

Freshmen Begin Orientation

Freshman Week Activities will begin Sunday, August 27, with residence halls open to receive students at 9 a.m. The new dining room in the Pioneer Center will be open for students, parents, and guests from 10:30 a.m.-1p.m. At 1:30 p.m. an orientation to GSC and a question and answer session for parents will be provided by President William K. Simmons and other administrative personnel.

Scheduled for 6:15-7:30 p.m. is the General Freshman Meeting. The women freshmen are to report to the Administration Building Auditorium, meeting with Karen J. Thorpe, Associate Dean of Student Affairs, while the male freshmen are assigned to the Gymnasium in the Health and P.E. Building. They are to report to the concrete upper level bleachers under the direction of A.T. Billips, Associate Dean of Student Affairs. Following this session, the President's Reception for Freshmen will be held in the Pioneer Center Ballroom where freshmen will have an opportunity to meet the administrative staff, faculty, and local ministers in a social setting. 



TV Courses Listed

Glenville State College will be offering six television courses for The Long Search (Philosophy 310), It's Everybody's Business (Business 100) and Roots of Black Americans (History 399).

Africa File is a survey of problems of development in the Third World. The ideas and concepts portray the effects of centuries of dependence. This phenomenon has become part of the everyday world of the majority of North and West African people.

Earth, Sea and Sky is a study of our planet's place in the universe; it surveys astronomy, meteorology, climatology, oceanography, and geology. Stressing the scientific method, Earth, Sea and Sky is offered as a non-laboratory earth sciences course.

The Growing Years deals with the interplay of biological factors, human interaction, social structure, and other cultural forces in shaping the growing child. The series treats the influences on development through early childhood into adolescence and relates child development research and theory to real life situations.

The Long Search is an examination of contemporary religious practices worldwide. Viewers are given an in-depth study of the modern practices of Hinduism, Catholocism, Protestantism, and seven other religions. Each program focuses on one religion, its followers, its history, and its role in society. A travelerhost, Ronald Eyre, leads viewers on (cont. on p. 4)

Dr. Byron N. McClenney Heads PCC

The West Virginia Board of Regents has, named Dr. Byron N. McClenney of Garland, Texas, as president of Parkersburg Community College effective September 1.

Dr. McClenney, 38, currently is president of Eastfield College of the Dallas County Community College District, a position he has held for the past seven years.

He attended San Antonio College for two years and obtained a B.S., master's in education, and doctorate in education from the University of Texas at Austin.

Prior to assuming the presidency of Eastfield College, Dr. McClenney was dean of instruction at the institution for one year and from 1968-70 he occupied a similar position at McLennan Community College, Waco, Texas. From 1966-68 he was assistant dean, evening division, at San Antonio College where earlier he served as physical education instructor and coach.

Dr. McClenney is a member of several professional organizations including the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and the Commission on Educational Relations of the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities.

He most recently was chairman of the board of governors of the Career Development Center for Community College Personnel.


Dr. McClenney is district governor of Rotary District 581 and chairman of the Garland YMCA board of management. He also is a member of the Garland Chamber of Commerce.

He is the author of several publications including, "The President as Manager," and is actively involved with the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges in such programs as League for Innovation, Higher Education Management Institute, and National Center for Higher Education Management Systems.

He and his wife, Mary Ann, have two sons, Mark and Don.

Watercolor Workshop Is Successful

A watercolor workshop was held July 10 - 21. The workshop was the first two-week intensive course of its kind to be offered on campus. The course was designed to familiarize the beginner painter with the experience of going on location and collecting sketches and color renderings for larger more completed paintings done in the studio. The work-



class visited many farms in Gilmer, Lewis, and Doddridge counties. Many places were historical, such as, the Farnsworth Farm on Rt. 47 at Linn which was the sight of a stagecoach tavern, a midpoint on the old Staunton-Parkersburg Turnpike; also the Kenneth Jones log cabin farm at the base of Stewart's Creek hill. This spot is one of the oldest houses in the county that has been lived in continuously. Other locations were the Wayne Sponaugle farm, Cedar Creek, the abandoned Baptist Church on Crane Run, the old log cabin homestead of Mary Conrad at Roanoke, which is now threatened by the Stonewall Jackson Dam. The students also were guests of John Randolph, director of Fort New Salem, a heritage reproduction project of Salem College. According to George Harper, instructor, the class was an overwhelming success and included students from the Northern Panhandle to as far away as Beckley, W.V.
