The sisters thank all the girls who went through rush and hope to see you in the bonds of Sigma Sigma Sigma Sisterhood.

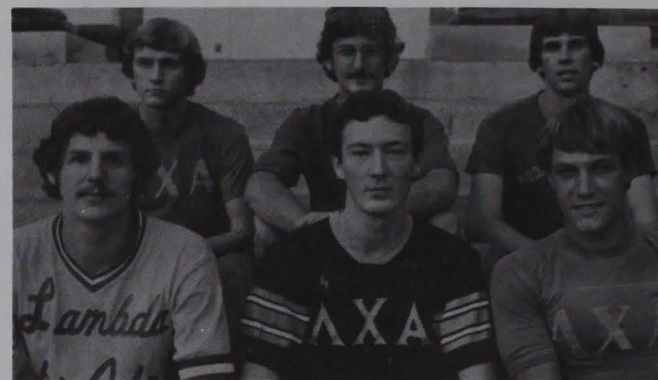
The Sigma Chili Dinner will be held on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1. Tickets will be sold soon and you can buy them from any Tri-Sigma.

## WGSC Manager Replies

In reference to last week's LETTERS TO THE EDITOR, I would like to answer the questions about radio station WGSC.

WGSC is a carrier-current station. In layman terms this means that it works very similar to closed circuit television. The signal from the station runs through telephone wire to the transmitters within the dorms and the Pioneer Center. These transmitters send the signal through the electrical system of the buildings so that you can pick it up by being near the electrical outlets.

Now, the reason we use this system is that we can operate without a license! If we were transmitting as a regular commercial station, we would have to pay a first class license to the FCC and would have to take responsibility for everything that comes across the radio from us. Also every student who broadcasts would have to get a third class operators license which are difficult to get. They would have to leave GSC for at least two years just to get the needed degree.

If we had the money we could put transmitters in all the campus buildings, and in the fraternities and sorority houses, but with a budget of \$1,800, it is not a very plausible idea. We at one time were on cable TV but were taken off about two years ago for reasons I still don't understand. Last semester we tried to be placed back on the cable, but the people who operated it seemed reluctant to talk to us.

I hope this helps you all understand WGSC better and if you have other questions write me in care of WGSC radio, Box 47, Glenville State College, or drop by and speak to me personally.

## Toppers Upend Pioneers

The West Liberty Hilltoppers downed Glenville State 17-13 last Saturday afternoon in West Liberty. That was the first sign of offense this season for the Pioneers. Glenville's initial score of the season was not produced by the offense however. Linebacker Chuck Ludwig intercepted a Chuck Hoose pass and went 37 yards for the score.

Terry Spangler hit Paul Duffy in the end zone for the other Pioneer tally. That play covered nine yards. Spangler completed 11 of 22 passes against the Hilltoppers for a total of 103 yards. On the season Spangler has hit 26 of 70 attempts for 305 yards.

Van Vaughn picked up 49 yards in 15 carries to lead the Glenville ball carriers last weekend. For the season, Vaughn has collected 145 yards in 30 carries. The turning

point of the West Liberty game occurred early in the fourth quarter. Glenville failed to capitalize on Chuck Barker's punt that was blown dead on the Hilltoppers three yard line. The Pioneer defense could not contain West Liberty's offense deep in their own territory.

Greg Dunning led the Glenville defense with five tackles. The Pioneers were without the services of linebacker John Coutz at West Liberty. He suffered an eye injury during practice.

The Glenville State Football team will return to the scene of the crime this Saturday, Oct. 7. The Pioneers will oppose the Bluefield Big Blues in Bluefield's Mitchell Stadium at 1:30 p.m.

Glenville picked up its only win of the 1977 season in Bluefield by a score of 16-12. The two teams are winless so far this season.

Tryouts for a replacement major-ette were held Monday evening. Julia Masters was chosen from 3 contestants to replace Jenny Beckett who is student teaching. Julia is a freshman at Glenville State College.

A number of suggestions have been made by faculty, staff and students that an appropriate name be chosen for the area of the Pioneer Center that we now call the "Old Cafeteria."

At a recent meeting of the College Council, it was suggested that the "Old Cafeteria," "New Cafeteria," and the "Multi-Purpose Room" should be considered for naming.

In view of these suggestions, all faculty, staff, and students are invited to submit possible names for one or all three of the rooms in Pioneer Center. Personal names should be avoided. Please forward your suggestions to the President's Office no later than October 31. The College Council will review names and recommend those that seem most appropriate.

Students and faculty advisors are reminded that the drop period ended Thursday, October 4, 1978. As was noted earlier, the Office of Academic Affairs will not approve further drops except for reasons of health. We are trying to eliminate the WF/WP grade except for the students who withdraw from school.

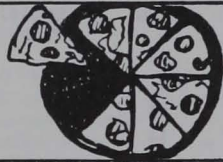

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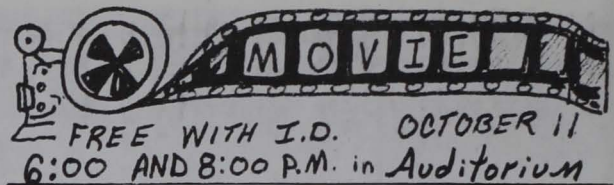
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
