The conference explained the use of instructional technology in communications and to talk about and see new products in media software.



Pioneers Defeat Davis & Elkins, Win 3rd WVIAC Championship

The Glenville State College Pioneers captured their third straight WVIAC golf tournament, defeating a strong Davis and Elkins team 972-964, at Berkeley Springs.

In the three day tournament, Glenville and D&E were tied after the first day with a score of 324. After the second day of competition GSC had a nine stroke lead, 647-638.

The final day of competition saw D&E shoot a 325, but the nine shot lead that Glenville had after the second day was reduced by only one shot when Glenville registered a 326

This is the third straight conference championship for coach Tim Carney and his teams, and the sixth in the last eight years. They will

represent District 27 in the NAIA tournament at Greensboro, North Carolina, in the first week of June.

Joe Crislip's score of 238 was good enough for third place behind medalist Ken Leatherwood of Bluefield's 227 and Conference "Golfer of the Year" Ken Phillip's 236.

Jim Brady shot 79-78-83-240 for fourth place. Greg DelPrince shot 83-81-77-241. Perry Coe registered a 251 and Dave Lamm shot a 252.

Following behind Glenville and D&E were Wesleyan, Bluefield, West Liberty, Fairmont, WV State, and Alderson-Broaddus.

Jim Brady and Joe Crislip were selected to the All Conference team along with Ken Phillips and Steve Leitzel of Davis and Elkins and Kevin Leatherwood.

Baseball Team Finishes Season

The GSC baseball team has finished the 1978-79 season with a record of 5-10 in the conference and 5-17 overall.

Against Shepherd, Glenville lost the first game of the doubleheader 3-2. Gary Jones and Terry Spangler scored the two runs in the first and third innings. Shepherd won the game in the sixth inning when they scored their second and third runs off losing pitcher Terry Spangler who gave up only one earned run in six innings.

TRACK MEET HELD, GSC FINISHES 4th

The GSC track team finished fourth in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference meet held at Pioneer Stadium on Saturday, May 5, and Sunday, May 6.

West Liberty placed first in the meet for an unprecedented 6th time. Their winning score was 137. West Virginia Wesleyan was second with 119 points; West Virginia State was third with 116½ and Glenville's fourth place score was 75½. Salem, Fairmont, W.Va. Tech, and Concord finished behind Glenville in the standings.

GSC had three first-place finishes in the meet. The 4x400 relay team composed of Dan Amick, Don Wilson, Bill Dilley, and Calvin Page, won in a time of 3.24.74. Randy White placed first in the pole vault with a 3.81 meter vault. The final first-place finisher was Ed Huffman in the 400 m IH. His time was 55 seconds flat.

The Pioneers had only one second-place finisher. That was Calvin Page in the 400 m. His time was 49.2, .5 behind Ted White of Salem who won in 48.7.

The 4x100 m relay team finished third as did Randy Maxwell in the pole vault and Mike McGill in the long jump.

Gene White in the 400 IH, Allen Johnson in the discus, and Mike McGill in the triple jump finished fourth
