Enrollment Decreases

Glenville State College's enrollment has decreased this year by 5.9%, 105 students, according to an Enrollment Analysis produced by the West Virginia Board of Regents. The total enrollment of the 1978 fall semester is 1,672 students. Last year's enrollment, the largest in the history of GSC, was a total of 1,777 students.

The number of full-time students totals, 1,054, which outnumbers the part-time students with an enrollment of 618.

According to statistics, Glenville State has the lowest enrollment out of all four-year institutions in the state. Fairmont has the largest State enrollment of 3,005 students.

Editor's Note:

This article, which we are using for a guest editorial, was written by George W. Spasyk and was presented to us by the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity. It is from their national magazine, Cross and Crescent. We feel this deserves merit since hazing is something that should be seriously contemplated.

We have read more and more lately of various animals that are on the list of endangered species — the white whale, the bald eagle, the albino seal, to name just a few. There is now another animal to add the this list of endangered species — the senseless chapter that continues to haze, harass and demean its new members. Unlike the white whale, the bald eagle, or the others, however, Lambda Lambda Chi Alpha will do everything in its power to hasten the demise of such chapters.

Hopefully, these chapters will rid themselves of such idiotic and chronic stupidity, as the large majority of chapters have already done. Calling on great reserves of courage, frequently in the face of strong campus tradition, more than 90% of our chapters have adopted the Fraternity Education/Associate Member program to replace pledgeship, and we know there are courageous exponents of this program in all of the remaining chapters which have been unwilling or unable to change. We intend to do everything possible to rid ourselves of this cancer, or these chapters will face a limited future.

The associate member program was introduced in Lambda Chi Alpha nine years ago, and in 1972 the General Assembly made up of some 80% undergraduates adopted it as the official policy of the Fraternity. But our anti-hazing laws go all the way back to 1942.

We are not dealing with adolescent fun and games. We are dealing with human life, the dignity of the individual. We are dealing with potential multi-million dollar law suits. The member who adopts the ostrich-like attitude that "it can't happen here" is woefully uninformed and patently stupid. We are fortunate that there have been no recent hazing deaths in Lambda Chi Alpha. But we have had three such deaths in Lambda Chi Alpha since I've been on the staff, and there have been a half-dozen or more among fraternities in the last ten years. The number of serious injuries, some for life, is far greater.

What is hazing? If you have to ask if a particular activity is hazing, it probably is. Another response would be, "Would you be afraid or embarrassed to do it in front of the president of the university, your parents, or a reporter from the local newspaper or television station?" If the answer is affirmative, it's probably hazing.

Other fraternities are as concerned about hazing as we are, and many are looking for alternative programs.

We would be remiss not only to our present members but to future generations of Lambda Chi's if we did not pursue vigorously a policy of enforcing our laws against hazing, and we call on all segments of the Fratemity, undergraduate and alumni alike, to support and assist us in this effort. The time for talk has long since passed. It's time for action.

Editor's Note . . . The following article is written verbatim from the "Higher Education and National Affairs." This article concerns the adjusted income range which provides eligibility for Basic Opportunity Grants (BEOGs). The middle-class family yearly income range has increased from that of \$10,000 to \$25,000, thus allowing more students to be eligible for the BEOG aid.

The success of the student-aid bill and failure of the tax-credit bill ended a year-long dispute between the Carter Administration and tax-credit supporters over the best way to help middle-income families meet college costs.

The Administration, backed by the higher education community, won. The student-aid bill, hailed as "landmark legislation" by its supporters, provides for a \$1.3 billion annual expansion of existing student-aid programs in order to reach students from middle-income families. It would make about 1.5 million more students, from families in the \$15,000 to \$25,000 adjusted income range, eligible for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOGs) and College-Work Study (CWS) programs significantly so more funds will be available for middle-income students. As finally passed, the bill (S 2539) raises the "threshold level" for funding the two programs from the current \$130 million for SEOGs to \$370 million by 1980 and from the current \$237.4 million for CWS to \$500 million by 1980.

The "threshold level" is the minimum amount for funding the two programs which must be provided before any BEOGs can be awarded. And the bill permits full and half-time students from families at any income level to qualify for in-school subsidies on Guarranteed Student Loans.

The subsidies now are limited to students from families with incomes below \$25,000. The subsidies are worth more than \$400 per year to students who borrow the \$2,500 maximum allowed.
