Production Planned

The second GSC drama production of the 1977-78 season will be "The Rainmaker," by N. Richard Nash.

The setting of the drama is the Midwest farm region during a severe drought. The Curry family, consisting of A.C., the father, his two sons and daughter, depend upon the land for their living and become desparate during the drought. They hire a travelling rainmaker named Starbuck who proceeds to change their lives in ways they

hardly expect. The drama can be related to life today and the underlying idea of the pursuit of one's dreams is expressed.

Try-outs for the play will be held Dec. 13 and 14 from 4 - 6 p.m. in the Little Theatre. The three-act drama calls for a cast of six males and 1 female. Performance dates are March 9, 10, and 11, 1978. Though the cast number is small, Ms. Janet Rubin, drama instructor, urges all interested students to participate. One to three hours of academic credit may be earned for either acting or technical participation. Those interested in the technical aspects of the production may see Ms. Rubin in the "Underground" and sign up now for credit.

Assistance Is Here

document for aid via the National Direct Student Loan Program, Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program, College Work-Study Program, and West Virginia Higher Education Grant Program.

G-Men Finish Third In Wesleyan Tourney

After losing to WV State Thursday night, the Pioneers went to Buckhannon Friday and Saturday nights to participate in the WV Wesleyan Invitational Tournament and finished third. Friday night we lost to a surprising Ohio Wesleyan team 92-90. Saturday night we picked up a consolation victory by defeating Va. Wesleyan 75-51. Ohio Wesleyan won the championship game by defeating tourney favorite WV Wesleyan 85-83, after WV Wesleyan had defeated Va. Wesleyan by 12 Friday night.

It was a good tournament but attendance wasn't all I thought it would be. I was especially disappointed in Glenville's turnout. Host WV Wesleyan had the biggest crowd of course, and the two out of state teams had little or no following.

Ohio Wesleyan - 92, GSC - 90

The Pioneers played pathetic ball this night and paid for it dearly. Ohio spent most of the game running past our G-Men for easy 2 on 1 or 3 on 1 situations. They did have two of the quickest and best penetrating guards Glenville will face all year. Glenville led early but fell behind when Ohio started its running tactics. Our last lead of the first half was at 18-16 at the 11:30 mark on a bucket by Ralph

Ledbetter. We trailed by as much as eight, but cut the halftime deficit to 4 at 46-42.

Things started looking better at the start of the second half as we grabbed the lead at the 16:00 mark on a 3 point play by Ledbetter giving us a 54-52 advantage. We opened up 11 point leads at 69-58 and 71-60 before the roof fell in. Ohio came creeping slowly back and finally took an 80-79 lead at the 4:21 mark. They expanded the lead to 7 at 90-83 with less than a minute to go and it was all but over for the Pioneers. We fought futilely back but could get no closer than 2. When Denhut hit a driving lay up with 8 seconds to go to give Ohio a four point lead it was all over. Wayne Washington hit a desperation shot with two seconds left to make the final, 92-90. Washington led Glenville's scoring with 22 points, Ledbetter 20, Andre White had 18 and Charles Warner 11. Warner also pulled down 15 rebounds.

GSC - 75, Va. Wesleyan - 51

The G-Men looked like a whole different ball team the next night as they scored the first 11 points of the game and never were threatened. We built up leads by as much as 29 at 40-11 with less than 4

minutes to go. Washington led the first half rush with 14 markers. We took a 44-20 halftime lead on a last second 30 footer by guard Clayton Smith.

The second half was about more of the same. We held leads of 28 points and no less than 19. Everyone travelling got some playing time and Clayton Smith, getting his first chance to travel or play shone especially bright. He scored only 3 points but did a tremendous job of ball handling and defense. The final score of 75 - 51 was accomplished on a bucket by P.T. Thomas. Wayne Washington once again led the balanced attack for the Pioneers with 16 points. Watts had 14, Warner 11, and Ledbetter and Andre White 10 each. Wayne Washington was the only G-Man named to the All-Tournament team. He averaged 19 points for the tourney.

Last night the Pioneers played the highly rated and bitter rival Morris Harvey. I'll cover it in next week's Mercury. Tomorrow night the cagers travel to Fairmont to face the perennial power Falcons. This is the biggest game to date for the Pioneers. Next Tuesday we play Salem here. That will be the last game of this semester.

The Pioneers Stung By Jackets

The Pioneers came up with six consecutive points in the final 42 seconds of the game Thursday, December 1, but that wasn't enough to overcome West Virginia State, as GSC fell by a score of 79-76. The game was played in the GSC gymnasium.

Senior center Ralph Ledbetter led the Pioneers with 29 points. He also pulled down 15 rebounds in the game. Charles Warner scored 18 points as the only other Glenville player finishing in double figures.

State, playing a sticky man-to-man defense throughout the contest, trailed the Pioneers, 44-43 at the half. The Yellow Jackets made 32 of 72 field goals on the game for a 44 per cent average. The Pioneers shot a 46 per cent clip

from the field, hitting 32 of 69 field goal attempts.

At the midway point in the second half, the Pioneers were still leading by one point, at 60-59. State then reeled off four quick points to move up, 63-60 with 8:52 flashing on the scoreboard clock.

The Pioneers grabbed the lead again with 7:42 to go, when Warner hit two free throws to make the count, 64-63. State then went on

another point binge, scoring eight consecutive points to go on top, 71-64. The Pioneers were never able to overcome State from that point on.

With 51 seconds left State's Tim Hutchings hit the last Yellow Jacket marker of the game to make the score 79-70. The Pioneers followed with their six unanswered points, but it was too little too late.

seph A. Califano, Jr., "The new system is a first step toward consolidation of all student aid forms into one single form and toward improving financial aid procedures that have become very complicated and confusing."

Due to stipulations set forth by the Basic Grant Program, the FAF should be submitted after January 1, 1978. The application deadline for the West Virginia Grant is March 1, 1978. Therefore, in light of this and the fact school will not reconvene until January 31, students are advised to pick up the necessary forms prior to the end of the semester to complete and submit in January, thus ensuring the deadline dates will be met.
