

GSC To Host BOR Meeting

Glenville State College will host the West Virginia Board of Regents Monday and Tuesday, October 1-2 for the Board's regular monthly meeting. Their last GSC-based meeting was held in 1974.

Due to arrive on campus around noon on Monday, the Board will meet with college administrative officials at 1 p.m. in the Vandalia Room, Pioneer Center. This will be followed by a tour of the campus and a work session from 2:45 until 4 p.m. when they will meet with faculty in the Verona Mapel Room.

The President's Home will be the setting for refreshments at 6 p.m., which precedes a dinner in the ballroom with President and Mrs. Simmons, as well as other administrative staff members. Mr. Nelson Wells, 1979 Alumni Service Award winner, will present a slide show of Glenville State College through the years.

Tuesday's agenda calls for an Executive Session until ll a.m. when students alone will have an opportunity to meet with the Board of Regents in the Ballroom.

Following a luncheon in the Verona Mapel Room, Student Congress and the Executive Committee of Faculty-Administrative Organization will convene with the BOR in the Ballroom. This will be followed by a meeting with classified employees, also in the Ballroom.

From 2:45 until 4 p.m., faculty, staff and students will gather for a presentation of the Board of Regents' 'Profiles of Progress', a higher education planning document.

Concluding the two day event, a dinner with college personnel, education leaders, community and business leaders, legislative appointees and media representatives will be held. At this time, Chancellor Morton will discuss the 'Profiles of Progress' plan and President Simmons will discuss Glenville State's role and scope in the 'Profiles.'

Students are urged to attend any session open to them, as this is an unique opportunity to see and talk with the Board of Regents which governs the state colleges of West Virginia.

Among priority. items to be discussed by the thirteen-member Board is the arrangement between Glenville State College-Gilmer County Board of Education concerning leasing of Rohrbough Field.

Three Participate in Internships

The Public Service Internship Program of the West Virginia Board of Regents has 12 college students participating during the Fall 1979 semester.

The students are assigned to agencies, and receive on-the-job experience which complements campus study. Students receive from 12 to 15 credit hours for the internship, as well as a stipend as a result of a \$45,000 grant for the program from the Governor's office. Students from Glenville State College are Perry Coe, State Tax Department, Michael Farber, State Supreme Court, and Edward Radcliff, Office of the Secretary of State.

The internship program, started in 1975, is open to public and private college and university juniors and seniors. Students interested in participating in the program may contact their campus coordinator.





Pioneers To Battle Hilltoppers In Homecoming Brady Honored As Montrose Winner



Jim Brady has been named the 1979 Frank Montrose Award winner. Brady is being recognized for his outstanding performance in golf while at GSC.

Jim is from Olean, New York, and graduated from GSC with a 3.56 grade point average. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration with concentrations in the fields of accounting, finance, and economics.

Brady was a regular for the GSC golfing squad all four years, and played on three conference championship teams. He was named to the All-conference team last year, and earned medalist honors twice in his career at GSC. One medal was received at the Southern Regional Golf Tournament at Pipestem State Park last spring, and the other was in the Glenville State College Fall Tournament, which was held last September.

Golf Coach Tim Carney described Jim as someone who was "not only an excellent golfer, but also a very fine young man. He was well respected by his teammates."

The Montrose Award is given annually to a senior GSC athelete who possesses outstanding academic skills, as well as athletic ability. This award originated in 1952 in honor of Frank Montrose.

Montrose came to Glenville State, as a student, in the fall of 1939. After the pre-season football practices had ended, and the regular football season had started, Montrose had proved to be a very promising quarterback. Montrose never really got a chance to prove himself until the sixth game of the season, when the Pioneers' head coach, Nate Pohrbough, started playing his freshmen and reserves. Montrose turned the seemingly beaten Pioneers around, and led them to their third win of the season.

Glenville, under their new starting quarterback, played arch-rival, Fairmont, the next week and upset them by a very deciding margin of 27-8. In the game, Montrose ran for his first college touchdown, a 63 yard punt return.

The next week, Glenville played Potomac State in the season's final. Behind the leadership of freshman Montrose, the Pioneers won 7-0 and ended their season 5-2-1

Although only starting in two games, and seeing very little action in the first five games, Montrose was stricken with nephritis, and he later lost his eyesight. He had to drop out of college, which ended a short but great GSC football career.

On June 21, 1940, Frank Montrose died at the age of 21.

In 1952, Student Congress initiated the annual Frank Montrose Award in honor of this man. Jim Brady is the twenty-seventh recipient of this award, and the last of the seventies. He joins these winners of the 1970's:

Harold Wicks of State ran for two touchdowns and passed for the third score to raise their conference record to 2-0.

Wicks ran for 13 yards for a touchdown in the first period, giving State a 6-0 half time lead. In the third period Wicks threw a 48 yard pass to Terry Atkinson for a touchdown and ran 63 yards for the final touchdown of the game to shut the Pioneers out.

GSC's Terry Spangler had 4 completions in 24 attempts.

This is an open single elimination tournament. Trophies will be awarded to each of the first and second place finishers. Tennis balls will be sold at
