Carters To Appear

Anybody who knows anything about country music knows that it all began with the Carter family. Maybelle, Sara, and A. P. Carter were among the first to successfully commercialize the simple mountain songs and expose them to a national audience. No family in America has had such an influence on the preservation and appreciation of the early mountain and traditional music. The Carter family made their first recording for RCA Victor on Aug. 1, 1927 and they have been a major influence in country music since then.

The songs that they recorded in those early days are now known internationally. "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," "Keep on the Sunny Side," and "Wildwood Flower," are known by just about everybody. Maybelle's guitar picking on the "Wildwood Flower" became an example for every young guitar picker in America.

Two of the second generation Carter girls, Jeanette and Helen, will present a program of Carter Family music on Wed., Feb. 6, at 8 p.m., at the Glenville State College auditorium. Jeanette is the youngest daughter of A. P. and Sara Carter and Helen is Maybelle's daughter. It will be a simple program where the girls, playing guitar and auto-harp, will try to do the songs as they were originally done.

There will be an admission charge of \$1 for non-students. The program is being sponsored by the Cultural Affairs Committee.

Requirements for membership in the chapter are twenty or more hours in Social Science, a minimum of B average, and placement within the top one-third of your class.

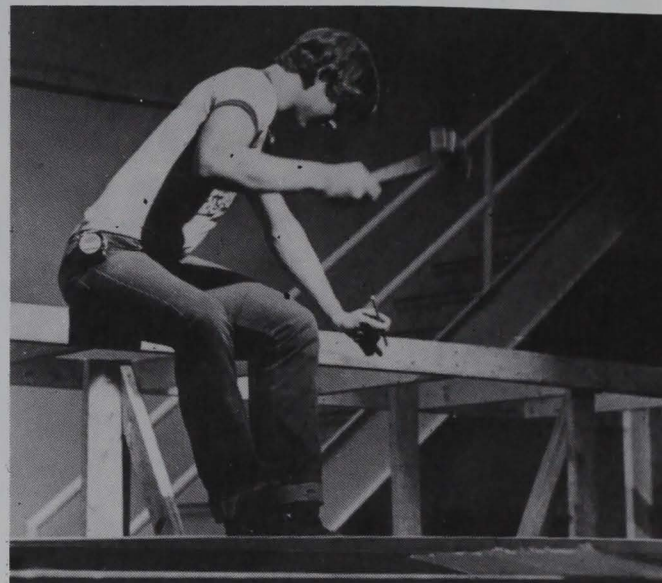
The Chapter will have a banquet for the inauguration of officers and chapter members on Sunday, Feb. 3, in Verona Maple Room. The President and the Dean of the college have been invited to attend the banquet.

Guest speaker that day will be Dr. Patricia Ryan, Professor of Political

Science at Fairmont State College. Her topic will be "The Role of the Clergy in the Iranian Revolution." A discussion period will follow.

The Chapter inauguration will be performed by Chapter Governess, Jo Ann Van Horn, Professor of History at Fairmont State College.

The program committee has scheduled several events for this semester. Guest lecturer, Dr. Peter Metcalfe, from the Dept. of Anthropology at the University of Virginia, will lecture on Cultural Anthropology. He did research on death and dying in Borneo, and tribal policies in Borneo and Oceania. An Exxon representative will give a symposium in March. These activities will be open to the public. Dr. Hymes said, "The intent of Pi Gamma Mu is to bring to students relevance of Social Science and meet first-hand professional people."

The other Glenville State graduate is teaching in the Business Dept.

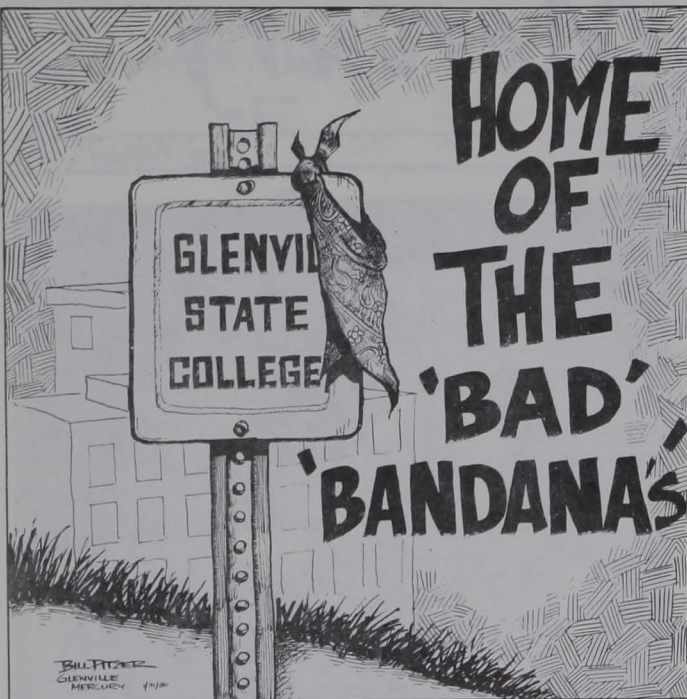

New Cafeteria Program Planned

Do you ever get tired of eating in the cafeteria, standing in the long lines, or missing lunch because of a rough schedule? Well, a "purely experimental" program is now in the planning stages for an alternative to eating in the cafeteria. The plan was announced by Joe Drahnak, Food Service Director, who hopes to have the pilot program in operation by March 2, 1980.

The basic outline of the program is as follows: food service will set up different operating units that will offer service at different times of the day. Students in this program will have the option of eating in the cafeteria or in other units. Participating students will have to carry their I.D. card plus a book of coupons in order to eat in the

cafeteria or in the other units. The coupon book will have tickets in it with different denomination amounts on items. (Example: \$1-.50-.25-.10). The dollar value of the coupon book will be based on what it costs a week to be on the boarding plan. In order to eat in the cafeteria or other units, the coupon ticket will be taken from the book at the time of the purchase. Mr. Drahnak stated also that this program, if successful, would be open to commuting students as well as residents.

Mr. Drahnak has set up systems similar to this one, and found them to be "very successful." However, the success of such a program will be determined by student support.

The Glenville Pioneers fell victim to the Fairmont State College Falcons on Thursday, Jan. 24, at the Glenville College gymnasium.

The game was very close scoring-wise as neither team obtained more than a 3 point lead during the first half. With 13 minutes left, the Falcons had a 6 point advantage but the Pioneers pulled close with 8:40 remaining with a score of 42-

37. They were to come no closer as they dropped to a 7-8 overall record.

The Pioneers had a total of 26 rebounds with 15 defensive and 11 offensive. Phillip Thomas led in scoring with 22 points, Don Bullet had 10, Randy Anderson and Paul Wills had 4 apiece and Ernie Gilliard swished 2.

The Lady Pioneers marked their ninth win out of ten outings as they blasted WV Tech by a score of 78-35.

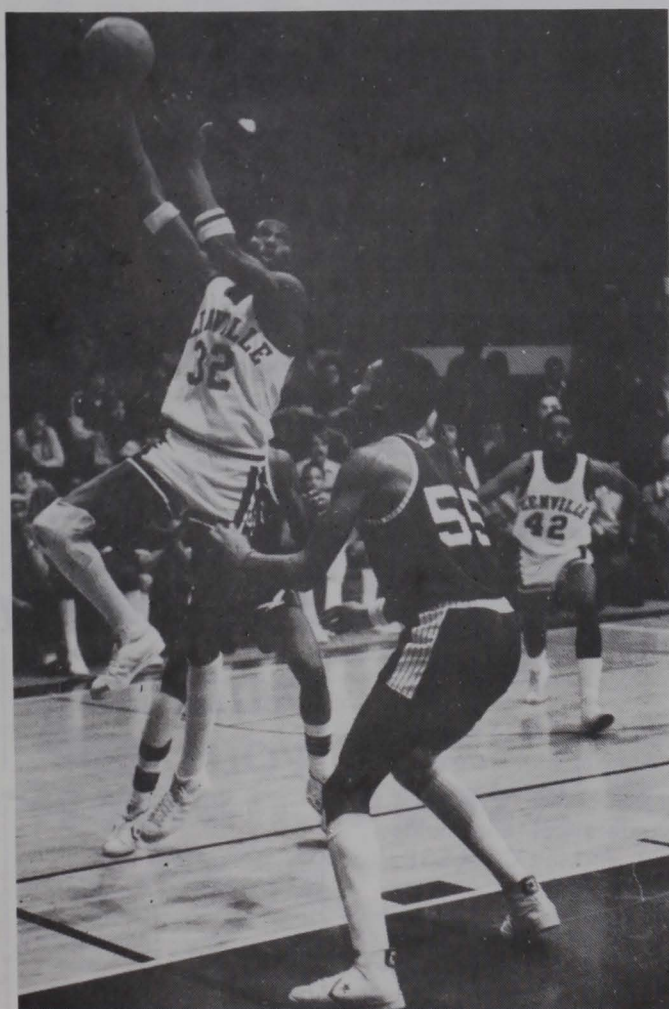
The Pioneers had a 59-45 edge in rebounds and shot 45 percent from the floor.

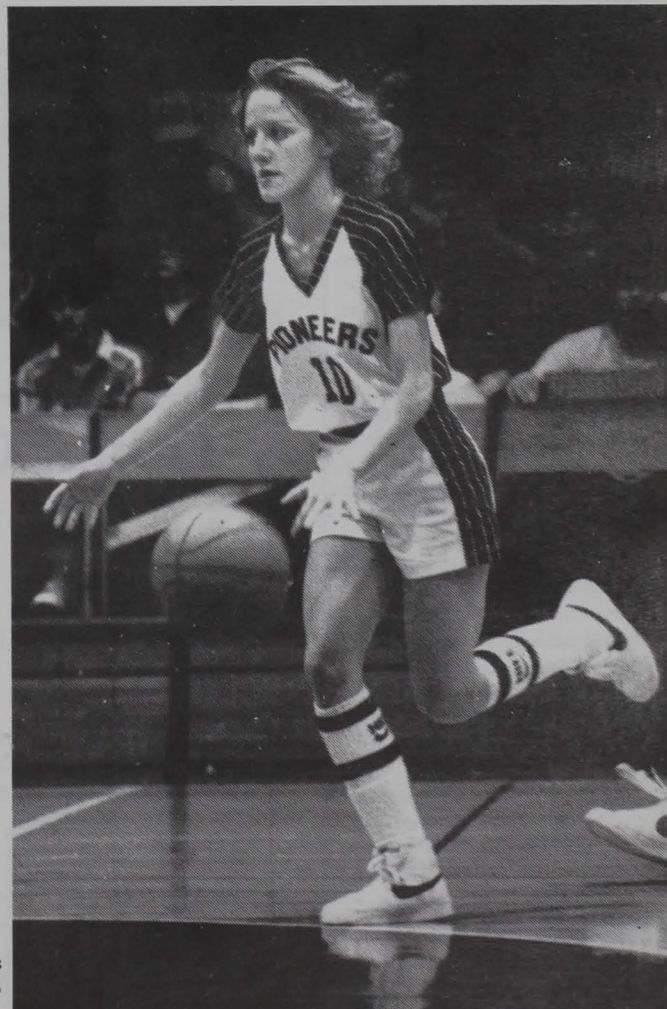
6 each and Lisa Pleasant and Sally Haught scored 4 points each.
