## GSC Week Draws Near

It's almost here! Yes, the first-ever "Glenville State College Week" will begin Wednesday, April 23. A variety of activities, for students and faculty, have been planned for the four-day event. Dean John Vaughn has stated, "Everybody that leaves campus that weekend doesn't need to come back." Governor John D. Rockefeller IV has proclaimed April 20 through 26 officially as "Glenville State College Week."

The Department of Natural Resources will be sponsoring a wildlife exhibit in the parking lot next to the print shop on Wednesday. Also planned for Wednesday is a banner contest. The top three winners in the banner competition will be given pizza parties. The contest is open to all Sororities, Fraternities, clubs and individual residence hall floors. Banners should be displayed on a campus building Wednesday through Friday.

Bluegrass lovers and arts and crafts buffs will be kept busy Thursday. A wide range of musicians will be performing in the amphitheatre from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Musicians include Rick Roberts, College Musician in Residence; Buddy Griffin, Braxton Co.; Frank George, Roane Co.; Pat Shields, Mineral Co.; Kathy Fink, Washington D.C.; Jerry Milnes, Nicholas Co.; Allan Freeman, Calhoun Co.; Ted Samples, Clay Co.; Frank Beall, Gilmer Co.; and Melvin

Arts and crafts exhibitors will include: Ouk Hoa Chonol, paintings; Mary Eastman, leather crafts; Connie Emerson, stuffed dolls and animals, quilted placemats; Lorene Hardman, ceramics; Linda Jones, paintings, Donald Kelble, copper crafts; Lucille Messenger, quilts and shell crafts; Gary Schaffer, pottery; Melody Wilt, weaving. There are still available stalls for exhibitors, interested people should contact Dean John Vaughn in the Student Affairs Office. These crafts will be exhibited and demonstrated from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. near the amphitheatre.

A buffet-style family dinner will be served by Food Services in the Ballroom, Thursday from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. All GSC staff, faculty and students are invited to attend. The price for non-dorm residents will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children under 12. The menu will include baked ham, fried chicken, ramps, brown beans, corn bread, salad, and homemade apple pie. After the meal a karate demonstration will be given at 7:00 p.m. in the ballroom. This is sponsored by Chi Beta Phi.

Events lined up for Friday will include a doughnut eating contest at 12 noon in the amphitheatre. All contestants are urged to sign up in advance, and the winner will receive a

pizza party. Also slated for Friday is a presentation to Coach Jesse Lilly by A. James Manchin, Secretary of State. Mr. Manchin will be presenting Coach Lilly with an award for winning over 200 Conference basketball games.

The first scheduled Friday night activity will be taking place from 8:30 to 11:30 p.m. in the Ballroom. The D.J. dance will be featuring Tom Wheeler. Beer and other beverages will be served.

"Glenville State College Week" will be winding up for the main event, which will be a Field Day to be held Saturday, beginning 10:30 a.m. Ribbons will be awarded to the first five finishers in each race, and the decision of the judges will be final. A regular brunch will be served at the college cafeteria, however, hot dogs, chips, cokes will be served at the football field from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The evening meal will not be served at the cafeteria. An outside barbecue will be held from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. The menu includes: Barbecue chicken, barbecue spare ribs, baked beans, potato salad, rolls, watermelon, and ice cream. An awards ceremony will be held immediately following the meal. During the awards ceremony ribbons and mugs will be given out. A free GSC Field Day Mug will be given to all

## Delegate Spears Visits Campus

Delegate Jae Spears visited the GSC campus April 16, at the invitation of Dr. Talbott. She addressed Dr. Joe Darnell's State and Local Government class and Mr. Bill Roberts Social Work class.

Delegate Spears was an elementary teacher in WV and Japan. She also worked as a news reporter and women's feature writer on the Cincinnati Post and Cincinnati Enquirer. In 1964, Jae married a serviceman and traveled with him until they settled in Elkins and raised four children.

April 16, Delegate Spears toured the Dublin Cannery before arriving at Glenville. "I want to be able to relate to the problems of people of my district; see, experience and know how they feel," she stated.

Six years ago she won her seat in the legislature by 29 votes. Now she is running in the primary for

State Senator. If she wins, she will be the first Democratic woman to win a four year term in the 12th district. If she wins, it will also be the first time for two women to serve in the Senate at the same time. Judith Herndon of Wheeling is the other woman Senator.

"She makes things happen," is her slogan. In 1980, Delegate Spears had eight of her bills pass the House of Representatives and five of these became laws. As a member of the Finance Committee, she saw one of the tightest budgets go through the 1980 legislative session since she has been on the committee. She was appointed to WVU's visiting committee "Advisory Board" for extension and continuing education in the state. "I am all for continuing education and hope to see everyone take full advantage of a broader education," Delegate Spears concluded.

## Forensics Team Set For Nationals

The GSC Forensic Team has finished their regular season and are now gearing up for the National Forensic Meet, April 23-29, in Birmingham, Alabama at the University of Montevallo.

Forensic coach, Barbara Nicholson, began the season with eleven team members, all novices, which means they were beginners in college forensics. All the forensic tournaments, with the exception of one, were varsity tournaments, meaning that the GSC team was competing

with veterans. Six out of eleven members qualified for the Nationals. This is done by finaling in their respective categories. Mrs. Nicholson felt that this was phenomenal, as they were competing against varsity teams. She is also proud of these individuals

and excited about the Nationals.

Qualifying for the Nationals are Eddie Harbert and Tom Davisson, Informative Speaking; Jennifer Chisler, Persuasive Speaking; Tim Brady and Nancy Sutton, Dramatic Duo; and Kent Woofert, Prose Interpretation.

Mrs. Nicholson feels everyone did an exceptional job and has high praise for the team members who did not qualify for the nationals. They are Cindy Stewart, Melody McHenry, Fran Davis, Cathy Sullivan and Lorrie Price.

The novice GSC forensic team, with coach Barbara Nicholson, should be commended for the fantastic job they have done. With this year behind them, they should be unstoppable next year. Good luck in the Nationals!

The Drama Department would appreciate the cooperation of students who park on High Street in Parking Lot I, located below LBH and the

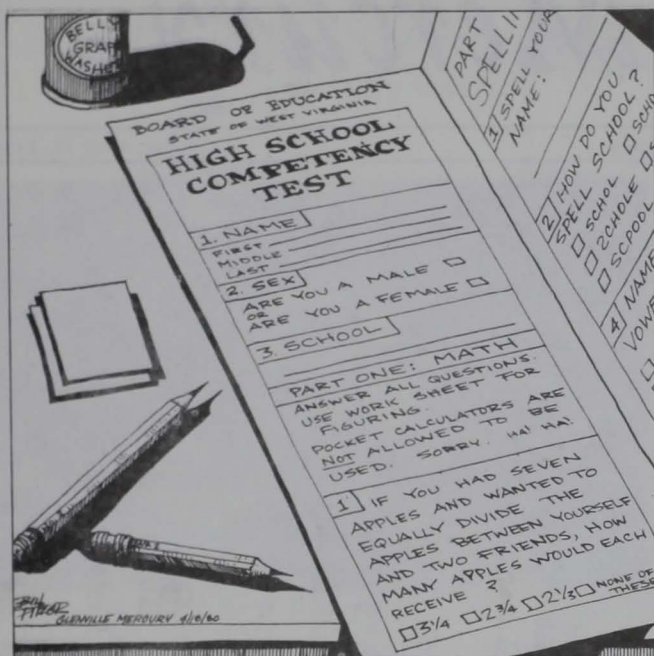
Administration Building as it will be used to park the buses transporting the grade school students. The campus Security Police will be

## Graduation Credits Changed

The debate over the quality and quantity of education has no doubt been raging ever since the first integral calculus problem was chiseled into a slab of granite. But within the past several years the scope and intensity of the endless argument has mushroomed.

As future educators, many of you are going to be directly involved in important decisions that will govern the course of education for years to come. You will have to decide what and how our children will try desperately to learn. Will we return to the basic 3 R's; continue with what programs that seem, according to numerous studies, not to be successful in educating the young?

The following is a member of proposals that the state Board of Education has recommended be studied and eventually be instituted in the high school system. See if you agree.

Seventeen credits are now needed to graduate, 10 are required courses and seven are electives. The plan would up that to 20, making students take 13½ required courses and 6½ electives.

It will require, as now, four units in English, but at least two will have to be in language skills development, such as composition, grammar and reading skills.

During the second semester of the 9th grade a competency test will be given to determine proficiency in composition and reading. Students who do not demonstrate proficiency shall take classes each year until they master the test. They can graduate without passing the competency test, but will have to repeat any area of weakness they have.

One unit of math is now required with a second for college-bound students. The change will require all students to take two units of math. A competency test will be given in the first semester of the 8th grade. A person passing that will be allowed to take courses from total range offered; those who don't will have to take a general math course in the 9th grade and take the competency test again. If they fail again, they'll have to take a course in personal finance in 10th grade.

Science: one unit now required with a second for college. The new requirement would have all students taking 1½ units of science; one shall be biology or life science and the half in physical science.

The changes would up from three to four the social studies requirements and require the courses to be in civics-government, economic principles and theory, American history and world culture.

Each person will be required 1½ units in physical education.

In addition, students will be advised to choose a career-oriented education program. The basic pattern will call for the required 13½ units; plus one-half unit in physical science; two in foreign languages and four in electives.

Fifteen of the 20 units must be earned in grades 10, 11, and 12.

### Phi Beta Lambda

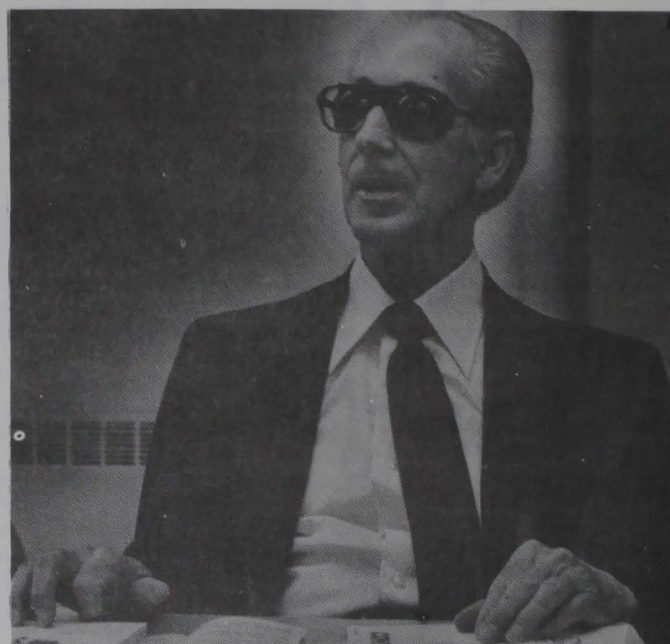

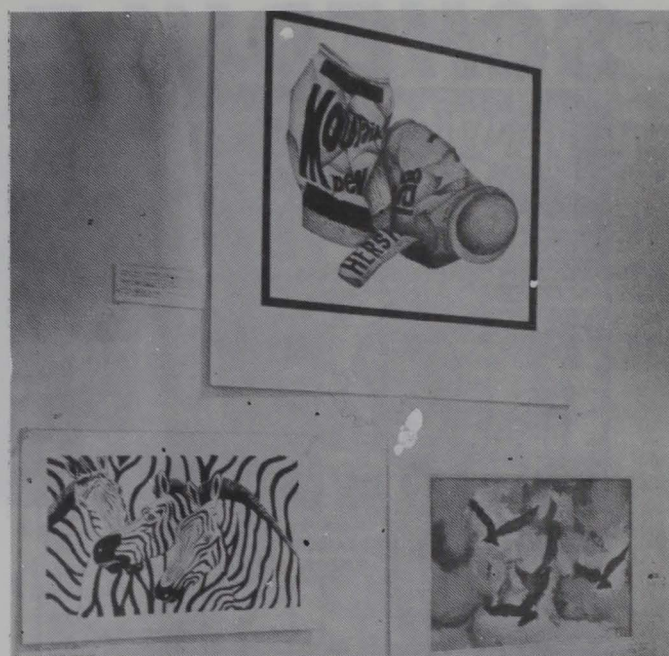
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## RA Programs Scheduled

## Jones Publishes 2nd Book

Dr. James Gay Jones of Glenville has published his second book, **Haunted Valley**. The book is a collection of ghost stories, folktales, and legends of southern Appalachia and was published in June of 1979 by McClain Printing Company, Parsons, West Virginia.

Dr. Jones first book, **Appalachian Ghost Stories and Other Tales**, was published in 1975 by McClain Printing Company.

Dr. Jones, because of his two books on the Appalachian culture, received the West Virginia Library Association Literary Award in October of 1979. He was selected as author of the year and, as a result, was interviewed by phone by a radio station in Ontario, Canada. Dr. Jones has also received comments on his books, through letters and phone calls, from people in 21 states.

Dr. Jones spoke to the Mass Media class on book publishing. He discussed the cost of publishing, awards he has received and told the class that both books are written from stories he has collected over the years from students at Glenville State College and residents of this area.

Dr. Jones is a native West Virginian, born in Walton, Roane County. He grew up in that area and then attended Glenville State College where he received his AB in history in 1936. In 1946, he received his Masters Degree from WVU and in 1952, was the recipient of the 5th history Ph.D. ever awarded

by WVU.

His teaching has reached all levels of the school system. Starting in one-room rural schools, he has worked his way to the University level. During World War II he was the director of a special training school for the US Army. Later, he became an instructor of history, first at New York University and then at West Virginia University. Finally, he ended his teaching career at Glenville State College in 1975 after teaching here for 27 years.

Besides his years of teaching and collecting folktales, Dr. Jones has several writing achievements. Selections from his doctoral dissertation "West Virginia in World War II" were included in **The Thirty-Fifth State** by Comette and Summers. He has served as a research consultant for the book **West Virginia U.S.A.**, and has contributed many articles to the **West Virginia Heritage Encyclopedia** and the **World Book Encyclopedia**. He also co-authored the article on West Virginia in the **World Book** and has assisted in its revision during the past 15 years.

Dr. Jones has done a splendid job in helping to preserve Appalachian culture with his two books. All the stories are from this area and, by reading these stories, it is easy and fun to learn about local history. Dr. Jones is to be commended on the delightful way he has put them together.

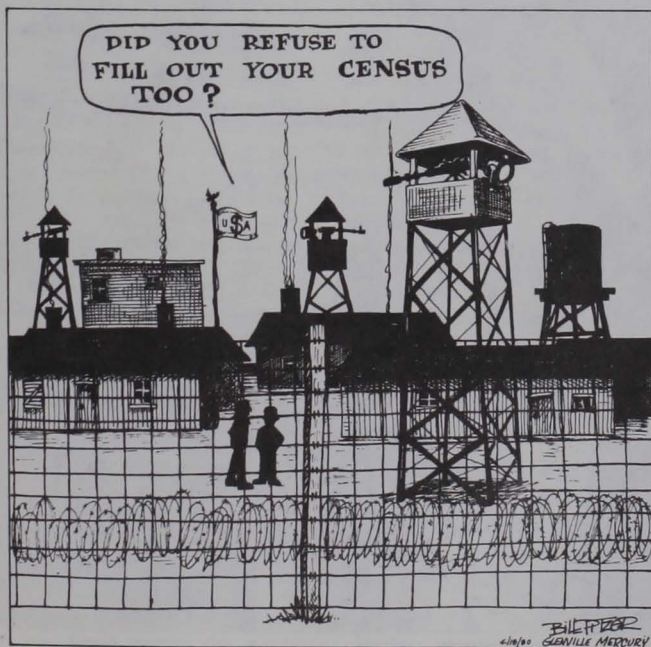

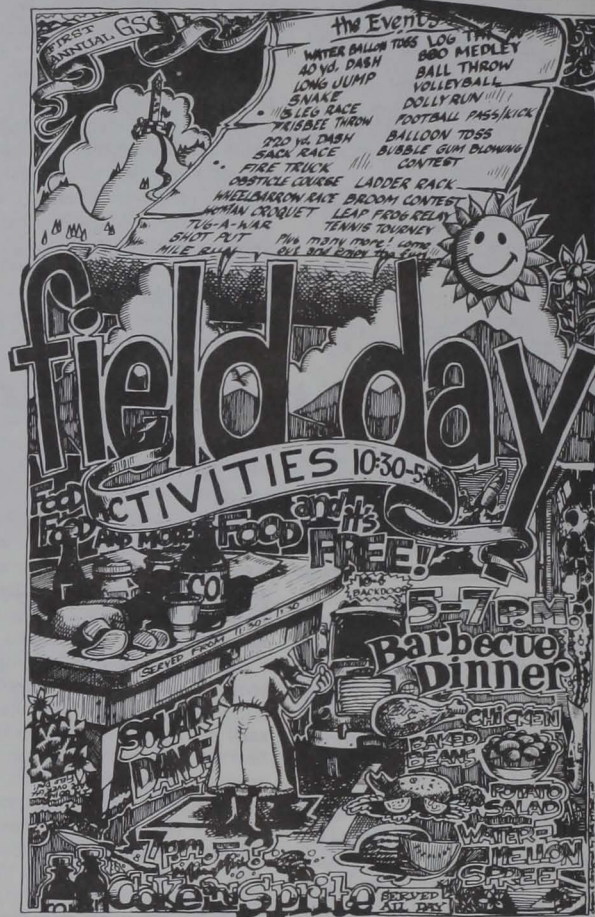

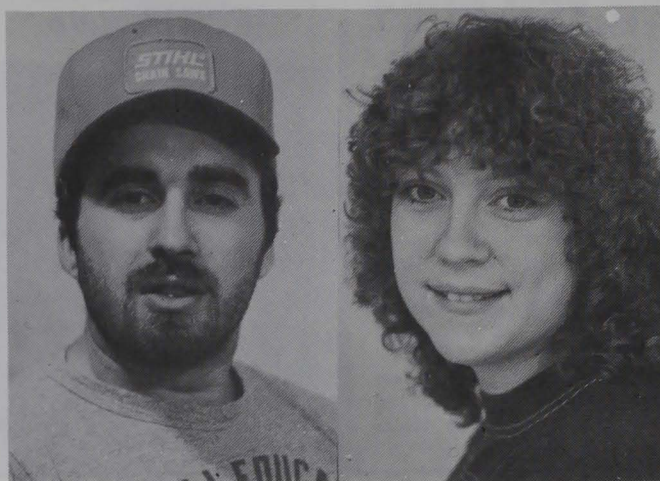
