Excessive absence reports, mid-term grades, and evaluations are returned all too often marked "not in dorm," or "moved off-campus." The Registrar is then at a loss as to how to find the errant student. Then the student

As of right now, today, tomorrow and for the season, Whitey Adolfson is car head football coach. But what will happen at the season's end? In the midst of another controversial fiasco, we find a few irregularities surfacing.

First, if Whitey Adolfson has been, will be or might be fired, why is it being hushed up or covered up? If Adolfson is to be fired, nothing should have been said till the season's end. We at least should remain supportive through the season's end. Only at the season's end should a reorganization occur. As students, faculty, administration and Glenville residents, we should back Coach Adolfson and the football team to the end. Whenever it may be.....
