On Friday, November 11, the Glenville State College Music Department will present Mr. James L. Anderson, Jr. in a senior recital at 8 p.m. in the College Auditorium.

Mr. Anderson, a clarinet major, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Anderson of Reedy. He graduated from Wirt County High School with the class of 1975 and is scheduled to graduate from G.S.C. in May. While in college he has participated in the marching, pep, and concert bands, choir, Minnesingers, Renaissance Consort, the G.S.C. radio station, SEA, and is currently President of both choir and the Student Chapter of MENC. He has also been Vice - President of the West Virginia Student MENC and last year won the undergraduate award as outstanding music major at G.S.C. Mr. Anderson will be performing works by Mozart, Poot, and Brahms, and will be accompanied by Ms. Twyla Wallace, a piano major from Lewisburg.

This recital is being presented as partial fulfillment for the Bachelor of Arts Degree in Music Education. A reception will be held in the Ballroom following the recital and everyone is invited to attend.

GSC Choir to Tour

The Glenville State College Choir will make a tour throughout the eastern part of the state from November 16 through November 18. This is the annual Fall tour which takes the Choir primarily to high school audiences.

The itinerary for this Fall's tour includes Braxton County High School and Midland Trail High School, November 16; Pocahontas County High School and Circleville High School, November 17; and Union High School, Mt. Storm and Preston East High School, November 18. An evening concert is scheduled in Fayette County at Ansted on November 16, at the Ansted Baptist Church.

The varied program includes important choral works from the past (Victoria and Bruckner) and present (Dickinson and Davis) along with folk songs and novelty pieces. The Camerata Singers, a small group of singers, will sing songs of a popular nature. The repertoire for this tour has something for practically every taste.

The Director of the Choir is Dr. Raymond Jones, Director of Choral Activities and Assistant Professor of Music at Glenville State. He is in the fifth year of teaching at Glenville.

Faculty Attends Workshop

As part of the Glenville State College continuing faculty development program, a lecture workshop was held November 2-4 in the Learning Materials Center of the GSC library. The purpose of the workshop was to provide faculty with ways of improving lecture techniques and teaching methods.

Leo Evans, visiting professor at West Virginia University from City University in London, England, conducted the workshop.

The workshop began with the presentation and video-taping of short lectures given by volunteer faculty "participants." The lectures were reviewed, evaluated, and critiqued by the "staff," which included Professor Evans and representative members of the various departments on campus. Participants then received suggestions as to how they could improve their lectures. Follow-up lectures were then presented by the participants as a means of comparison with the first lectures.

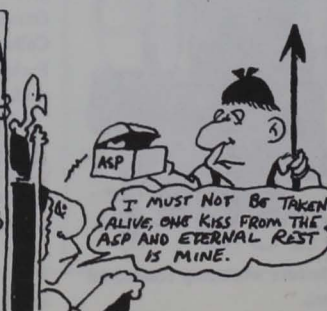
Although the seminar is primarily of interest to food service students, everyone is welcome.

Committee Formed

A Campus Access Committee is being established for the purpose of setting in motion the changes required to provide full accessibility for programs, activities, and employment in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. At the heart of Section 504 is the recognition of the civil rights of the handicapped to enter the mainstream of national life, sharing fully in the resources and opportunities on an equal basis with other citizens.

Glenville State College has done some preliminary work on making physical facilities available to the disabled person, but it is essential that we establish a Committee to assure that the future planning will include a barrier-free environment in so much as possible.

In addition to the physical plant, academic programs must be planned in such a way as to be available to the handicapped student. Suitable classrooms and laboratories are necessary under Section 504. Dormitories or other living quarters must be studied and planned to reach the needs of all students.

Individual members will soon be named to the Campus Access Committee which will have the following areas represented:

1. Physical Plant
2. Business Office
3. Student Affairs
4. Student Government
5. Admissions Office
6. Campus Planning Committee
7. Academic Affairs
8. Any individual designated as being in charge of a building on campus
9. Representative from Office of Rehabilitation

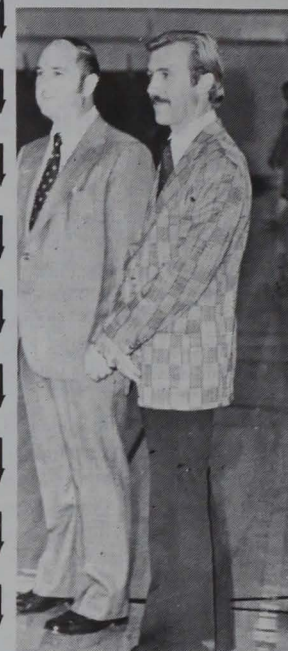

G-Men Defeat Chinese In International Exhibition

History was made last Sunday night in the GSC gymnasium and for anybody that attended, it had to be one of the most gratifying nights in Glenville sports history. The occasion was an exhibition game between the Glenville State College basketball team and the Republic of China National Team. We won the score by a comfortable margin of 88-70 but that didn't seem important at the time.

What was important were the genuine international relations that were shared by all that attended. Ceremonies started with Chinese native Evelyn Hui (now a media specialist with GSC) announcing China's team members. After GSC's team was announced, both countries' National Anthems were played. After this, teams exchanged gifts at center court, the Chinese giving our players a small medallion, Chinese coins and a pamphlet giving information about their team. In exchange, our team presented them with a glass paperweights with a team picture enclosed.

After taking care of opening ceremonies, the two teams played basketball. The visitors stuck close for a while, but it was obvious the

Taiwanese were not going to have enough fire power or height to stay with the more talented G-Men. They have been playing basketball for only about 20 years in Taiwan but they're learning quickly. They were a well coached and disciplined team, and had much more overall quickness than our bigger team.

The score was 12-10 in the Pioneers' favor with about 16 minutes to go in the first half and the Taiwanese were never closer than that again. Glenville steadily pulled away and led by 17 at the 9 minute mark. This allowed Coaches Lilly and Carney to substitute freely, giving almost everybody some playing time. We led at halftime 44-35. The Republic of China started quickly again in the second half pulling to within 3 at 46-43, but again the Pioneers proved to be too much and opened up a 14 point lead (73-59) at the 10 minute mark. With Coach Lilly substituting regularly, the Pioneers held on to win convincingly, 88-70. Coincidentally, both teams scored the same amount of points in the second half as the first—GSC-44, China-35.

Coach Lilly started a line-up of Wayne Washington and Andre White at guards, Charles Warner and new-

comer Doug Watts at the forwards, and Ralph Ledbetter at center. Others saw a lot of action as the coaches seemed to look for the combinations that would click the best. Ledbetter led all scorers with 23 points. Greg Arnette was a pleasant surprise, scoring 16 points and led all rebounders with 11. Warner clipped in 11 points.

Other factors that warmed the evening were the crowd attendance and reaction. There was a near capacity crowd and the friendly treatment given the foreign visitors was outstanding. They cheered a good play by the Chinese, and when a Republic of China player was hurt midway through the first half he was given a loud round of applause as he was helped from the court.

The game was covered by WDTV Channel 5 in Weston who had a film clip of the festivities on their news show Monday night. We also had a representative of the Governor's office on hand. Rockefeller's appointment secretary, Norwood Bentley III, came up to view the game.

All in all one would have to say that international relations were brought closer together here Sunday night.

Mt. Lions Claw Pioneers In Season Finale

Glenville's football team ended its long 1978 season with a losing, but not surprising decision to the Concord Mt. Lions 28-6. The Mt. Lions will now go on to meet either Salem or W.V. Wesleyan in the Coal Bowl and the Pioneers will have to wait until next year to try to improve themselves.

The Pioneers played tired up football in the first half and did something they had only done twice before this year - they led in the ball game. The G-Men took a 6-0 lead early in the second quarter when Mike Reed went over from the 1 yard line. The touchdown was set

up by a fumble recovery on the Concord 18. The Pioneers had a chance to score in the first quarter after Rick Reidl intercepted a pass and returned it to the Mt. Lion 25 yard line. But Glenville couldn't put the ball in the end zone, as Concord came up with a goal line stance that won't be bettered anywhere. They stopped the Pioneers who had 3 shots at pay dirt inside the seven yard line.

Concord took the lead to stay minutes later driving seventy yards. Much heralded running back Tony Lipscomb dived in from the one, the extra point was good and Glen-

ville trailed 7-6. That's the way things stood until Concord held Glenville on the Mt. Lion 25 and then preceded to put together a 2 minute offense as time ran out in the first half. With less than a minute to go quarterback Jeff Broyles hit talented Carlos Lee for a 52 yard pass and run play against a prevent defense. This gave Concord a 14-6 halftime lead and took a lot of air out of the Glenville attack.

The second half was all Concord as they scored twice. The first came in the third on a 9 yard run, again by Tony Lipscomb. The Pioneers could not get any offense going and when Concord struck again in the fourth quarter on a 67 yard pass from second string quarterback Dave Renner to Carlos Lee the lid

Mark Places 7th

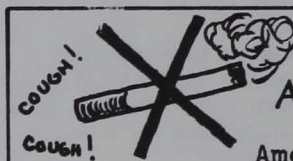
