Workshops Planned

Two workshops sponsored by the Continuing Education will be held this month, according to Dr. Joe Evans, coordinator.

A workshop in creative stitchery began Monday and will continue through July 25. The classes, taught by Dr. Mary Jo Pribble, will be held daily from 9-11 a.m. and will include instruction in macrame, crocheting, knitting, embroidery, crewel, and needlepoint.

Personal typing will be offered from July 14-Aug. 1 and will carry two hours college credit. Instruction in manuscript typing, touch system, composing at the machine and letter placement will be offered on a daily basis from 10-12 a.m.

Festival Held

The bouncing strains of mountain music once again brought throngs of people to Glenville to celebrate the five day jubilation of folk music and crafts.

The Folk Festival, which in the recent past, appeared to be in the gradual process of dying, was sparked to life this year by some fresh ideas and the financial assistance of a \$2500 grant from the Arts and Humanities Council. This grant made it possible to invite some highly talented musicians and crafts people to appear at the Festival. Glenville State College provided dormitory housing for these artists. In the past, lack of hotel space limited the number of artists who could attend, so this new arrangement greatly enhanced the quality of entertainment at the Festival. Emphasis was placed on inviting only amateur musicians and, with the exception of one, native West Virginians. These invited artists were required to perform on stage in the College auditorium, and to insure that their performances would include only authentic mountain music, they were required to play acoustic instruments, play only songs written prior to 1930, and use only banjo picking patterns characteristic to mountain music rather than 3-finger picking.

The Folk Festival is possibly best known for the Banjo and Fiddle Contests, showcases of musical talent that draw contestants from West Virginia

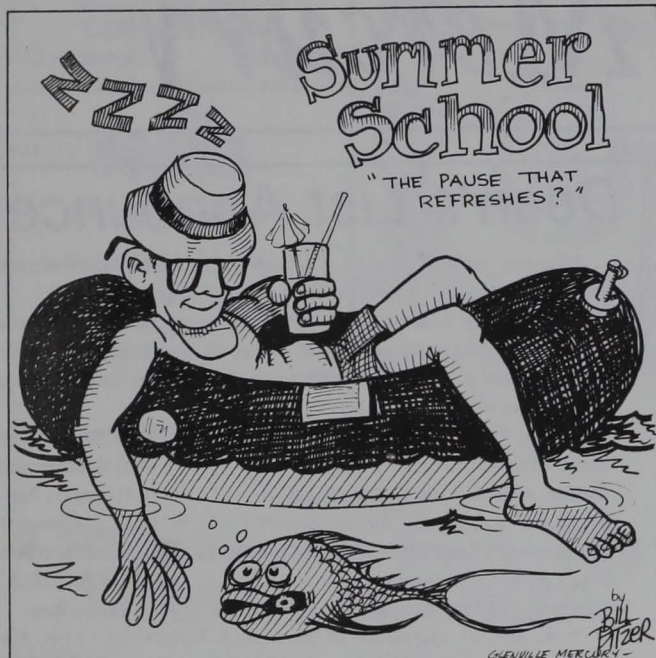

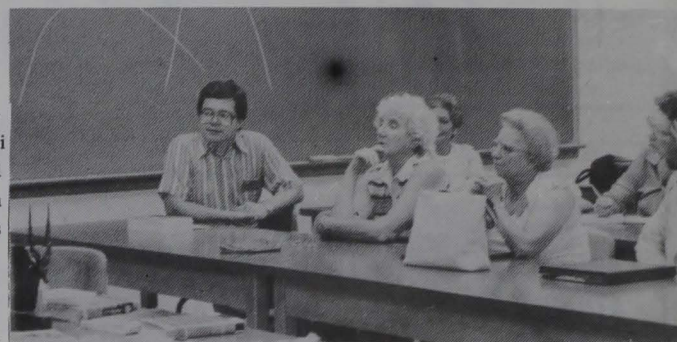

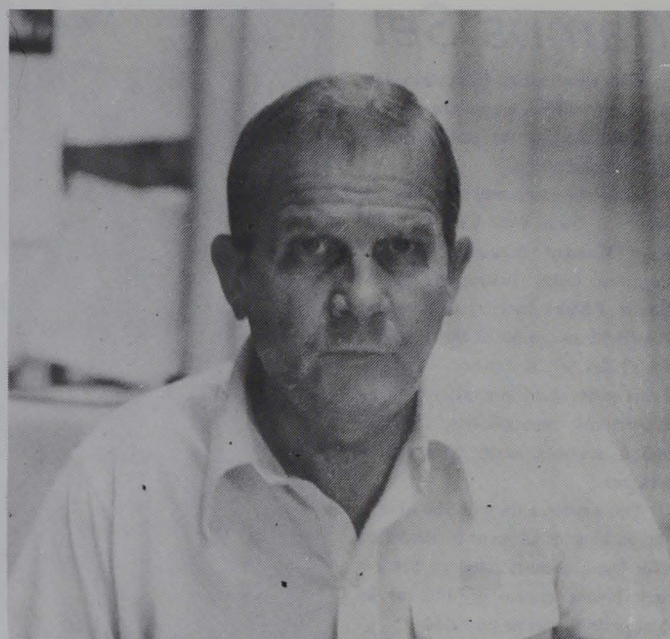

LILLY APPOINTED

Dr. W. K. Simmons, president of Glenville State College, announced three appointments to the Physical Education and Athletic Departments.

Named to the position of Athletic Director, vacated by Dr. Joe Now, is Jesse Lilly. Tim Carney will assume responsibilities as interim chairman of the physical education, health and safety department. Earl "Whitey" Adolfson will become assistant athletic director to Jesse Lilly.

The athletic director and division chairman positions were separated after the resignation of Dr. Joe Now. "The two positions for one individual to handle were too demanding," said Simmons.

"There is a need to strengthen the academic program in the physical education, health and safety division," explained Simmons. "Tim Carney demonstrates the ability to lead the division and the academic ability and interest to strengthen the program."

A permanent division chairman will be appointed after a search and screening committee is established. Carney will continue to coach the women's basketball team and the golf team.

Carney came to Glenville in 1968 as an instructor in physical education and health, and assistant men's basketball coach. He is the women's basketball and golf team coach and will continue to coach in addition to his added responsibilities.

Adolfson will work with Lilly throughout the year in the administration and management of the sports programs for the Pioneers. "Whitey will coordinate the basketball game management during the season while I'm coaching, but we'll be working together on the overall function of all of the sports," said Lilly. "Currently, we're working on budgets, contracts, transportation and all of the administrative duties that must be taken care of before

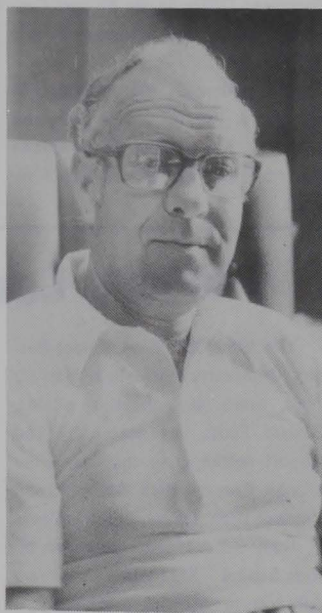
the football season begins."

Adolfson joined the staff at GSC in 1966 as an instructor in health and physical education and as assistant football and basketball coach. He will be on a one-year appointment as assistant athletic director and will serve on the instructional staff in the physical education division.

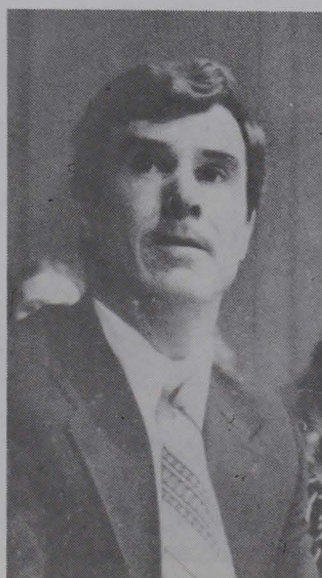
The new athletic director, Jesse Lilly, has already injected the Athletic program with some inspired ideas. He plans to establish an alumni club room in the athletic complex where visiting alumni can gather for soft drinks, coffee, and conversation. He has also initiated plans to invite a high school to each home game with portable bleachers provided to accommodate the guests. Mr. Lilly commented that, though money is a problem, he would like to improve the recruiting program, and expects to use better fund-raising and town involvement as moral and financial boosts. With eleven sports programs in existence, Mr. Lilly doesn't expect any immediate expansion due to financial limitations, but would eventually like to revive wrestling.

Lilly does not foresee any problems in being a basketball coach and athletic director. He explained that, while it would be more time consuming, he will have the able assistance of "Whitey" Adolfson. Adolfson will manage the ten home basketball games, as well as assuming other administrative responsibilities which will allow Lilly more time for coaching.

As head basketball coach, Lilly is optimistic. "We're one man away from a very decent season," he said and went on to explain that he has five recruits—three guards and two front-line men—to fill the slots left by last year's three graduates. GSC is pursuing Chambers of Alleghany College, Pa., for the center position.

Camps Set

The Continuing Education Department will be sponsoring the following programs for public school students and adults.

A science camp will start July 28-August 1 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday at Burnsville Lake. Instructors will be Kenny Fisher, Jennifer Chisler and Joe Hickman. A fee of thirty dollars for grades 2-7 is required. The students are involved in a variety of field experiences encompassing the biological sciences, earth sciences and weather.

The participants will assemble in the parking lot adjacent to the Burnsville Dam; parents need to bring a sack lunch; choice of milk or an orange drink will be provided.

A basketball camp for grades 5-9 (both boys & girls) for two weeks beginning August 4 through 15 from 9:00 a.m. till 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Hand Set Type Fascinating

On a quiet street, in the quaint town of Marlinton, WV, in a neat frame building, is the location of the Pocahontas Times. The Pocahontas Times is a weekly newspaper, and has the distinction of being the only hand-set paper east of the Mississippi River. I had an opportunity recently to visit the newspaper office and talk with Mrs. Jane Price Sharp, owner, and her staff.

The office was literally a curiosity to this journalism student. The trays of type, labeled Bodoni and Condensed, immediately caught my eye. Then, the actual hand-setting of type being done, exactly like it had been done for over a hundred years, was almost unbelievable to watch. The typesetting is done letter by letter with punctuation and headlines till a column is completed. The Pocahontas Times has been using the same format for the front page for fifty years. Mr. Bill Price, editor, told me that no one would know the paper if they tried to change the looks of it now.

Mrs. Sharp inherited the paper from her family. Her father, Cal Price, and his brothers owned and operated the paper till his death in 1957. Mrs. Sharp worked alongside her father as a girl and learned the trade. She attended Davis & Elkins College and studied business. She is a businesswoman, not a journalist. Also working for Mrs. Sharp is her daughter. Mrs. Sharp told me that during World War II, she and a staff of women ran the paper.

The old presses still dominate the large room they stand in, but are not used to print the paper anymore. The presses still can be used, and are for job printing. But for the printing of the paper, they are too slow. The paper is printed in Covington, Virginia. The presses were originally kerosene powered, but are now electric.

The typesetter told me she has had the job since 1962. I asked her where she learned to hand-set type. She said she never had learned it before applying for the job. She thought she would like to try the job; she liked it and has been doing it ever since. The trays of type, both lower case and upper case, and the story to be printed are in front of her, and she deftly sets the type.

The Pocahontas Times is circulated to over 6,000 people.

Pottery Competition Merits Winners

The 1980 GSC High School Pottery Competition was held May 12, 1980, under the direction of Mr. Charles Scott, art teacher.
