A check from the dark room of a roll of film previously taken at Holy Cross with the same camera prior to arrival at Glenville State College made the company aware too late of the problem.

The following will be done to resolve the problem:

- 1) Permanent plastic I.D. cards will be made up on all persons having I.D. picture made. Many of these will **NOT** have a photo on them.
- 2) A cameraman will be scheduled to return to campus to reshoot all persons getting I.D. cards without pictures.
- 3) Times, dates and place where pictures will be taken will be announced as soon as arrangements are made.

## Energy Workshop

Glenville State College's "Energy Conservation: The Home, Remodeling and New Construction" workshop will begin Tuesday, Sept. 19, with a representative from the Johns Manville Corp. the consultant for the first session beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the GSC auditorium.

Entitled "Energy Conservation in Presently Existing Structures," W.W. Watkins, sales representative from Johns Manville's Fairmont office, will discuss areas in which a homeowner can conserve energy.

Discussions will include how to examine a house to determine where and how heat loss occurs; materials available for weatherization of a home; remodeling procedures to improve energy efficiency; and methods of evaluating costs of weatherization and savings of money and energy.

The workshop, which will last for three hours, is funded under Title I of the Higher Education Act and is free for all who attend. Both homeowners and business operators can attend as well as students and those interested in conservation.

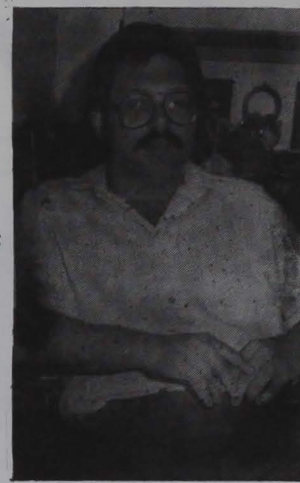
