Former President Honored

Years of dedication and professionalism to education in West Virginia have reaped their rewards for a Shepherdstown native who has received the highest honor bestowed upon a retired educator.

Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, now of Barboursville, and former president of Glenville State College, has been given the honorary title of 'President Emeritus.'

Retiring in June of 1977 as the President of GSC after a career of educating the youth of West Virginia spanning 48 years, Dr. Wilburn was granted emeritus status last November by the West Virginia Board of Regents upon request of present GSC President Dr. William K. Simmons effective from time of retirement.

As seventeenth president of Glenville State College, Dr. Wilburn held that position for 13 years, coming from Marshall University as dean of the Teachers College and professor of education.

Born near Shepherdstown on December 15, 1911, Dr. Wilburn received his A.B. degree in 1936 from Shepherd College, his M.A. degree from West Virginia University in 1940 and his Ed.D. from the George Washington University in 1945.

His professional activities during his years of service included membership in the National Society for the Study of Education, Kappa Delta Pi, and the State Committee on Teacher Education; member and advisor to the West Virginia Elementary Principals' Association; chairman of the West Virginia Association of Colleges and Universities, and President of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Dr. Wilburn's activities also included many civic and professional clubs and organizations as well as academic accomplishments.

He was a member of the Governor's Steering Committee for promotion of the Better Roads Amendment; the board of directors of the Wood County Easter Seal Society,

board of directors of the Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine, board of directors of the Gilmer County Medical Center, administrative board and trustee of the Trinity United Methodist Church in Glenville, Glenville Rotary Club, Task Force for Higher Education in Appalachia and the board of directors of the Educators Investors Life Insurance Company

Dr. Wilburn also served as curriculum consultant to West Virginia State Nurses' Association in R.N. program revision, and chairman of the Governor's Committee of 20 for Legislative Program for Public Education.

His honors include listings in 'Who's Who in America', 'Who's Who in the East', and 'Who's Who in American Education'; Alumnus of the Year at Shepherd College in 1971; Shepherd College Founder's Day Speaker in 1954; and faculty member and initiated into the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity at Marshall University in 1954.

With only three years in education outside of West Virginia, Dr. Wilburn served both the secondary and higher education systems in the state.

From 1932-37 he was principal and teacher in a two-teacher school in Berkeley County following a two-year stint as the teacher in a one room schoolhouse in Winchester, Virginia.

Dr. Wilburn was assistant superintendent of school in Berkeley County from 1937-45, then moving to Northern Iowa State University from 1945-46 where he was an instructor in mathematics.

He came to Marshall University in 1946 as assistant professor of education and was made dean of the teachers college in 1947 with promotion to the rank of associate professor and full professor in 1953.

On October 1, 1964, Dr. Wilburn became the seventeenth president of Glenville State College replacing the retiring Dr. Harry Hefflin.

Editorially Speaking . . .

In an effort to keep the student body informed on upcoming projects and changes on the campus, I thought that I would share some of the things that President Simmons recently told me on a visit to his office.

The legislature has granted \$800,000 to Glenville State College for improvements and a committee is presently determining a priority list for improvements which need to be made to the college campus. There are some projects that need to be taken care of immediately and others that are just in the "idea" stage and will take long range planning.

The first priority on this improvements list, according to President Simmons, is the parking situation. Due to the change in rules pertaining to freshmen and sophomores having cars on campus, a serious parking problem has arisen. First of all, plans are being made to pave all the gravel lots on campus and paint lines on them which will provide a few more parking spaces. Also, a parking lot (perhaps temporary) is being planned to fill the space where Verona Mapel stood. This lot will provide approximately 30 to 35 new parking spaces. Another possible parking lot for the future would be the tract of land behind Clark Hall. There is one small problem that, when it is solved, will alleviate much of the parking problem, and that is parking space for cars driven by students living in the dorms. Possible solutions include the old football field and the forestry building grounds. Nothing definite has been decided on this issue, however.

Other top priority improvements that need to be made are the repair of deteriorating sidewalks and steps (especially those in front of the Health and Physical Education Building) and waterproofing the basements of buildings which have recently began leaking (Eberle Hall and the Library).

Some long range plans include the construction of an auditorium, either as an addition to the Administration Building or a small building possibly constructed near Eberle Hall or the college farm, where materials can be stored without the threat of deterioration. One other long term idea to possibly materialize is that of a building replacing Verona Mapel Hall. That, however, would depend on GSC's programmatic needs and enrollment.

Those are a few changes that we have to look forward to, says President Simmons. Some will come into being in the near future and others we will have to come back to see on Homecoming several years from now.

The recital will be held in the auditorium at 8:00 p.m. Admission is free.

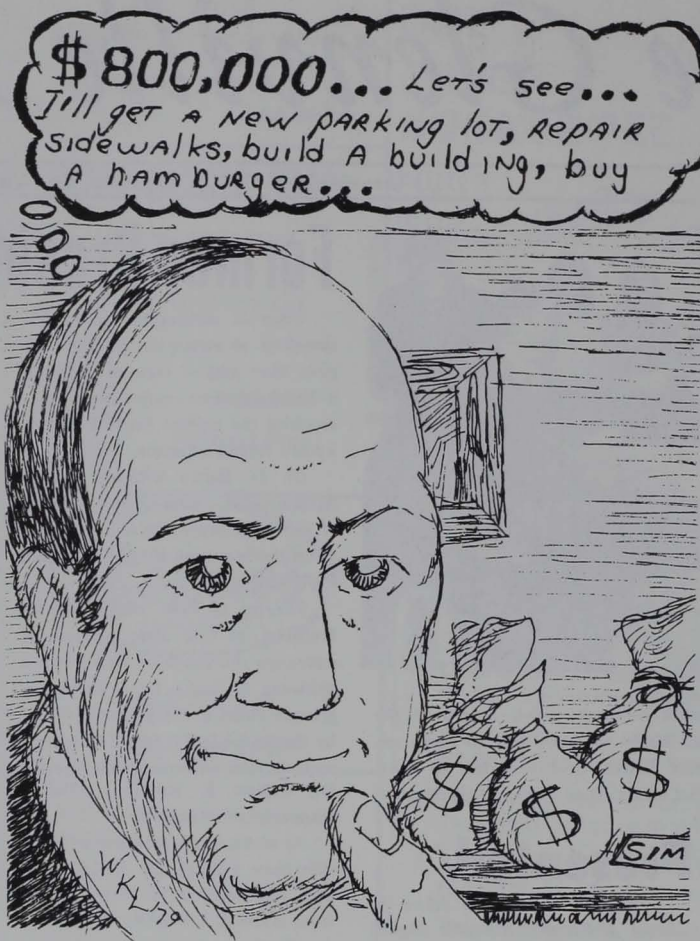

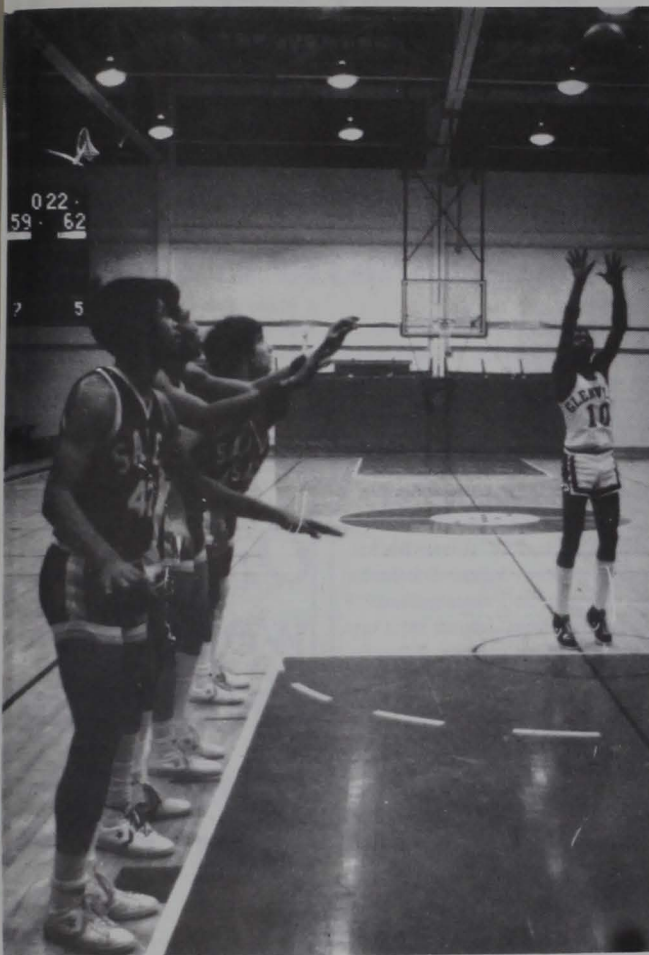
Delta Zeta

Pioneers Are 9-11

The Glenville Pioneers got back on the winning track with a 77-68 win over visiting Davis and Elkins College on Thursday night.

Don Bullet put the Pioneers ahead 11-10, on a crowd pleasing dunk off a fast break with 14 minutes to go in the half. From then on the Pioneers never trailed, taking a 35-27 halftime lead.

The lead became 17 points, 58-41, midway through the second half. But the Senators fought back to within 6 points, 74-68, before Glenville scored the final three points.

Bullet led in the scoring category with 23 points and also in rebounding with 14. Wayne Washington scored 17 and Charles Warner, 12.

As a team, the Pioneers shot 44 percent from the field; D & E shot 41 percent.

W V Wesleyan

League leading W.Va. Wesleyan outscored Glenville 24-6 during the final minutes of the first half to take a 50-30 half time lead, and then coasted to a 91-71 win over Glenville in Buckhannon on Saturday night.

The game was closely contested for much of the first half. But, Wesleyan, behind the 25 points of Mark Davis, proved too much for the Pioneers.

Glenville shot 43 percent from the floor for the game (33 of 76), while Wesleyan shot 53 percent (33 of 62). Wayne Washington and Gary Nottingham both scored 14 points for the Pioneers, followed by Charles Warner with 12.

Glenville plays Salem on Tuesday night at home.

Salem

Junior guard Ernie Gillard sank three out of four foul shots in the last 38 seconds to lead Glenville to a 63-61 victory over visiting Salem on Tuesday night.

The Pioneers were leading 60-59 with 38 seconds left when Gillard stepped to the foul line for a one-and-one opportunity. The first shot hit the front of the rim and rolled in. The second shot hit nothing but the bottom of the net.

Salem came down trailing by three points. A jump shot from the lane was no good. Glenville rebounded with the ball ending up in the hands of Gillard again; and he got fouled again. He sank the first shot but missed the second.

Salem cut the lead to two points, 63-61, with eight seconds left. Glenville inbounded the ball on Salem's offensive end. A Salem player deflected the pass and Salem gained possession. A shot from the side was no good but Salem's Bill Patterson gained the offensive rebound. But before he could get his shot off time ran out.

Wayne Washington led Glenville in scoring with 16 points. He was followed by Doug Watts with 15 points, Don Bullet with 12 and Warner with 10 points.

Glenville's record is now 10-12 overall and 7-9 in the conference.

Wednesday: closed all day for cleaning.

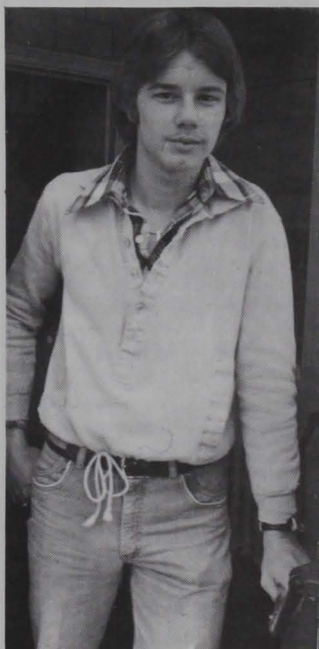
WGSC will be going on the air Sunday, February 18. Operating hours will be 2:00 p.m.-11:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday.

Before coming to Glenville, Keith attended Parkland Senior High in Winston-Salem, where he was president of Key Club and captain of the tennis team his senior year.

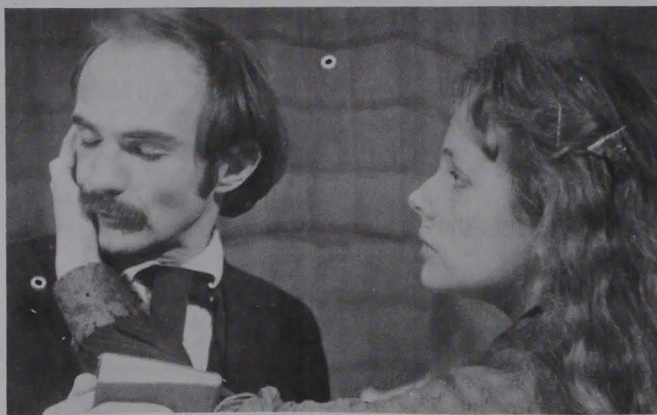

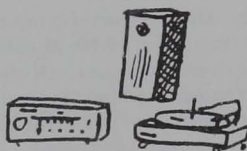
