Iran Celebrates New Year

There are 25 Iranians on campus and lately you've probably seen them doing a lot of celebrating. They are starting to celebrate their 2537 Iranian New Year. On March 20 at 6:00 p.m. here in the U.S. the Iranian New Year begins Due

to the time difference between here and Iran the celebration starts at

3:00 on the morning of March 21 in Iran.

The Iranian New Year is a lot like our Christmas, Easter, Thanksgiving, and April Fool's Day activities all rolled into one. In Iran there are thirteen days of celebration including Tuesday evening activities starting at 12:00 a.m. a week before the actual New Year's Day festivities.

During these 13 days, gifts are exchanged and friends and family visit one another. On the 12 + 1 day of the celebration picnics are held. Iranians are a superstitious people and call the 13th day of their celebration "12 + 1" to avoid using the word "thirteen." On the 12 + 1 day they hold an all day picnic because they believe by staying outside all day it will ward off the evil of the number 13.

During the festivities, everyone purchases new clothing to celebrate the new year. Also, during the festival the single girls go out into the

Library Commission Displays Exhibit On Children's Literature

There are over 300 books on exhibit in the library at Glenville State College. This display is loaned by the West Virginia Library Commission.

The Joint Committee of the Children's Book Council and the American Library Association supplied the exhibit copies for the display which is intended to present an actual sample of the wide range of trade publishing for children and young adults. A wide selection of information books, fiction, and picture books are included.

Young readers of all ages will find an abundance of books on a wide variety of subjects and interests. Science and mathematic game books can be found mixed with the poerry, cookbooks, and how-to-do-it manuals. Biography, literature, and history are also presented for the interested and curious reader.

Books on display are classified

by three categories of reading levels: Elementary (E) for kindergarten through third grade; Intermediate (I) for the fourth through seventh; and Young Adults (YA) for eighth through twelfth grades.

The exhibit permits the potential buyer to examine the book and judge the quality of the illustrations and text and the sturdiness of the paper and binding. Parents who wish to buy appropriate books as gifts for their children and teachers and school librarians who must purchase juvenile books should find the Traveling Exhibit an interesting and helpful tool

Canonico Holds Workshop

More than fifty students attended the regular monthly meeting of the Student Education Association meeting held Tuesday evening in the Ballroom. The speaker was Alan Canonico, Curriculum Specialist in Physical Education for the West Virginia State Department of Education.

Mr. Canonico presented a stimulating workshop on the teaching of physical education in public schools, and its importance in providing students with the motor skills necessary for success in the academic areas. He spoke of the need for perceptual motor programs which stress active participation in activities which promote muscle growth and muscle coordination. He demonstrated the use of several pieces of equipment which are currently being used in various schools in West Virginia. Most of his equipment, he has designed and constructed personally.

Mr. Canonico then involved students in several activities which included listening skills, coordination, and motor control. This was intereresting and amusing to the participants, as they began to realize how difficult some of these skills are.



One three-day field activity will be devoted to concentrated cave study. Class participants will be tent camping in the wilds of West Virginia Karst country. All specialized caving equipment will be supplied to class members.

Special course emphasis is placed on the cave ecosystem and the effects of man on this delicate environment. Caving courtesy, safety and conservation are all integral parts of the Cave Biology course.
