## Sound System Received

During the last few home games of the Glenville State College Pioneer basketball contests, fans were treated to what could be termed "music to their ears."

Just before the game against Fairmont State College, the college received a \$4,049.72 package which would help clarify the garbled pregame and gametime announcing by Bob Belcastro and Ben Polis . . . a new amplifier for the sound system.

Spearheading the effort towards the sound system were Media Director Donald Phillips and Dr. Robert Dollgener, who began experimenting with different microphones, amplifiers and speakers several years

"The custodian in the physical education building, Overt Snyder, and our electricians, Donald Jones,

Edsel De Wees and Golden Jenkins, have moved the speakers in the gym more times than they probably want to remember," Phillips said.

He continued, "Many times we would try new locations for the speakers and it would be worse than the previous location. The sound reverbrication problem in the gym was so great that speaker placement alone was not the solution."

According to Phillips, last year, through the cooperation of Business Manager William Osborne and Administrative Services Director Robert Gainer, a plan was developed to provide good sound for both the gym and the football field.

The committee recruited the help of Alderson-Broaddus College Media Director Richard Hudson and his sound engineer George Sommers in the formation of the plan.

As a result of the plans, Phillips said, monies were made available to purchase the new sound system, consisting of an Altec mixer, sound equalizer. Altec amplifier, speakers and low impedance microphones.

Electronic Speciality of Charleston was awarded the bid for the equipment and put it together in a locable equipment rack, with its sound technician Richard Hopkins installing the complete set.

"We plan on using this amplication system at the football field next year," Phillips said. "We hope to have new speakers permanently installed so as to have quality sound during the games."

Glenville State College Head Basketball Coach Jesse Lilly was honored during halftime ceremonies of the February 23 game with West Virginia Tech. Coach Lilly was presented with an award from the GSC Athletic Department recognizing his 200th college victory. The win came against the Salem College Tigers.

Coach Lilly's teams at GSC have now won 206 games (not including games played in this week's WVIAC Tournament at Charleston). He has been at GSC since 1961, when he served one year as Interim Coach. He took over the head coaching responsibilities on his own in 1966.

Coach Lilly has a winning record on the hardwood at Glenville State College. His winning percentage is 59 per cent.

However - and much more importantly - he has a winning record with the students, fans and people of Glenville. The crowd at the Tech game showed the winner that Coach Lilly is when they rose in unison to give him a standing ovation on the presentation of the award.

All too often, it seems to me, coaches are judged only on their win-loss record. Naturally, I suppose that's a measurement of the kind of coach they are. Sadly, though, many a good man has not proven to be a winning coach.

The GSC community is lucky to have a winner in more ways than one in Coach Lilly. He is a dedicated, honest, thoughtful man. While many of us may like the entertainment of a coach who storms and rages on the sidelines, I think we feel a different Bowlers Even sort of 'sentiment toward a coach like Coach Lilly.

Generally, he sits relatively quiet on the Pioneer bench. He isn't on his feet screaming at the referees on every call. He doesn't jump up to berate his players when the going is tough. Many times, Coach Lilly registers his displeasure with the officiating by the action that is now familiar to fans around the state. He stands up, looks digusted, and rams his hands deep into his pockets, his suit coat bulging out above his arms. The picture is seen every so often.

As I said, I think we all have a different feeling toward him than toward those of the coaching world who rant and rave with every call with every move, in fact.

When Coach Lilly objects to a call, it is because that call was bad really bad. There is no question about it. Coach Lilly doesn't waste time screaming when the officiating is a little questionable. He realizes that there is a little give-and-take, even in officiating. But when he does object, the referee knows he has made a mistake and every fan in the house knows it too - even if he's for the opposition.

I have seen Coach Lilly sit calmly through situations where other coaches would be in hysterics. He doesn't play to the crowd. If you go to the game to see the coach put on a show, Coach Lilly will disappoint you. But if you go to the game to see a gentleman on the bench, to see a man who treats others with respect and realizes they are human beings, then Coach Lilly is your man. And the man who respects others deserves respect himself. I think that's what most of us feel for Coach Lilly that we may not feel for every other coach we've seen.

So on February 23 they gave Coach Lilly an award for his winning record in basketball. They were basing the award on the number of games his teams have won. But Coach Lilly has won a much bigger award. He's a winner in the game of life and he deserves a big award for the impression he's made on the hundreds of young men he's coached through the years and for the fact that he's simply a great human being. The world of sports - the world in general - would be a great deal better off with more Coach Jesse Lillys. There aren't many around. Look and see.

The GSC bowling team closed out the regular season last weekend with a 6 - 2 series at TV Lanes in Oak Hill. The winning weekend allowed the Pioneers to end the season with an even .500 mark at 16-16.

West Liberty captured the regular season championship with a 24 - 8 record. Fairmont was second at 23 - 9. Concord had a 20-12 record to finish third. The G-Men were fourth, West Virginia State, at 14-18, came in fifth. Morris Harvey was sixth with a record of 10-22. In seventh place. West Virginia Wesleyan had a 9-23 mark. Alderson-Broaddus was last with a record of 6 - 26.

Darrell Baylous had the high game for the Pioneers at Oak Hill with a 222. Baylous and Dave Twyman finished in tie for average with 180.

In final regular season averages, the Pioneers were led by Twyman with a 177. Baylous had a 174, Greg Martin rolled 170, Phil Shortall came in with 165. Joe Noble had a 165 and Randy Miller rolled 162. Jim Brady, a subsitute, had an average of 166.

The Pioneers will be moving into the state tournament next which will be played March 4 and 5 at Ren-Dor Lanes in Parkersburg.

#### Wheeling Defeats `G-Men The Pioneers staged a tremendous

comeback in the final three minutes and 28 seconds in the opening round of the WVIAC tournament Wednesday afternoon but could not overcome Wheeling as the Cardinals won 75-74

Wheeling, playing a controlled tempo game, fell behind the Pioneers early in the contest but used a full-court press to face Glenville turnovers in grabbing the win. Wheeling was 12 - 14 going into the game. The Pioneers finished the season 12 -10.

Wayne Washington got the Pioneers on the scoreboard first. The teams exchanged baskets and Gary Nottingham sank two free throws to knock the score at ten. It was at that point that Wheeling went into the full court press.

GSC continued to cling to a five point lead until James Ferguson hit a jumper to cut the lead to 22-19.

A disputed out-of-bounds call cost Coach Baker a technical foul. Warner sank a shot from the charity stripe to put Glenville up 23-21.

After Wayne Washington hit to mark the score 29-27 with 1:27 remaining, Wheeling went into a 4 corner offense. The Cardinals took advantage of various opportunities and led at the intermission 33 - 29

Wheeling stayed in front by about 6 until Ledbetter sank 2 free throws to make the score 58 - 57.

The Pioneers finally took the lead on 2 free throws by Watts At that point GSC led 61 - 60.

Wheeling came back quickly on a basket by LeRoy Wilson to go in front 62 - 61. When Riley hit a lay-72 - 63.

The Pioneers went into their own full-court press. Ralph Ledbetter hit for GSC to cut the lead to 72-68. following 5 straight Pioneer points. Wheeling turned the ball over on an offensive foul by Pete Thompson

and then Ledbetter sank 2 from the charity line to cut the margin to 72-70. lames Ferguson sank a jumper

to put Wheeling in front 74-70. Washington came back to make

the score 74-72. Washington hit the final Pioneer basket. The Pioneers called a time out with 3 seconds remaining and Warner forced a jump ball with 1 second. The Pioneer womens' basketball team won in the opening round of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Tournament at Buckhannon on Friday, but fell in the second round Saturday to Davis & Elkins.

In the first game, Kim West scored 27 points to lead the G-Women in a 78-51 trouncing of Shepherd's Rams. Mindy Barrows was the leading scorer for Shepherd with 21.

Cindy Stinger poured in 20 points and hauled down nine rebounds to pace Davis & Elkins to victory in the game on Saturday. The Senators shot 51 per cent from the floor. Other D&E players in double figures were Boyd, with 12, and Crump, with ten.

For the Pioneers, Kim Short had 20 points; Kim West had 18; Debbie Grogg, 13; Kim Roten, seven; and Mary Zangari, three.

## Pioneers Nix Finale

West Virginia Tech used the free up Wheeling had its biggest lead at throw line to great advantage February 23 as the Golden Bears defeated the Pioneers, 70-66, in a game played in the GSC gymnasium.

The game was the final one of the regular season for the Pioneers. Coach Jesse Lilly's crew finished the season with a 12-9 overall record and a 10-7 mark in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC).

The score was tied at 59, having been close all the way, before freshman Don Meadows sank a field goal with 3:47 flashing on the scoreboard clock. Tech followed the Meadows' goal with another basket, then rattled off six straight free throws to ice the victory. Glenville trailed by one at the half as Tech's Ameche Watson hit on a long shot as time ran out in the period.

The victory was a case of nephew topping uncle. Tech is being coached this season by Interim Coach Jim Lilly. He is sitting in for Head Coach Pete Phillips, who is recuperating from surgery. Jim Lilly is the nephew of GSC Coach Jesse Lilly.

Andre White and Charles Warner led the Pioneers with 14 points each, followed by Ralph Ledbetter with 13. Ernie Gilliard added eight, Gary Nottingham, six, Doug Watts, five, and Wayne Washington, Joe Kniceley and Phil Thomas, two each. Tech was led by William Hall with 19 points.

Glenville outrebounded Tech, 45 to 41. The Golden Bears shot better from the floor, however, canning 45 per cent of their tries on 27 of 60 shots. Glenville shot a respectable 40.3 per cent, making 31 of 77 shots from the floor.

Warner led the Pioneers in the rebounding department, grabbing 11, while Ledbetter snatched ten.
