The following downtown merchants were thanked: Ben Franklin; Garden Fresh; and Krogers. The toga competition was won by Tamera Knichely.

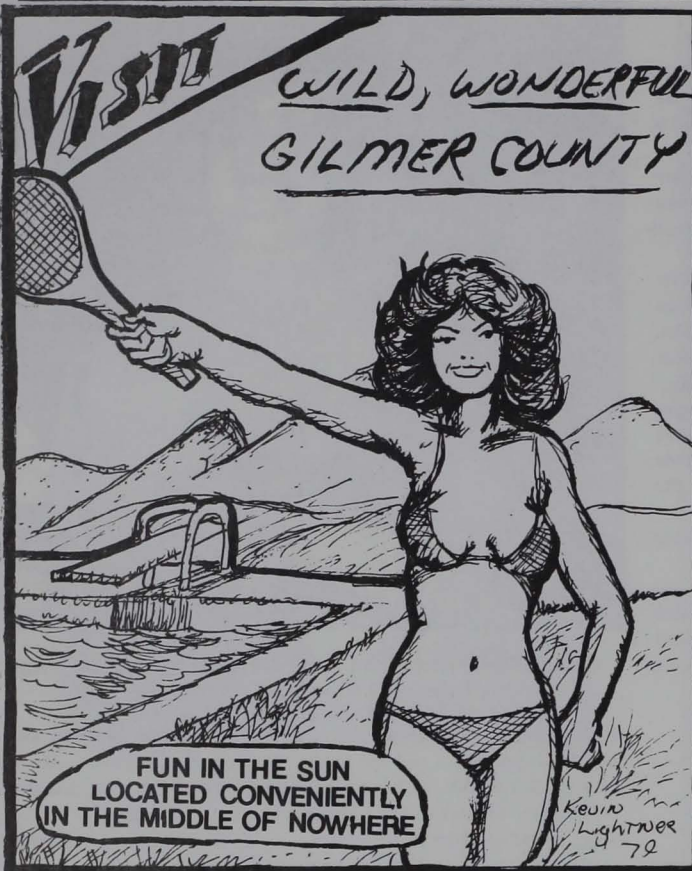

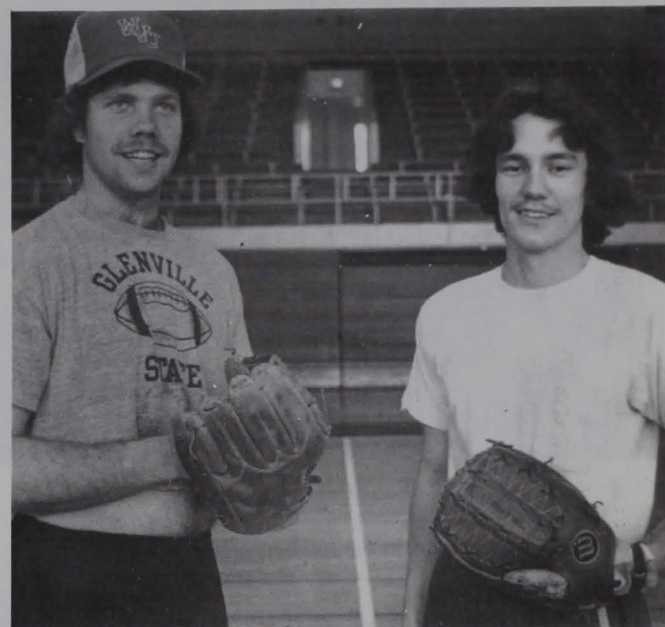

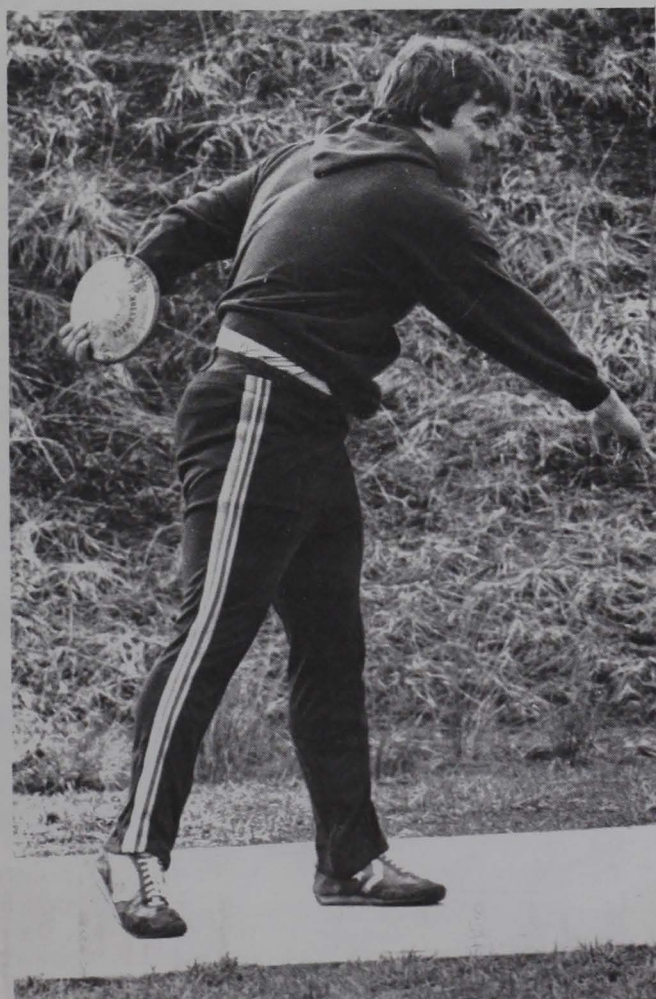
Senior members of the baseball team, Dale Norman and Dale Stover give the MERCURY a big smile.

When the GSC baseball team opens their season next week, they will be led by two senior members of the squad, Dale Stover and Dale Norman.

Dale Stover has been a four year starter for the Pioneers. He started out as a catcher but by the time the southern trip came around, Dale was shortstop but ended up at second base where he has been ever since. Dale is a good hitter and consistent infielder. When he was a freshman he stole 26 bases in 28 attempts which is not bad. His teammates respect Dale both on and off the field for his quiet brand of leadership.

The other Dale on the team, Dale Norman, has been a consistent pitcher for the Pioneers over the last several years. Described as deceptive by his Coach Belcastro, Dale seems to have a knack for getting batters to pop the ball up to the infield. ## Suggestions Urged By Revision Comm.

The Committee on Academic Affairs is considering revisions of the existing policy on withdrawing from classes. The following is a draft policy for consideration.

'Students may withdraw from a course with a grade of 'W' until nine (9) weeks from the first class day of the semester.

After the withdrawal period from classes with a 'W' ends, students may withdraw from a class with a 'WP' or 'WF' only for the following reasons:

1. Medical Reasons. Must be substantiated by a written statement from a physician stating that continuation in a class or classes is likely to be detrimental to the mental or physical health of the student.

2. Circumstances beyond the control of the student.

Any suggestions should be forwarded to the Committee on Academic Affairs prior to March 30.

Dinnia Gum was the winner of the Bubble-Gum-Blowing contest.

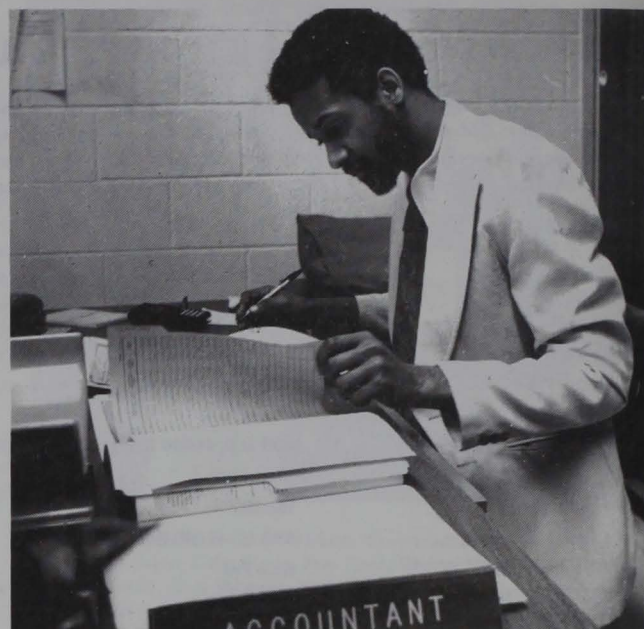

## GSC First To Have Serendipity

Five years ago Glenville State College was the only college in the United States to have it. Have what? Serendipity, of course.

Serendipity, Secretarial Science 410-Simulation, is a course in which GSC students participate in true-to-life office situations, as they work Serendipity Cosmetics, Inc. This type of office simulation is one of three available to colleges and universities today. There are two basic purposes for the Serendipity simulated class: 1) to provide each office occupations student with entry-level skills with which he can obtain an office job and 2) to provide sufficient skills so that each student will be able to keep that office job as long as he desires.

The twelve member class, along with instructor Ernie Smith, meet on Tuesday from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. to take on their respective positions including: receptionist, office manager, sales shipping accounting, accounting clerk, and simulator. One-half of the class fills the above positions while the remaining class members play the roles of customers. The customers order cosmetics from Serendipity Cosmetics, Inc. by letter, telephone, custom order, or order blank. Once an order has been placed,

the simulated office workers begin their normal duties.

The students involved with Serendipity, and their roles, include: Jayne Humphrey, receptionist; Barbara McCullough, Office Manager; Michael McClung, Shipping Clerk; Karen Kirby, Sales Manager; Charles Warner, Accountant; and Kathy Ryan, Simulator. The customers are Tammy Staut, Lyn Bartges, Teresa Rhodes, Kevin Ferguson, and Joe Crislip. The students will switch roles at mid-semester, allowing each to understand the other's job.

Concerning the class, Mr. Smith stated, "We believe it is a valuable class because it is a capstone to the field of Business. Serendipity provides students in two-year and four-year programs, teaching and non-teaching, to practice on the job, skills learned in a classroom, under controlled conditions by working the positions."

The future of Serendipity and simulation looks to play a significant role in the field of Business. GSC will educate students in the areas of advanced stenography of all kinds, accounting, data processing, executive secretarial work, business administration, and teacher preparation.
