will abide by established laws while placing responsibility on the student for his own actions.

He will speak about the changing policy of the college about keeping automobiles on campus. The College Council has decided to permit freshmen and sophomores to have automobiles on campus because of additional parking space and the hazards to motorists when cars are parked along the highway. According to Dr. Simmons the college is "not encouraging (this) but will allow it."

Also, for the convenience of the students, a greater number of private rooms have been made available in Louis Bennett Hall. These are larger rooms and smaller ones have been

for students who are more serious about their studies.

Some other basic things to be discussed by the president are: basic ideas about people, education, and college as an experience and the changing emphasis on education. He also will discuss the shrinking job market and the need for quality

Life on campus and things that have been done to improve it is another topic covered in Dr. Simmons'

The college's optimism with the new athletic facility on Mineral Road and its meaning to GSC will also be

Dr. Simmons said that he will talk about the study habits of the students and the need for encouragement from parents in this area.

Dr. Simmons is very optimistic about this year at Glenville State College. There are many new faces at GSC and the president is sure that the atmosphere of change will make our campus a better place in which to



Yearbook Here; Analysis Is Made

The 1977 edition of the Kanawhachen is in and can be picked up now in the Placement Office. According to Jim Nutter, Editor, the yearbook was a success, capturing various moments of student life from wide-ranging viewpoints. He implied that even though there are controversial aspects of the yearbook, he accomplished what he set out to do. Nutter concluded, "This isn't the greatest yearbook that has ever been published, but it is better than the ones we've had two or three years before, and that's what I wanted."

This year, the yearbook has a very catchy title, Kanawhachen Presents Fractured Fairy Tails or A Funny Thing Happened To Me On My Way To Graduation. It follows a theme of a two-act play, with "Act I" presenting scenes and events of student life, and "Act II" concentrating on organizations and sports. The advertising section which normally is found at the end of the yearbook, is neatly packaged in a section between Acts I and II titled, "Intermission," thus adhering to the theme. The "Cast" is, appropriately, the students' individual pictures and the "Curtain Call" a fitting finale-graduation.

A new technique was also used in the Kanawhachen, according to Nutter. Unlike in the past, organizations were asked to help coordinate their sections of the yearbook. "Each organization had the chance to select pictures for their certain sections and help in the layout," the editor said. This new format would seem to alleviate any dispute over how a certain organization is portrayed in the annual, yet editing should be enforced and used.

In these two aspects, theme and organization layout, the Kanawhachen has achieved a certain purpose. The cover is also eye-catching and amusing. However, there are certain controversial items of contention that could be considered repulsive and vulgar to some people. What could be considered everyday language and behavior to most students, may be offensive to others. Keeping this in mind, editing should follow a strict code which includes the observance that each individual on campus belongs to the college community. Therefore, items such as these have no place in a college annual. Furthermore, the yearbook fails to recognize the entire senior class of 76-77. In past years, even though a senior failed to have his picture taken, his name and major were at least included on a list of all seniors. Since a student pays \$6.00 from his activity fee each semester to the yearbook, then when a student is a graduating senior, his name should at least be included in some kind of

All considered, the 1977 Kanawhachen is, somewhat, a success. The making of a yearbook is a learning experience which requires the dedication and hard work of a handful of students and advisors. This year, despite controversy, GSC has an annual that is better than most in recent years. At least more people are talking about it...

The Mercury would welcome any viewpoint concerning the Kanawhachen. Jim Nutter, editor of the yearbook has said he would consider replying to anyone who writes letters on the subject.
