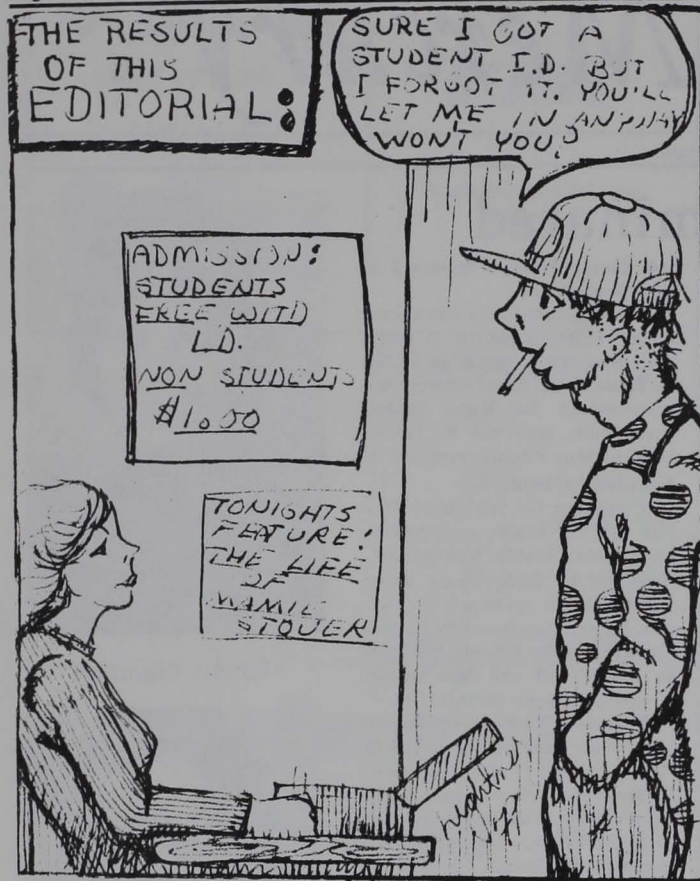

Some of those movies we can look forward to are: Heaven Can Wait, Jaws, Every Which Way But Loose, Midnight Express, Up In Smoke, Eyes of Laura Mars, Capricorn One, and Close Encounters of the Third Kind.

Along with all this good there is some bad. Wednesday nights are not convenient for everyone. But then again, no night would be good for everyone. But the worst thing about the movies is the difficulty of hearing them. The sound system in the auditorium is less than fantastic, and it's even harder to hear when there are little children running around and crying.

The movie posters always say "Free with I.D.," but no one ever checks I.D.'s. GSC students are being ripped off. We pay for these movies from the fees we pay at the beginning of each semester. Driving Range Is Reality, Paving Planned

A contract has been completed with Central General Inc. of Vienna, W. Va., for construction of a driving range to be located behind the Forestry Building. Work begins Sept. 4 on the Board of Regents approved project.

The project, a joint venture between the college and the Gilmer County Board of Education (made possible by a grant from the Governor's Highway Safety Commission to the county), will consist of two acres blacktop, block, and control tower, one of few such ranges in the state.

The range, which has been planned for better than three years, will be used to train safety instructors, motorcycle drivers, and

to teach students how to drive. The accepted bid was for \$109,000 and was the lowest.

It is hoped that by next year, the tons of gravel that have been laying in heaps next to Pickens Hall will be placed on the parking lot. President Simmons also relayed hope that this lot might be paved by next year. The trouble has been in securing funds to have the work done. The piles of gravel have certainly added to the parking space shortage as they steal a full row of potential spaces.

Something else to be watching for is the refurbishing of the Science Building. An estimated \$300,000 worth of furnishings and materials have been agreed upon, and everything will be replaced. One of the lecture rooms has been completely carpeted and re-furnished. Two more such rooms are being planned. The final selecting of furniture will be done soon, and all of this work should be completed within the academic year.

The ailing Eberly Hall will also receive monies to fix a number of leaking problems, due to insufficient roof support and a menacing spring located under the building. The problem with the roof is an architectural one. Evidently, the supports are made of wood, and should be replaced by steel.

If you are thoroughly familiar with the campus of Glenville State College, you are aware of the fact that it is receiving a partial face-lift with the help of 200 yards of concrete purchased just for that purpose. It is all part of the Phase I grounds improvement, implemented by President William F. Simmons. According to President Simmons, four men have been employed full-time for five weeks to do much needed general concrete work on sidewalks and steps. The steps of Clark Hall are the most noticeable improvements. An architect has been hired to see about repairing the curving steps of the Health and Physical Education Building. The next big project will be the paving of most major park-

ing lots, including the new one on the site of old Verona Mapel Hall.

Mr. C. McDonald Joins GSC Faculty

In addition to faculty members profiled in the last issue of the Mercury, Mr. Craig McDonald has joined the GSC faculty. Mr. McDonald, a member of the Language Division, is from Charlotte, N. C.

He holds a Bachelor's degree in English from Davidson College, Master's degree from William and Mary, and is completing his doctorate at the University of York where he served as a graduate assistant in English.

Mr. McDonald commented, "I like this place very much. I'm partial to the mountains."

Mr. McDonald, his wife Karen and one-year old daughter Kate, reside in College Park.

Bev Hamric Is Awarded Scholarship

Bev Hamric, a senior Business Education major, has been awarded an academic scholarship from the Southern Region of the National Business Education Association. Bev will represent W. Va. at the NBEA national convention in Birmingham, Alabama on November 20-24.

Bev is the first GSC student to win the scholarship. She was awarded the scholarship based on her academic record, college activities, and a 300 word essay entitled, "Why I Want to Become a Business Education Instructor."

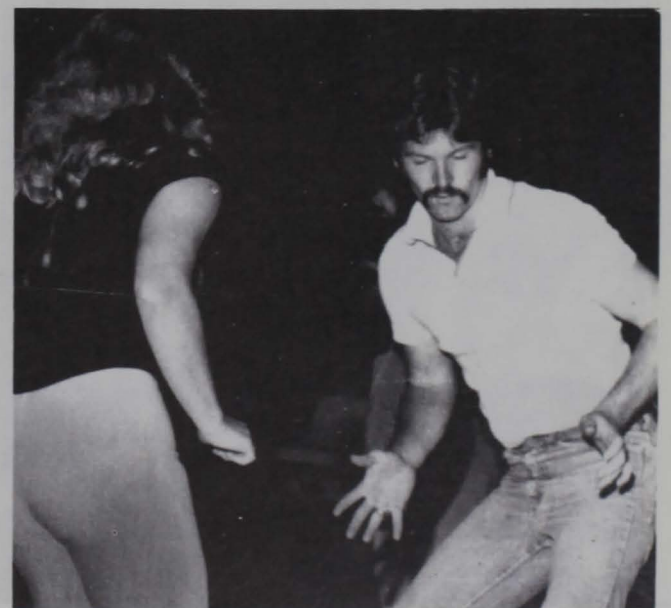

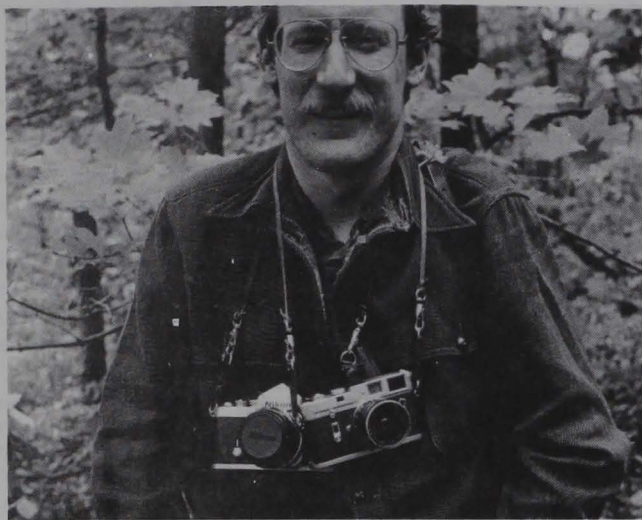

Graduate Displays Photography

Robert Cooper, an art major from Glenville State College, recently presented his work during the month of August at the prestigious International Center of Photography in New York City. His exhibition was entitled *Appalachia: A Self-Portrait*. The exhibition coincided with the August publication of a book by the same name. The book consists of 75 photographs.

Both the book and the exhibit were funded by grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and The Appalachian Regional Commission. The book is a culmination of a three-year effort by seven photographers to examine the Appalachian Region on a personal level. Each photographer chose a subject close to his own experience. Cooper chose Gilmer County where he lived for seven years (including his college years).

Almost all of the group are native or resident Appalachians and the photography is concerned entirely with the mountain region. The book's foreword is provided by Harvard's Robert Coles, author of the *Children of Crisis* series. The introduction is by Loyal Jones, director of the Appalachian Center at

Berea College.

Besides being shown at the International Center, Cooper's exhibit was shown at Wheeling's Stifle Art Center, the Huntington Galleries and the Eleventh Street Photo Gallery in New York City. The exhibit is available to colleges, libraries, galleries and museums in West Virginia and elsewhere. If interested, you can contact Wendy Ewald, Appalshop Inc., Whitesburg, Kentucky 41858. Cooper's family has lived in Cox's Mill, Auburn and Glenville for 6 generations. He began recording life in Gilmer County in 1966 while a student at GSC. Between 1974 and 1976 he operated a portrait and wedding photography studio on Main Street in Glenville.

He is now collecting and archiving old photographs and oral history under grant from the West Virginia Library Commission. He has a Bachelor of Arts in Education Degree with a major in Art from Glenville State College.

He is currently teaching a photography class at Braxton County High School.

Mr. Drahnak stated that he had a million ideas about improving the food facilities at GSC, but if the students did not accept them they would not work.

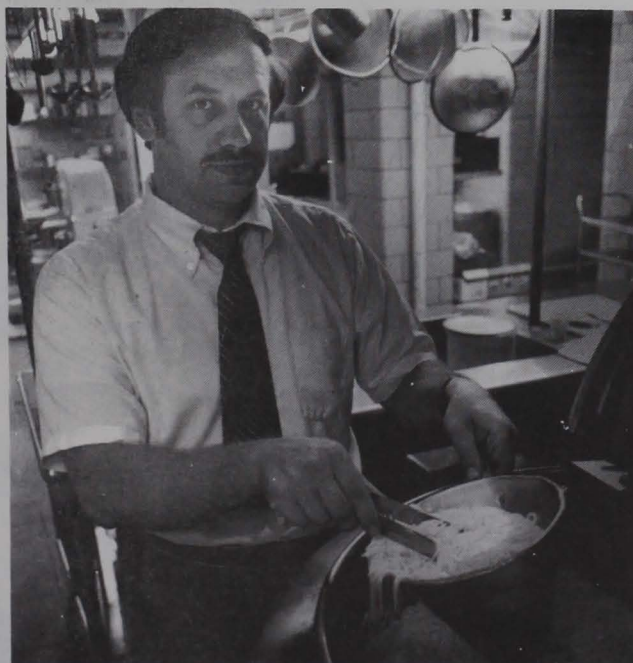

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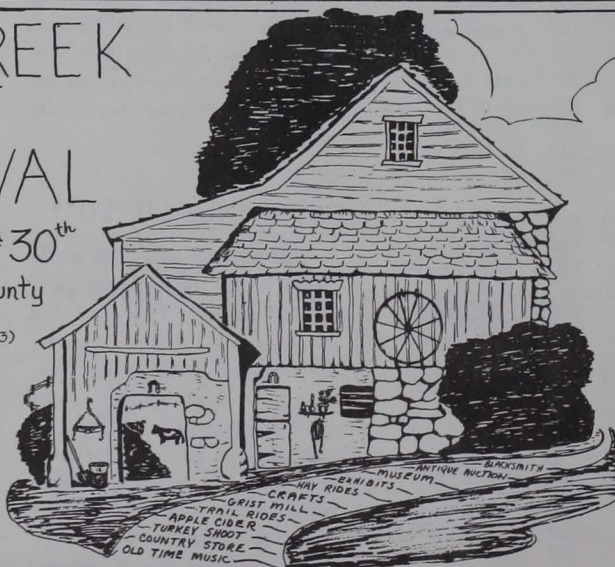
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
