She has been employed at the l Daily Athenaeum, WVU's newspaper; the State Department of Highways, where she served as public information officer and most recently Southern West Virginia Community Col-lege in Logan, where she served as assistant to the president.

The new director stressed her objectives for alumni affairs to concern streamlining the office to get more graduates involved in the Association. She would like to establish strong active chapters throughout this state, especially in the panhandle area, and in adjoining states as well. She hopes to raise more monies to help students through alumni scholarships.

As far as public relations is concerned, Ms. Pavlidies may be our best supporter. She stated that she "loves the area, and the college

care." She encourages visitors to come to her office, and urges all college personnel to inform her of news events, meetings, and/or honors so that she can arrange for releases and coverage.

Hopefully, her work will be simplified by the establishing of a more thorough news service bureau for the college. She also hopes to establish a Speakers' Bureau, or Monthly Forum. 

The GSC Pioneers opened the first home game by handing 3-0 WV State a 83-64 loss.

Phillip Thomas and Mike Forbes led the Pioneers to their first win of the season to give the Pioneers a 1-1 record.

Thomas scored 26 points and had 15 rebounds followed by Forbes' 22 points. Don Bullet added 14 points and seven assists to the Pioneer efforts.

The Pioneers led at halftime by 40-29 and kept their lead although State kept closing up the point spread throughout the second half. The Pioneers shot 45% from the floor while State connected 39%.

The Pioneers will travel to Wheeling tonight for the Wheeling Tournament and will play the first round with West Liberty.

Ladies Defeat State

The Lady Pioneers opened their 1979-80 women's basketball season when they defeated WV State 78-55.

During the first 30 minutes of the game, the Lady Pioneers' press caused State turnovers, which allowed the Pioneers to jump on top and finish the game unthreatened. Pam Minighled GSC's scoring with 14 points, Debbie Grogg scored six and Sally Haught netted five.

WV State led rebounds, 52-57, and GSC hit 34% of its field goal attempts to State's 27%.






