### Improvements Made To Campus

Phase I of the Capital Improvement Plans for Glenville State College have been initiated and mostly includes repair work that needs to be done to the campus as soon as possible.

The first project which has been completed, as everyone has noticed, is the parking lot where Verona Mapel stood. This new parking lot will hold 25 vehicles and has been designated as a commuter student parking lot. There will be no overnight parking, according to Dean Bil-lips, as the High Street lot had to be opened for R-Zone parking. Also, several pot holes have been filled and some interior decorating was done in the Science Hall. This past Wednesday, representatives from the Watkins-Taylor Partnership of interior design inspected the Science Hall for modernization of the classrooms.

Some concrete work will soon begin as the front and side steps of the Physical Education building will be replaced and the steps in front of Clark Hall and those behind the library will also be replaced. Anywhere else that shows signs of deterioration will be repaired.

Also, as part of Phase I, existing parking lots will be repaved and gravel parking lots will be paved and marked. Plans are being made to replace the roof on Eberle Hall and the art and music rooms are to be improved. Some landscaping is being discussed to help improve the appearance of the campus. Some long range plans being discussed include lowering the ceilings in the Administration. Building, improving Firestone Lodge with possible classrooms and the construction of a kiln shed for the art department.

# **Minor Sports Deserve Equal Money & Support**

Minor sports do not exist on the campus of Glenville State College. But of course they do, you say. They are present but is their presence really felt by students, faculty, and administration alike?

Minor sports include bowling, golf, cross-country, track, baseball and tennis. These are minor sports basically because they receive small amounts of college funding. Although they receive the smallest budgets, they usually excel in their respective sports. For example, the golf team has won the conference title six of the last eight seasons, going to the national tournament in '77, '78 and '79, finishing 15th in the nation two years ago. The bowling team was national champion in '76, seventh in '77 and eighth in '78. Although bowling has been discontinued by the NAIA as national championship, the team could still qualify in the NCAA divisions. These teams have shown national power, but by the eyes of the administration, they are minor and deserve little financial and moral support.

In comparison, the Glenville basketball and football teams receive the most funding and excel the least of all sports. Only once has each team gone to the national tournament. Money is poured into these sports and nothing really good comes out of them. Sure, the college gets a lot of public relations by the college teams playing here or there, but at the same time most of it is bad public relations because the teams lose so grossly.

Other minor sports, cross-country, track, and tennis, were discontinued for a number of years because of a lack of funds. Since the continuance of these sports, cross-country went to the national tournament in its first year. track had a strong season including winning the Glenville Invitational, and tennis is the most-improved two-year team in the conference. If more money were boosted into these minor sports, it would attract many more students than basketball or football would ever attract. A college the size of Glenville will probably never excel in the major sports, due to the student population.

Baseball is slowly but surely improving its performance, both down South and in the conference. They really deserve more financial and moral

The majority of students on campus would rather see more money poured into winners than losers. Remaining, though, is the argument: basketball and football are large spectator sports. In one sense they are, but on the Glenville campus and community it is not that big of a deal, with the exception of Fairmont basketball in town.

Economics is the biggest factor at issue. Where can more money come from? How could existing funds be reallocated to better the minor sports? Small sports deserve more financial and student support than they have received. They deserve the right to excel as they proved they can. Give them a chance by urging changes and seeking enthusiasm today.

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

# Year End Baseball **Statistics Released**

Final statistics for the 1979 GSC baseball season have been released.

The Pioneers finished with a 5-11 record in the conference and 5-17

In the hitting department Gary Jones finished with a .418 batting average with 26 hits in 63 plate appearances. Joedy Moots led the team in runs batted in with 19, to go along with a .308 batting average and three home runs.

Fred Smith also hit for a good average, .293, with eight RBI's and a team leading two triples. Dale Stover batted only .227 but led the team in runs scored with 12. Ted Valentine hit .273 and led the team with 14 base on balls.

As a team, the Pioneers hit .258 compared with .305 for the opponents. GSC scored 86 runs to the opponents 173. The hits were much closer though, 150 for GSC to 191 for the opponents.
