Activities Outlined

The activities for the 1977 GSC Homecoming will begin with a parade through Glenville at 10:00 a.m. Judges for the parade are Mr. Myers, president of the Alumni Association, Mrs. Yvonne King, an alumni council member; and Father Michael Rooney of the Good Shepherd Catholic Church.

First, second, and third place trophies will be provided by the Alumni Association.

Coronation of the Homecoming Queen and presentation of her Court will be at 11:00 a.m. in the GSC amphitheater.

The pre-game band show will begin at 12:30 p.m. at Pioneer Stadium. Gilmer Co. High School's Marching Titans will provide the entertainment.

The GSC Pioneers take on the WV Wesleyan Bobcats at 1:30 p.m.

The GSC Alumni Association will host a social hour and cocktail party from 4:00 to 6:00 following the Homecoming game. The reception will be held in the private dining room of the Conrad Restaurant. All alumni and friends are cordially invited.

The Homecoming dance, sponsored by the Student Congress, will be held from 9:00 p.m. to 12:00 p.m. in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center. Staircase, a Charlotte, N.C. band, will play hits from the Top 40, disco, and bluegrass. Admission for the dance is \$1.00 per person.

More Students at GSC

Glenville State College has experienced the largest enrollment in its history, according to West Virginia Board of Regents. Better than ten percent increase is reflected in the 1,777 total fall enrollment. The closest to this total was reported in 1969 with 1,698 students. Last fall's total enrollment was 1,606.

An increase of 171 actual students is reported this fall with the largest increase seen in the number of freshmen and sophomores. The number of freshmen has increased from 418 last year to 493 this fall, and sophomores from 265 last year to 343 this fall.

Glenville State reflects the largest increase (10.6) of all four year colleges with the exception of Bluefield State (38.1) (which includes Greenbrier Community College Center). Shepherd follows with 9.2% increase; Concord 3.3; W. Va. Tech, 2.3; West Liberty, 1.8; and Fairmont and West Virginia State show decreases of 8.2% and 3.4%, respectively.

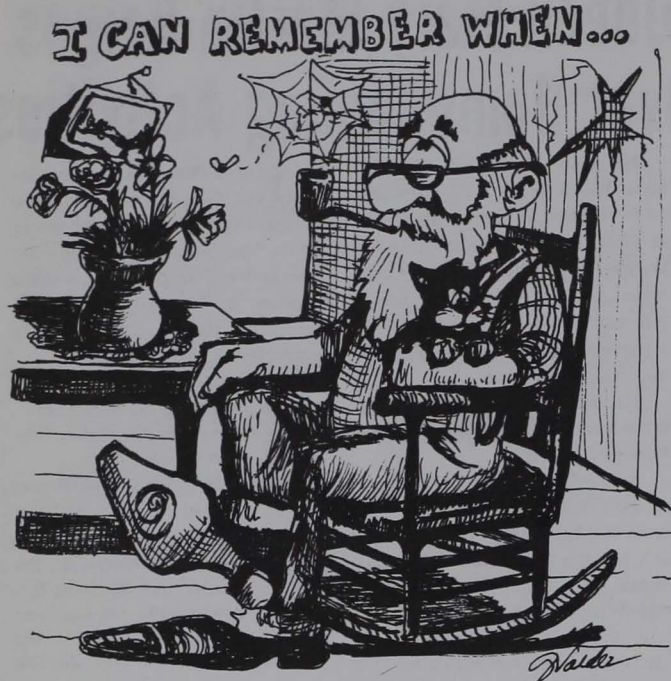

GSC students and faculty interested in their backgrounds and roots are invited to attend the October meeting of the Gilmer County Historical Society Wednesday evening, Oct. 12, at 7:30 p.m. in Room 5 of the Courthouse Annex. GSC History Professor Dr. Bruce C. Flack will be the principal speaker. He will discuss the West Virginia Historical Association of which he is president and his recently appointed position on the West Virginia Archives and History Commission and its work.

Gilmer County students are especially urged to participate in the activities of the local society since it is in serious need of young members, according to Bayard Young, president. Last year the five active members and an associate assembled a 142-page Bicentennial Biographies booklet of Gilmer County people. The group would like to produce an up-to-date history of the county. would only have two years left on top of the two years that the student already completed.

Dean of Academic affairs, Dr. Lowell Peterson, tells that in the ongoing process of examining State educational programs, there was seen a need to allow the Associate degree graduates to continue studies in an applicable and necessary program: B. A. Business Administration; B.A. in Biology. If a student would decide to go after his B.A. under the present system, he would have to complete a block of general study requirements. This could mean that there would be an additional year and one half on top of the two years needed for a four year degree. The new program would streamline a combination of the Associates and Baccalaureate degrees.

A GSC curriculum committee is now trying to draw up a 64 hour program to add to the associate program, that would satisfy B.A. requirements. The program is still in the planning stages, although there are hopes for its implementation beginning the fall of 1978. Most affected faculty members on the GSC Curriculum Committee are: Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics, John A. Chisler, and Chairman of the Department of Forest Technology and Land Surveying, also Dr. Lowell Peterson, Dean of Academic Affairs.

Pres. Simmons To Be Marshall

The 1977 Homecoming Parade Marshall will be President William K. Simmons. In 1957 President Simmons graduated from Glenville High School. He completed his college requirements in Biology and English in 1961, after serving as Pioneer in 1960.

Dr. Simmons and his wife both taught in Wood and Jefferson Counties after graduating from Glenville. Dr. Simmons received his M.A. Degree in English from West Virginia University in 1964. He then returned to GSC to serve as an English instructor until 1967 when he left to work on his doctorate at Ohio University. In 1969, he completed his Ph.D. in Nineteenth Century English Literature and returned to GSC where he was employed as Associate Professor of English. He was promoted to the rank of Professor in 1973. Simmons served as Dean of Academic Affairs from 1975 until July of this year, when he assumed the office of president of the college.

Dr. Simmons and his wife own a 200 acre farm on the Alice Road near Leading Creek. He enjoys the freedom of outdoors and feels very much a part of Gilmer County.

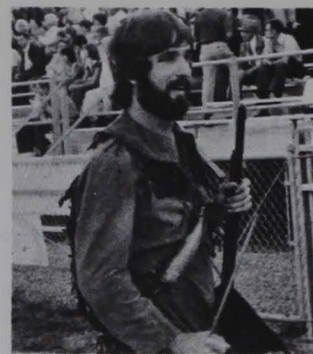

Gridders Lose; Set For Homecoming

Our Pioneer football team lost their fourth in a row last Saturday, falling to arch rival Fairmont, 34-7.

The game played on a muddy field was looked on gleefully by an enthusiastic Fairmont Homecoming crowd.

But things were not always comfortable for the home team. After taking a quick 6-0 lead, the Falcons saw themselves humiliated by a "muddle huddle" touchdown executed with perfection by the Pioneers. With the ball on the Fairmont nineteen Glenville lined up for an expected field goal try, but instead the

ball was centered to Tom Phillips standing in the "muddled" huddle to the left of the ball. He scampered the 19 yards untouched as Fairmont's defense stood bewildered. Benny Long converted the extra point and Glenville led in a football game for the first time since the first game of the season. This was short-lived however, as Fairmont scored twice in the second quarter, once on a 6 yard run by Mark Jerry and on a blocked punt off of the foot of Bob Finnerty, that was recovered by the Falcons in the end zone. This gave Fairmont a 20-7

halftime lead.

The second half saw Fairmont play ball control, grinding out 249 yards in the third and fourth stanza alone. They scored 14 more points in the fourth quarter on short runs by John Cerelli and conversions by Bill Kuroski.

Glenville meanwhile moved the ball sporadically in the second half but couldn't find the end zones. Dave Boggess led the rushing attack for the Pioneers with 76 yards in 15 carries for a 5 yard average. Leandis Hodges was held to 73 yards in 17 opportunities. The Pioneers were only able to complete 3 of 13 passes mostly due to weather conditions. Linebackers Rick Reidl and Greg Dunning spearheaded the defense, along with Tom Cowen who picked off two aeriels.

The Pioneers now come home to play W.Va. Wesleyan in the 44th Annual Homecoming game. The "Cats" of Buckhannon used to be thought of as an easy pat in the conference but not so this year. They are 3-1 (4-0 counting Shepherd's forfeit) with wins over Fairmont, West Liberty and W.Va. Tech. We lost to both Tech and Fairmont. We defeated Wesleyan 7-0 last year in tropical storm conditions but they spoiled our Homecoming two years ago with a 21-15 overtime win.

This is an important game for all of Glenville, so everybody go to the game prepared to root the G-Men to a Homecoming victory.

The Pioneers Beat The Pioneers

The Glenville JV football team evened its record at 1-1 this past Monday night with a win over Marietta's Junior Varsity team. Last week, the Little Pioneers were defeated by Salem, 7-2, but this week, the G-Men dominated the game, beating the Pioneers (This must be a popular nickname.) from Ohio 14-6.

A shamefully sparse crowd at Pioneer Stadium watched Glenville, spearheaded by a stubborn defense, pick up the first victory for any GSC football team this year. Marietta, who brought no more than 25 players (some of which were lost to injuries), scored first only to see the Pioneers storm back.

Marietta scored midway through the second quarter, recovering Randy Miller's blocked punt in the end zone, a touchdown set up by a mistake

and not lack of defense. But the G-Men took the ensuing kick off and drove the length of the field to score, mostly on the arm of quarterback Drew Waller and the running of Wally Goode.

Benny Long converted the extra point to give Glenville a 7-6 halftime lead.

The Pioneer defense remained strong throughout the second half as Marietta moved the ball between the twenties but couldn't cross the goal line. Several times throughout the game, the defense was called on to stop Marietta deep in Pioneer territory after breakdowns in the offense or punting games, and each time they came through superbly.

Wally Goode got the insurance touchdown in the fourth quarter going in from 6 yards out on a draw play. Long once again converted to make the final score 14-6.

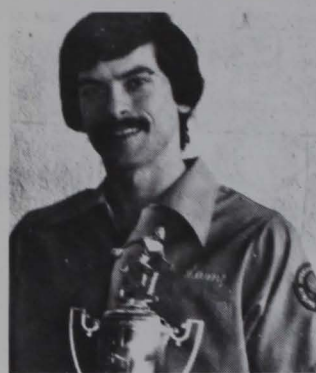

Glenville State College Alumni Association will honor 1976 graduate Sam Ferrell Saturday during halftime activities at the Homecoming game. Ferrell, 1976 Montrose winner, will be honored with a plaque in appreciation for the single honor of being named 'Number One Bowler in the United States.'

Ferrell, a member of GSC's NAIA 1976 championship bowling team was named Outstanding player of that tournament, enabling him to try out for the United States team. 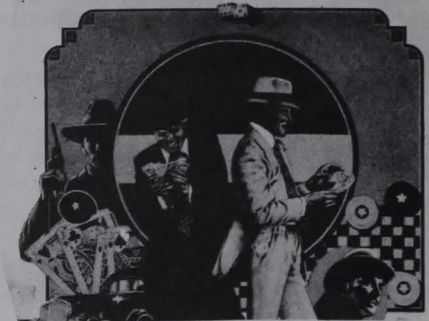
