President Simmons Finds His Dream Car

The search for the Hawk is over. For the past 5 years President William K. Simmons has searched for a 1961 Studebaker Hawk and he finally found one.

President Simmons ended the 5 year quest after going to Myers Ford in Elkton, Va. and purchasing the A-1 condition Hawk. The introduction of Hemmings Motor News to President Simmons by Kermit Kinder started the final journey. Mack Samples then gave President Simmons a March 1979 issue in which the car was advertised. Following a call to Harrisonburg, Va., President Simmons found the Hawk had been sold by Dan Harmon to Myers Ford. President Simmons' next decision was to go to Elkton and look at the car. After seeing the car was exactly what he wanted, President Simmons purchased the car for about \$2,000.

In 1961, the Studebaker Hawk came out with an automatic transmission, V-8 289 engine, power steering & positive traction. As described by President Simmons, the car's interior is in excellent shape and the response on the gas pedal is quick. The Hawk is now worth around \$2,500-\$3,000 and is rising in value with years. "I feel like I've gotten a bargain. There are really no other cars made like it," stated President Simmons.

President Simmons' first car ever owned came after graduation from college and oddly enough was a Studebaker Hawk which cost \$2,600 in 1961. After 4 years of use, the Hawk was traded away for a new Pontiac.

One of the many reasons President Simmons purchased the Hawk now was because of the memories he sought to cherish. "I feel a real kinship to that car. It played a very

Some five hundred to six hundred students are expected to be on campus Friday to participate in workshops and the show's awards ceremony. The ceremony will take place at 11 with President Simmons giving the welcoming address. There will be fifteen merit awards of twenty five dollars to be given out. Grand Prize will be a four year tuition waiver scholarship. Workshops will include Films and a Raku Firing demonstration by Mr. Scott at Firestone Lodge.

When asked about the show Mr. Rogers said "Quality is extremely high and I was also impressed with the size of the show." Mr. Harper said of the show, "We had an eighty percent increase over last year's entries and the quality is ninety to one hundred percent better."

Mr. Harper said "If this show is anything like last years, there should be extra people who come to these events."

Inexpensive Fuel Source May Not Be The Answer

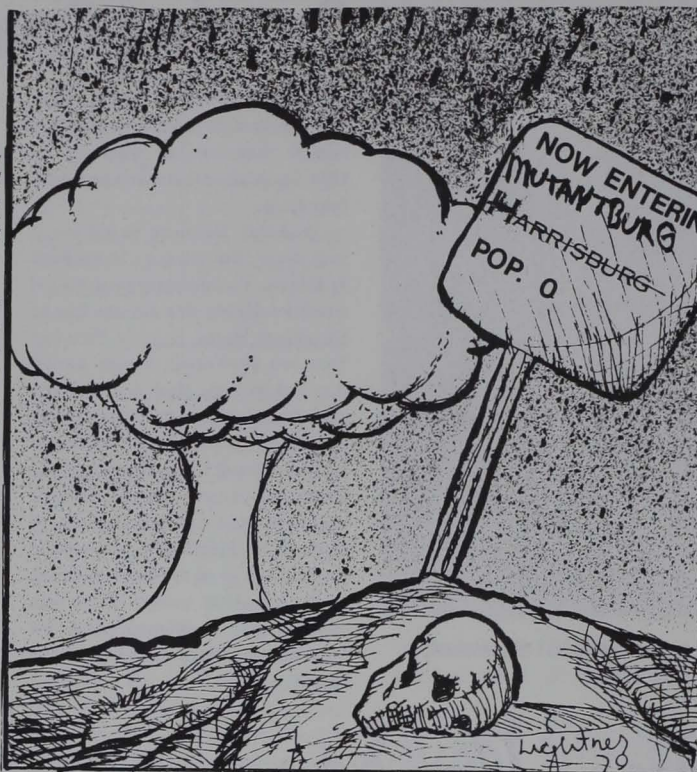

Hymes Begins Survey

Utilizing one of his history classes, Dr. Hymes was approached by Clarence E. Moran, director of the West Virginia Historic Preservation Unit, to conduct a survey and inventory of the county.

Under state law the WV Department of Culture and History is charged with the identification of historic sites in the state and initiating efforts to protect and preserve such sites.

According to Dr. Hymes, the survey to be conducted by himself and GSC students, is to attempt to uncover, document, research and photograph any historic site in Gilmer County that is over 50 years old.

'These can be specific buildings, homes, businesses and houses,' Dr. Hymes said. 'Also oil wells, bridges and railroad trestles.'

He continued, 'The entire community will be contacted and sites

Team To Host Invitational

The GSC track team finished fourth in an eight-team field at the Frail Memorial relays held on Saturday, March 31. Glenville finished with 69 points, with winner Marietta collecting 111 points. W.Va. Wesleyan scored 96 points for second place; Rio Grande finished third with 87 points.

Glenville finished first in three field events and one track event. The scores in the field events represent the combined efforts of the participants. The Pioneers won the pole vault with 19 feet combined, the long jump with 60'6 1/4", and the triple jump with 118'4 1/2. Glenville's lone first place finish in the track events was in the mile relay with a 3:40.4 finish.

Other finishes for the Pioneers

were a second in the two mile relay and the shuttle hurdle relay. P.K. Coon finished second in the mile run. Ed Huffman captured third in the 120 high hurdles. Glenville also picked up fifth place finishes in the 880 relay and the high jump.

On Saturday, April 7, the GSC track team will host the 1st Annual Pioneer Invitational at Pioneer Stadium. The field events will begin at 11:00 a.m. and the track events at 1:30 p.m. Those teams entering are W.Va. Wesleyan, W.Va. State, W.Va. Tech, Salem, Concord, and host team Glenville.

The meet is a preview of the conference meet to be held at Glenville on May fourth and sixth. So, come on out and see the Pioneer track team in action.

The Glenville State College golf team finished third in the Second Annual Glenville State College Invitational at Oxbow Golf Club in Beverly, Ohio on Friday, March 30.

California State in Pennsylvania won the tournament with a team score of 380; Ohio University 'B' team finished second with a 388; Glenville's number 1 team's third place score was 394. The number 2 team finished 11th with a 423. The third place finish score of 394 was identical to the third place finish last year.

'The case will then be further documented and attempts made to get the site placed on the National Register of Historic Places,' Dr. Hymes said.

Dr. Hymes requested that anyone in the county knowing of a potential historic site contact him at Glenville State College between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.
