Wells Receives Service Award

Mr. Nelson L. Wells has been selected by the Alumni Council to receive the 1979 Alumni Service Award. This award is given in recognition of and appreciation for his service to the Alumni Association and the college. Mr. Wells is a past officer of the Alumni association.

In 1934, Mr. Wells graduated from GSC. He began service at Glenville State in the summer of 1948 as a supervising teacher. In 1973, Mr. Wells retired from GSC after twenty years of service.

Nelson Wells is a native of Gilmer County and is married to Starling Amick Wells. They are currently re-

siding in Sand Fork, WV.

Mr. Wells will be honored at the Alumni Banquet on Saturday, May 5, at 6:30 p.m. He will show slides and discuss the history of GSC, which Mr. Wells has worked many years to preserve. This presentation will include rare pictures taken during the early years of GSC.

Mr. Wells is currently serving as president of the Gilmer County Historical Society. He has been involved with research concerning Glenville Normal School, Glenville, Gilmer County and Central West Virginia.

Mr. Ota K. Wilfong Chosen Alumnus of the Year, 1979

Mr. Ota Knox Wilfong, Jr. is the recipient of the 1979 Alumnus of the Year Award. This honor is accorded annually to the alumnus who, because of outstanding achievements in the individual field of endeavor, has brought recognition and distinction to the alumnus and to GSC.

O.K. Wilfong, Jr., graduated from Glenville four times—in 1918, 1921, 1922, and 1922. He was a member of the College Quartette, the YMCA, and participated in baseball, basketball, and football.

Mr. Wilfong retired as an edu-

cator after 45 years of service in West Virginia. He taught school in Harrison and gave 32 years of service in Clay Co. Clay Countians have a high regard for Mr. Wilfong, and have chosen him as "Mr. Clay County."

Mr. Wilfong's wife is Circe Hunt Wilfong, a native of Belington, WV. Since their retirements, the Wilfongs have enjoyed opportunities to travel.

This year's Future Business Leaders of America State Competition was held on the GSC campus Saturday, April 28. Students from high school and college level competed in various business areas.

In the high school competition, areas of competition were: Accounting, Business Math, Business Law, Data Processing, Economics, Office Procedures, Business Communications, Parliamentary Procedure, Public Speaking, Extemporaneous Speaking, Mr. and Miss FBLA, and Who's Who in FBLA (the highest honor to be received).

Out of two regional conferences held yearly, the top six students from each category advance to state competition held this year on the GSC campus. First, second, and third places are awarded in each category in the state finals.

Dale Carney received this year's highest honor as Who's Who in FBLA. Dale, a student at Nitro High School, received a plaque and an academic scholarship in the form of a tuition waiver to Glenville State College to major in business. All winners in the state high school competition now go to New Orleans, July 4, 5, and 6, to compete in the National Finals of FBLA.

The collegiate level of FBLA is called Phi Beta Lambda. The former Alpha Delta Epsilon Business Fraternity is now the ADE Chapter of Phi Beta Lambda. Seven state schools holding membership in Phi Beta Lambda include: W.Va. State, W.Va. Wesleyan, Marshall, James Rumsey Vocational School, Bluefield State, Davis and Elkins, and Glenville.

Collegiate competition was also held this weekend on campus. By Glenville's membership in the state's Phi Beta Lambda Organization, they were able to compete in state competition and run candidates for the state offices of Phi Beta Lambda.

The ADE Chapter of Phi Beta Lambda is pleased to announce the state champion winners in Shorthand and Accounting.

State Champion in Shorthand competition is Rolanna Coberly, 19 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Coberly of Glenville. She is a GSC freshman, Secretarial Science Major and a graduate of Gilmer County High School. Ms. Coberly took three letters at 100, 110, and 120 words per minute and had one hour to transcribe. The three winning letters were done in perfect form.

Accounting State Champion is 30 year old Gary Bonnett, a Junior Accounting Major. Gary, his wife Erika, and son Daniel reside in Troy. In competition, Gary had one hour to complete a 73 question test containing 20 true-false and 53 accounting problems. He scored 6% higher than the second place finishers.

Arson Is Root Of LBH Fire

The fire which occurred at LBH around 12:50 Saturday morning, April 7 has been determined to have been caused by arson, according to the fire department.

According to Captain Jerry Helmick, of the GSC campus security, "the fire had approximately three points of origin." Captain Helmick also stated that "evidence from the room has been sent to the FBI labs in Washington D.C., and more will be known after their findings are in."

So far the campus police have spent some 250 man hours investigating the case. The FBI labs are extremely busy, so it is not certain when the information will come in, but as Captain Helmick said, "we are extremely lucky to have them working on the case with us."

Statements have been taken from

all who were in the dorm Friday night and Saturday morning and Helmick said "everyone has been very cooperative" and that he hopes "people will think twice from now on about pulling false fire alarms because when the real thing comes, some may disregard the alarm."

According to Doug McGuigan, Director of Louis Bennett Hall, the fire was discovered by Kent King and Joey Douglas. August Kafer, one of the RA's who fought the fire, said "Kent smelled smoke, went to the room, opened the door, saw the

smoke, and pulled the fire alarm. McGuigan, August Kafer, Robert Estey and Bill Pitzer proceeded to the room, checked to see if anyone was in, and then fought the fire until the Glenville Fire Department showed up.

McGuigan said that "August Kafer and Pitzer were given commendations by President William K. Simmons for their maturity, good sense, and the bravery they showed in fighting the blaze until the fire department arrived."

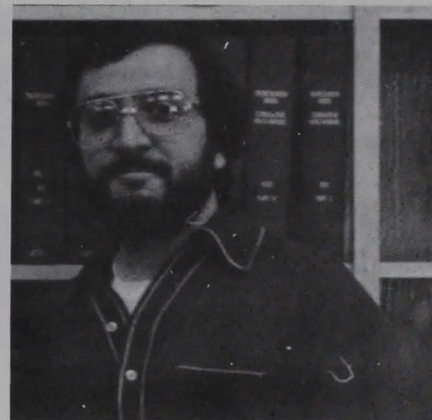

Dr. Frank Jenio Presents Paper

Dr. Frank Jenio, associate professor of biology at Glenville State College, recently presented a paper before the fifty-fourth annual meeting of the West Virginia Academy of Science at Concord College.

Entitled "Predation on Freshwater Gammarids," the paper concerns amphipods which are small crustaceans (about one-fourth to three-eighths inch in length) that resemble a shrimp in appearance and are frequently found in unpolluted state streams.

Jenio also co-presented another paper on freshwater amphipods with

Janet Cogar, a 1977 GSC graduate in biology currently in the nursing program at Alderson-Broadus College.

The W.Va. Academy of Science was founded at Morgantown on Nov. 8, 1924, and was incorporated on May 9, 1959, under the Code of West Virginia as a "nonstock corporation which is not organized for profit but for the advancement of learning and scientific knowledge and the promotion of scientific work in West Virginia."

Jenio currently resides at 13 Millbrook Road, Bridgeport, with his wife and two children.

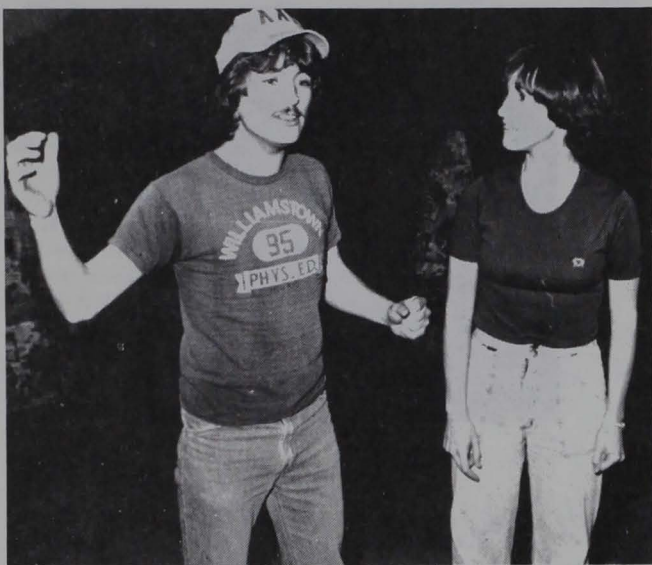
Panhellenic Women's Banquet Slated

Register for Fall

Mack K. Samples, Dean of Records and Admissions, has announced that there will be a pre-registration for the Fall 1979 Semester. Students may pre-register beginning May 14 at the Registrar's office. The on-line system which worked so well at the beginning of the spring semester will be used to serve the students.

Pre-registration hours will be 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday. Pre-registration will close on May 25.

Those desiring to pre-register should work out a schedule, consult with their advisor and secure a signature, then bring the completed form to the Registrar's office. The registration process at the Registrar's office should only take a minute or two for those students who are currently enrolled.

Many students do not see any advantage in pre-registering, but there is always one big advantage: you can get the courses that you want at the times that you want them. Those who wait until fall inevitably encounter problems with a closed course or schedule conflicts.

Everyone is encouraged to pre-register. No fees will be collected, and no obligations will be made. But, if you do return in the fall, you will have the schedule that you want.

There will be no pre-registration for summer school. With the new on-line system, we do not anticipate any problems with summer school registration.

Directed by Janet Rubin, "The Brave Little Tailor" is a classic children's story about the small conquering the mighty. Through wit and wisdom, the little tailor, who has killed seven flies with a blow, convinces two giants that he is a force mightier than they.

Using the theory of divide and conquer, he turns the giant's attention away from destroying him and onto destroying each other, thus freeing the kingdom from their threatening menace, and winning the gratitude of the queens who rule there.

Tim James, a senior music major from W. Hamlin, and former President of Student Congress is cast as the little tailor.

The little tailor may be small in size, but he is large in terms of wit, wisdom, and compassion. When he is called upon to save the kingdom from giants who terrorize it, he uses clever ploys to prove that force and size can be overcome by virtue and wit.

The Maid is being played by Carla Barber, a freshman elementary education and early childhood major from Parkersburg. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Sizemore.

Serving the two queens who rule the kingdom, the maid is also the herald, guard, musician, cook, and jack of all trades. She is the tailor's chief ally in concocting and executing schemes to rid the kingdom of the giants.

June Nohe, former "star spangled girl" and Miss GSC, will play Eulalia. She is a senior English education and oral communications major from Parkersburg, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Nohe.

With her sister, she rules the kingdom: being besieged by the giants. A silly queen, she is unable to face the problem realistically and instead tries to ignore it. In spite of her faults, she is a good and kind queen.

Cast as Oulalia, is Jennifer Chisler, a freshman elementary education major from Glenville. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Chisler, and was in one act play competitions in high school.

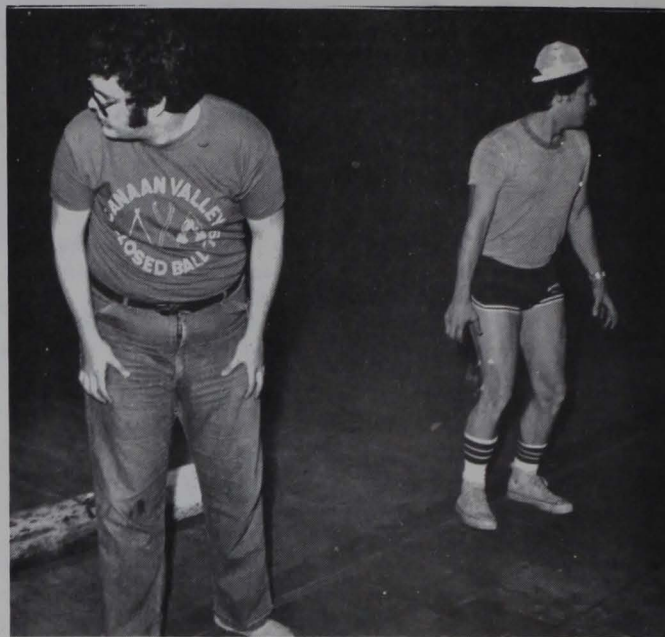

The major purpose of this program is to create and to implement a program that would make a public

service experience and a learning opportunity to complement educational development to a limited number of juniors and seniors in West Virginia institutes of higher education.

In 1975, the Board of Regents created the program and a wide array of academic majors from Agriculture to Zoology has been represented.

The Board of Regents will provide all necessary academic supervision, including the awarding of grades for the semester and will recruit qualified students from state colleges and universities.

Study In England This Summer

Susquehanna University will conduct its eighth biennial summer study program at Oxford University in England during the summer of 1979. Applications are now being accepted.

'Susquehanna at Oxford' is a program of study in British history, culture, and society with relevant travel and excursions in England. Admission is open to undergraduates from Susquehanna and other colleges, secondary school teachers, recent college graduates seeking enrichment, or any seriously interested adult.

The group is scheduled to arrive in London on June 21 for a week of tours related to the academic program, theatres, concerts, sightseeing and leisure time. A four-day excursion to Edinburgh, Scotland, is also planned.

Students will then spend five weeks in residence in the historic Durham Quadrangle at University College, the oldest of Oxford's colleges, founded in 1249.

Participants enroll in two courses, including either British History, Politics and Society: 1870 to the Present or British Literature: 1870 to the Present. These two courses are part of Oxford University's regular summer school program.

The students select an additional course from a group of electives including History of British Theatre, History of the Fine Arts in England: 1660-1837, The Modern English Comic Novel, British Atomic Scientists, Management Techniques in British Industry, and The British Education System. Offering of elective courses is conditional upon sufficient enrollment.

During the five weeks in Oxford, participants also have the opportunity to take excursions to other parts of Great Britain, including both independent outings and guided tours related to the academic program.

Following the Oxford session, Susquehanna also offers an optional three-week tour of the European continent, with travel by rented minibus. The itinerary includes Brussels, Munich, Salzburg, Innsbruck, Lucerne, Interlaken, Berne, Heidelberg, Cologne, and Paris.

The program is under the direction of the S.U. political science department. Brochures containing further information including costs are available from Dr. Robert Bradford, Susquehanna University, Selingsgrove, Pa. 17870.

Evans To Compete

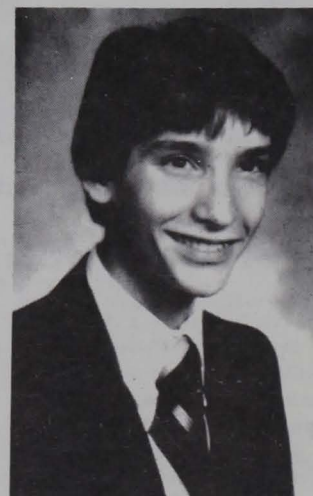

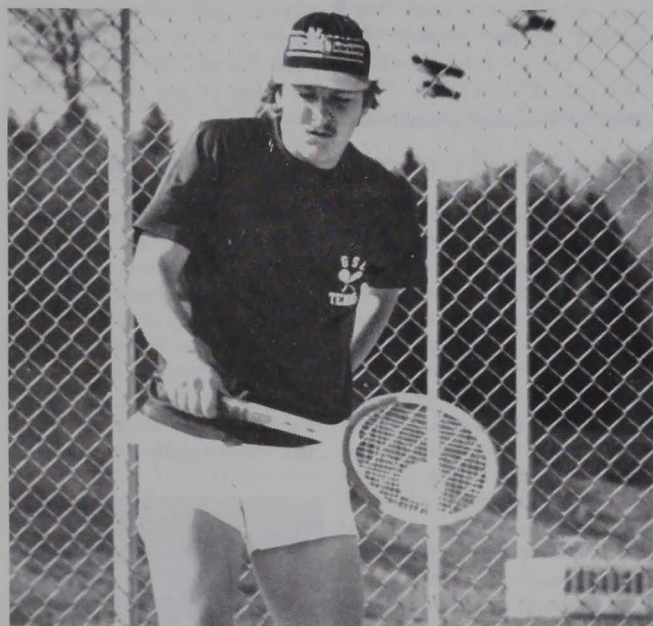

All in all it was a heck of a show. Next year Phi Beta Lambda hopes to have another Variety Show with more and different acts.

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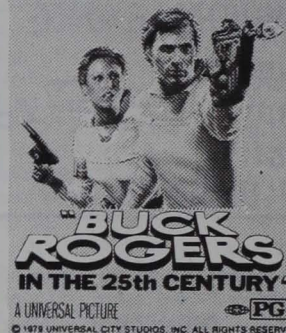
