The GSC Concert band, under the direction of Mr. Ed McKown, will give the processional and recessional music for Commencement. Also special performances will be given by the band and choir. The choir is under the direction of Dr. Raymond Jones.

Mrs. Rockefeller is a 1966 graduate of Stanford University, California, where she graduated cum laude with an A.B. degree in French Literature. She was also enrolled in West Virginia Wesleyan and Morris Harvey College from 1971 to 1975.

Mrs. Rockefeller is currently a member of many national organizations such as: Co-chairperson ERAmerica; Women's Research and Education Institute; Board of Directors, Corporation for Public Broadcasting; and Advisory Board, National Women's Caucus. Her West Virginia activities include: Honorary Chairman of the West Virginia International Year of the Child; Board of Directors, West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority; and Charleston Symphony Women's Auxiliary.

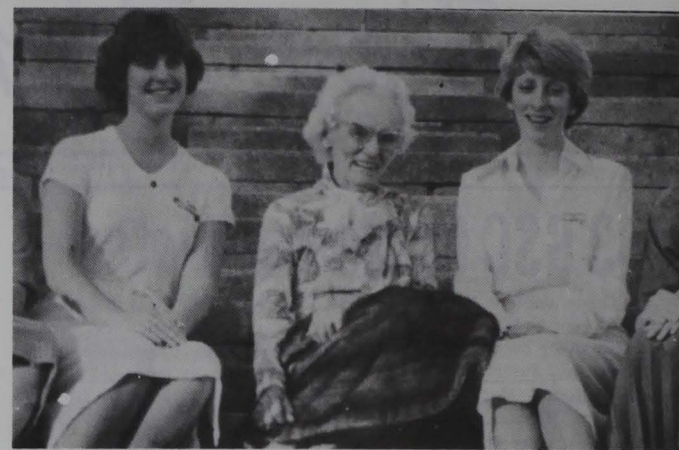
DELTA ZETA

Alumnus Winner Honored

A man who has devoted his entire life to the service and needs of West Virginia will be honored as the Glenville State College Alumnus-of-the-Year on May 17, 1980.

Earl Wilson Wolfe, director of the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation graduated from GSC in 1938 with an A.B. degree in secondary education. He attained a master of social work at the University of Pittsburgh with post graduate work at the University of Oklahoma, New York University and the West Virginia College of Graduate Studies.

Wolfe has devoted his life to service. While in the Army, Wolfe was involved with the direction of physical and educational reconditioning of disabled servicemen. Prior to entering the armed forces Wolfe has worked with the Department of Public Assistance and became county director of the Gilmer County department.

After the war, he continued with the Department of Public Assistance and advanced through many offices with numerous promotions, all of which his goal was to render service to those needing and entitled to public assistance.

Nearly 25 years ago Wolfe became affiliated with the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. He has gained national exposure for developing effective and innovating services for the handicapped. These services are exemplified in the special programs for the retarded, the blind,

the handicapped in depressed areas, the handicapped in state government, handicapped Welfare recipients, the elimination of structural barriers for the disabled and handicapped in penal institutions and the use of half-way houses in the rehabilitation of the mentally retarded.

As a leader and active member in many public and voluntary organizations, Wolfe has made major contributions to the expansion and development of nationally recognized programs for physically, mentally and culturally handicapped people. He has been active in the promotion of progressive legislation for the handicapped in the West Virginia Legislature and the U.S. Congress.

Wolfe has received honors and recognition from an abundance of organizations including the W. Va. Welfare Conference, Award for Outstanding Service to Humanities to the People of West Virginia; special consultant in vocational rehabilitation in Puerto Rico; program chairman, regional conference, American Public Welfare Association and the Ad Hoc Committee on International Social Work Education.

He is the author of "Staff Evaluation: A Key to Effective Performance," Journal of Rehabilitation which was also included in "Conducting the People's Business," a compilation of outstanding articles in public administration published by the University of Oklahoma Press.
