Dr. Evans received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Glenville State College in 1963. He received a Master of Arts Degree from Ohio State University in 1969. He also received a Doctor of Education Degree in 1976 from West Virginia University.

Dr. Evans has developed a program for teaching science to elementary school children. Children in grades two through six are brought on campus and taught by Science 321 students. Three students teach per session while the other class members watch the teaching students and the class on video tape in the next room. This program provides a learning experience for both the college students and the elementary students.

Dr. Evans has been teaching at GSC for eight years.



|Cave Class Concluded|

The 1978 Glenville State College Cave Biology class has concluded its eight weeks of cave exploration and study. In addition to its regularly scheduled lecture sessions, the course provided week-end cave field trip activities for the struents. Cave safety, conservation and preservation were an integral part of the cave

biology class.

On May 5th the last cave trip was directed toward the exploration of the historic Sinks of Gandy Creek. Located near Spruce Knob, the highest point in WV, the Sinks is one of the oldest known caverns in state. The Glenville cavers traveled the approximate mile of subterranean passages by following Gandy Creek as it traveled under Yokem's Knob.

The Glenville State College track team placed a respectable third in the West Virginia Inter-collegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC) Championship Track Meet held Saturday and Sunday, May 13 and 14, at Pioneer Stadium. This marked the first time for the state meet to be held at Glenville State.

West Liberty captured first place in the event. The Hilltoppers had a total of 183 points. West Virginia State came in second with 120 points. The Pioneers garnered 60 tallies, while West Virginia Wesleyan placed fourth with 58 points. Originally, point totals showed the Pionneers and Wesleyan tied for third place. An error in totaling had caused the tie, however, and when the results were re-checked Glenville emerged as the third place winner. Salem was fifth with 48 points, while West Virginia Tech was sixth with 29. In seventh place, Fairmont had 17 points, while Bluefield was last with five.

In the 110 meter high hurdle, Glenville's Gene White placed second with a time of 15.2. West Liberty's Dan Myer was first with a time of

Ernie Gilliard of the Pioneers was fifth in the 400 meter hurdle, His time was 52.5. Winning the event was State, with a time of 42.5

In the 400 meter intermediate hurdle, Curtis Smith of GSC turned in a time of 57.0 as he placed fourth. First was Mike Casto of Tech with a mark of 54.8.

Mike Fragassi was second in the discus event with a toss of 37.14. Kevin Goist of West Liberty came in first in that event with a mark of

Fragassi was third with the shot put. His throw there was 13.26. A toss of 14.17 won the event for Kevin Goist..

Glenville's Randy White was second in pole vault, with a jump of 4.10. Winning the vault was Tim Jergel of Weslevan.

Lee Hodges of the Pioneers came in second in the triple jump with a mark of 14.09. James Coleman of West Liberty was first with 14.10

Glenville's John Irwin came in fifth in the high jump with a 1.83 leap. Artie Gilmore of West Liberty won the event with a 1.98 mark.

Scramble Planned For Golfers

The Glenville State College golf team, which will be competing in the National Golf Tournament to be held at Elkins Lake Country Club in Huntsville, Texas, will be flying to Texas for this national competition. The team is scheduled to leave Saturday, June 3. The tournament will be played June 6 through 9.

Coach Tim Carney and his crew of players will be competing in the national event for the fifth time in the ten years he has been coach at Glen-

The South Hills Country Club in Parkersburg will sponsor a four-man scramble tournament on Sunday. May 21, with two-thirds of the proceeds going to the golf team to help cover expenses involved in the naional tourney.

Last year a similar event raised \$250 for the Pioneers. Coach Carney said in an interview he believes a total of \$1400 will be needed for the trip and tourney.

The scramble tourney will be open to all area golfers with \$2 of the \$3 entry fee being donated to the college team. Anyone wishing to play must sign up either in person or by calling South Hills before 10 a.m. this Sunday. The pairing will be dtermined after the deadline, with tee-off times set a 1 p.m.

Each member of the Glenville golf team will be designated a team captain in addition to former Glenville golfers such as Parkersburg South's Terry Crislip and Harrisville's Jim Scott.

4 Students 'Lift' Titles

The West Virginia Collegiate Powerlifting and physique Contest was held Sunday, May 14, at Parkersburg Community College. Entering as the Glenville lifting team were: Terrye Evans, 123 pound class; Gary Marks, 198 pound class; and Mark Linkous, 220 pound class.

The physique entry was Dan Waldheim at a body weight of 170

Terrye Evans became the first woman in the history of West Virginia lifting to enter a collegiate powerlifting meet. She totaled 460 pounds and brought home a first-place trophy in her class. Terrye is a Sophomore from Parkersburg.


