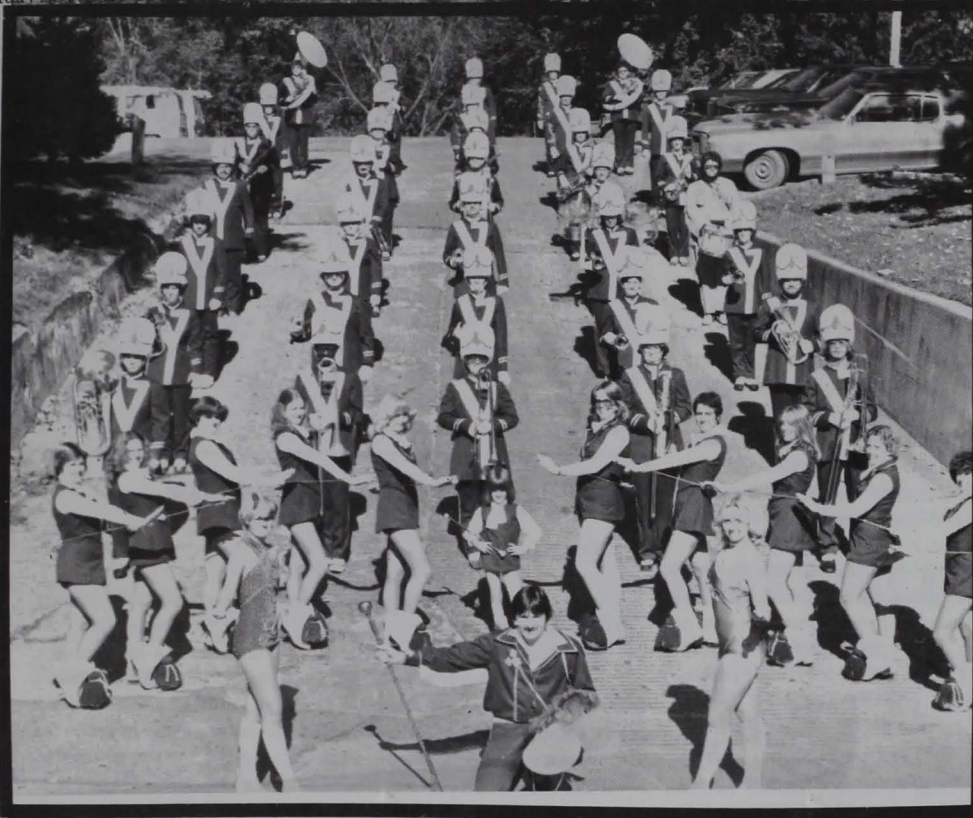

the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Collins of Glenville.

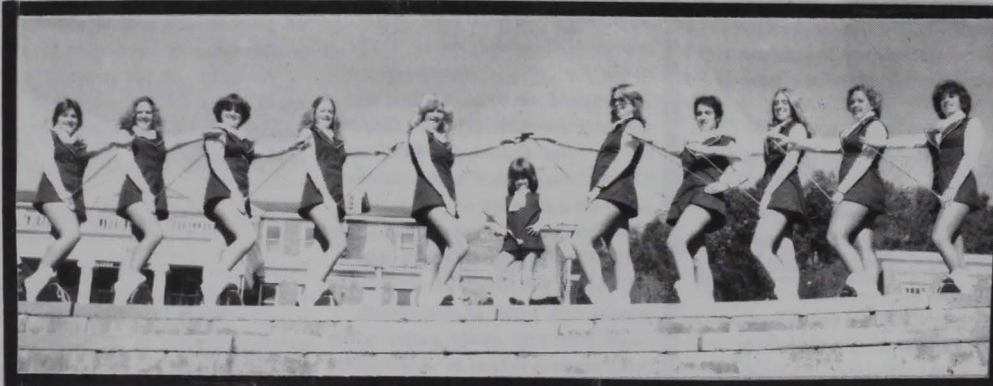

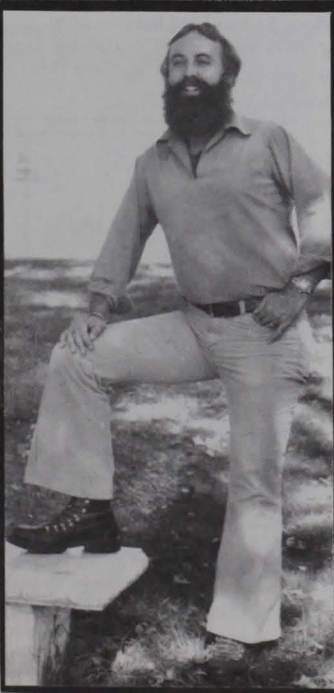

I am presently incarcerated in Green Haven Correctional Facility (New York State) for possessing a small amount of cocaine. And as the New York State drug law mandates, I am serving a life sentence.

Prison life is a new experience to me, for up until this incident, I have never had any confrontations with law enforcement officials. Yet it was deemed necessary for me to spend the rest of my life in prison for possessing a miniscule amount of cocaine.

It has now been two years since the day I was imprisoned and am on the verge of giving up all hope. But as a last resort, I am appealing to you and your fellow students for understanding. My humble request is that I be afforded a small amount of space in your paper so I may cadge for assistance.

I am about to undergo a slow and tedious legal battle that will hopefully prove New York State's drug law to be unconstitutional. But of course, this will also prove to be a costly procedure and cannot be accomplished without assistance.

I am presently lacking the financial resources—having already exhausted a substantial sum of money before, during and after my trial—and would sincerely appreciate all donations regardless of the amount.

As editor of the paper, I now leave this matter entirely in your hands, using the discretion you see fit in voicing my plight across the college campus. Please help me correct the great injustice that has been rendered upon me.

HERF Fees Questioned; Budget Is Cut

Legislators have been arguing that it is illegal for the Board of Regents to allocate higher education resources fund (HERF) fees without prior legislative approval.

A recent opinion of the Assistant Attorney General Nathan A. Hicks, Jr., states that it is legal for the Board to collect the fees, but, that it is illegal for them to allocate the fees.

The fees have been placed in the state general revenue fund until the legislature decides, when they meet in January, what to do with the fees.

The HERF fee is \$35 a semester for in-state students who carry 12 hours or more. Those students who carry less than 12 hours are assessed on a pro-rate basis. Out-of-state students are required to pay \$155 a semester for 12 hours or more and those with less than 12 hours are also on a pro-rate basis.

These fees are then accumulated

into one sum and allocated to each of the universities and all state colleges, in West Virginia, except the College of Graduate Studies. The terms of allocation are based on the number of full time students in each respective institution.

This year Glenville State College should have been allocated a little less than \$50,000 which included a 1.3 per cent "across the system" increase. But due to the recent attorney general's opinion, GSC will have to plan the budget minus the \$50,000.

The HERF fees, at GSC, are used for current expenses such as telephone, utility, postage and transportation. The budget allocated for current expenses was \$28,000. The rest of the \$50,000 was to be used for off-campus classes, Parkersburg Community College classes, part time instructor's salaries, and critic teachers (teachers who are assigned student teachers).

In order to alleviate budget problems, President William K. Simmons has made several cuts in revenue. "As President, I can't allow us to overspend," he said.

There will be no out-of-state travel expenses unless federal money is used granted by Title III, which is given to aid in faculty development.

There will be a cut in budget for educational supplies, current expenses and off-campus offerings. President Simmons thinks the legislators will "be fair" and perhaps will allocate the fees to the various institutions in March.

"It won't be Santa Claus, but, perhaps by February or March, a decision will be reached," said President Simmons. "In the mean time, we will exercise care in our budget. This will not be a threat to anything we are doing in terms of what we offer our students, and certainly, not in the academic program."

So, as November draws near, remember that you now have something to look forward to. The Cast and Crew are as follows:

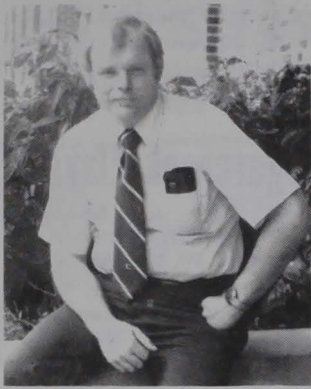

Business Students Travel

On Tuesday, Sept. 26 Ms. Susan Sienkiewicz and Mr. Jim Hinder took thirty students from her business law on a field-trip to Moundsville to visit the State Penitentiary.

According to Ms. Sienkiewicz, the purpose of this trip was to broaden the students' understanding of the judicial system. Also it allowed them to evaluate whether or not reasonable measures are being taken to rehabilitate the inmates within "the wall" as it is called by those staying there.

Conducting the tour of the facility were Mr. John Hepburn, administrative assistant, and two guards.

The students were taken into the men's living quarters, where they were allowed to look in the cells and talk to the residents. Some of the other areas that were toured included the dining area, hospital, psychiatric ward, Old Men's Colony (where prisoners 55 and up are housed), laundry facilities, and the mailroom. While in the mailroom the students were told that all mail is opened and checked for drugs and weapons but it is not read.

Recreational facilities at the prison included basketball court, football field and the gym where there are places for boxing and wrestling.

Some of the educational facilities at Moundsville include a Body Shop, Electronic Repair Shop and classrooms. The inmates can obtain

their GED as well as take college classes. While in this section the students toured a college level art class.

As far as industry the only one is the Sewing Shop where the inmates make their uniforms. Prison officials were quick to point out that they do not make license plates.

One interesting thing the students were told was that the guards do not carry weapons inside "the wall."

Mr. Hepburn said if the death penalty passes facilities will have to be built to accommodate the law because the former facilities were torn down when the death sentence was repealed. These facilities would include a gallery for the execution as well as separate housing for those on death row.

Students were not taken through the solitary confinement area because men in this area are prohibited outside contact and must remain in their cells 23½ hours a day. Men in this area have usually committed a felony while in "the wall" or have contracts out on them and are there for their own protection.

The students felt that this trip was very worthwhile and interesting and were surprised the inmates have the freedom they do inside "the wall". Many wear their own clothes and are allowed TV's, radios, etc. A possible reason for the freedom is "the wall" which is a formidable barrier to anyone.

Credit Union Members Number 61 On Campus

"We would like to increase our GSC Federal Credit Union membership considerably this year," states Professor Barbara W. Tedford, president, "so that more benefits can become available." Currently there are 61 members on our campus.

All kinds of people do belong to credit unions. The nation's 37 million credit union members range from the 61 members of GSC to the President of the United States, who is a member of the White House Employees Federal Credit Union.

The credit union here in Glenville is, like all the others, a non-profit cooperative institution organized to provide financial thrift services to members. There are over 200 credit unions in this state including such diverse groups as glass workers, telephone company employees, plumbers, carpenters, teamsters, teachers, and municipal workers.

In addition to Dr. Tedford, there are four other members of the board, which meets every third Tuesday to oversee the business of the Credit Union. These are Professors Frank Jenio, vice-president; David Gillespie, secretary; Stanley Anderson, member-at-large; and Forestry Secretary Iona Burke, treasurer.

Two important committees also function to see that members receive the benefits of borrowing money at a low interest rate and of saving money in shares accounts. Professor Wayne deRosset is chairman of the credit committee, which grants loans; and Switchboard Operator Sherry deRosset is chairman of the supervisory committee, which audits the books. Also on the credit committee are Professor Joe Darnall and staff members Margaret Starr and Edsel Dewees. On the supervisory committee are Professors Theresa Gray and William Roberts.

To join the Glenville Credit Union, one obtains a membership card from the president or treasurer. The membership fee is 25 cents. Employees may deposit money in the Credit Union at any time, but they may also take advantage of a payroll deduction plan. Those with at least \$5.00 in their accounts may borrow up to \$500.00.

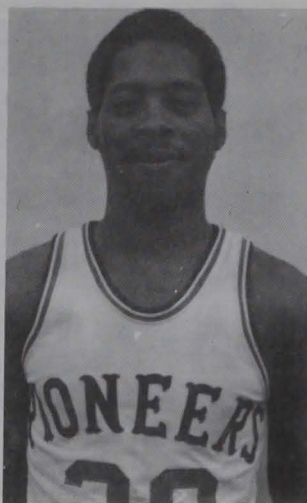

Thomas N. Coates has been chosen as the 1978 Montrose Award Winner and will be honored for his outstanding athletic career during the GSC homecoming halftime ceremony.

Tom hails from Pittsburgh, PA and graduated from Oliver High School in Pittsburgh. He attended Allegheny Community College in Pennsylvania before transferring to GSC in 1974, majoring in Health, Physical Education, and Safety Comprehension. He was a 2 year letterman at GSC and was GSC's leading scorer during the 1976-77 season with 19.6 points per game average.

Listed among Tom's accomplishments include his selection on the first team of the WVIAC team in 1977 and on the WVIAC all-Tournament team in 1977. He was named to the Weston Shrine Tournament all-Tournament team in 1976 and 1977 and set the Marietta Shrine Tournament single game scoring record of 42 points in 1976.

Alumni Foundation Benefits GSC

The Glenville State College Alumni Foundation recently acquired the impressive gift of the complete memoirs of former Governor W.W. Barron and purchased a strip of film.

The complete collection of Governor W.W. Barron's papers and memoirs that have been donated to Glenville State College is unique for several reasons. To begin with, this is the first state college to have any one individual donate a complete collection of papers and memoirs of any sort. Also, the uniqueness and controversy over former Governor W.W. Barron's term of office will draw historians and researchers from all over the state to review and study the papers. This donation is also unique because of the fact that no screening has been done to the material. Glenville was donated all the papers and files from the Governor's term without anything being removed or edited.

There are several articles and plaques that were received along with the papers and files. There are such things as plaques, pictures of grandchildren that were on his desk, his appointment of office certificate with his signed oath of office on the back. Also, there are seven volumes of a pictorial study of the former governor's term in office, four large volumes of newspaper clippings concerning his

term in office plus television clips, news, movies, slides and the full movie of his 1961 inauguration.

A formal presentation of the papers and other articles will be made sometime in April when Governor Barron can attend. The Alumni Foundations will select a guest list, inviting people from all over the state to attend.

The WBOY Channel 12 television station will do a program on the donation of the Barron papers to Glenville State College on the noon edition of the news on Wednesday, October 25. The program was arranged by Mr. John V. White and Mr. David Gillespie, who are basically in charge of the Barron materials.

The college is planning a re-creation of the governor's office as it was during his term of office from 1961 to 1965. The former governor plans to return to West Virginia to live for periods of time to do some study, research, and writing.

It has not been determined yet where Governor Barron's memoirs will be placed or where the re-creation of his office will be, but the library is being considered. A portion of the files and papers have been located in the Department of Archives in Charleston and Mr. John White has written requesting that they be sent to complete the collection.

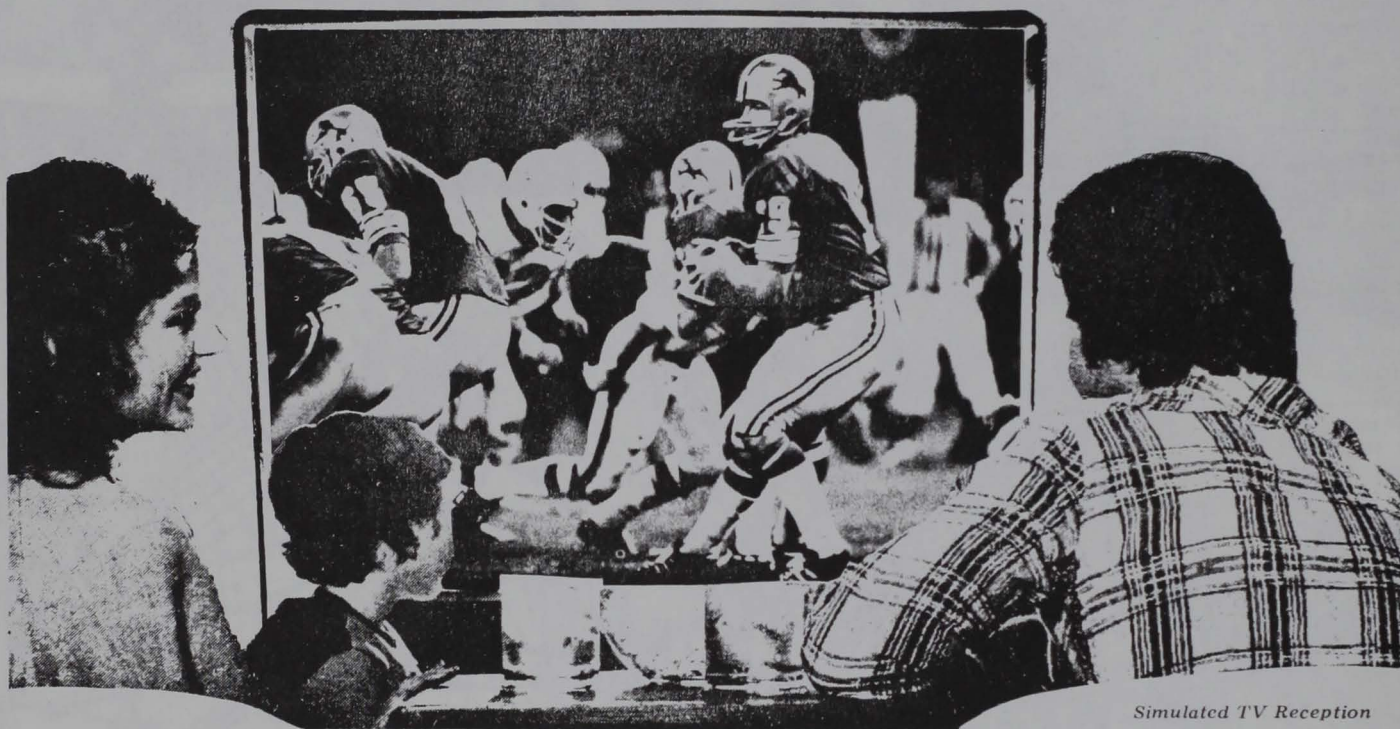
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
