Freshman Activities Held

Freshman orientation activities began Sunday, August 24 and end Friday, August 29. Starting Sunday at 9:00 a.m. residence halls will be opened to receive freshman students. All unclaimed room reservations will be cancelled after 10:00 p.m. Tuesday, August 26. The new dining room in the Pioneer Center will be open to students, parents and guests from 10:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Sunday. The Robert F. Kidd Library will serve punch and cookies from 10:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Sunday.

Also on Sunday, a meeting for parents and students in the auditorium of the Ad. Building will be from 1:30 until 2:15 p.m. President William K. Simmons and other Administrative officers will provide an orientation and a question and answer session. The President's reception for freshmen and parents in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center will follow from 2:30 p.m. until 3:30 p.m.

Freshman testing (for those who did not take tests during summer pre-registration) will be in the gymnasium of the Health and Physical Education building from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. Sunday.

Resident hall meetings will be held from 10:00 p.m. until 11:00 p.m.

On Monday at 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., student ID photographs will be taken in Room 103 (across from the Book Store) in the Pioneer

Center. All students are required to have their ID's. Freshmen should have them made prior to completing registration in the Administration Building. A meeting for freshmen who have not pre-registered will be held from 8:30 to 9:00 a.m. in the Auditorium of the Administration Building. Instruction will be given concerning completion of student profile data sheets.

Students will meet their advisors, plan class schedules, get ID photo's and go to the Administration Building to register. Financial aid students will pick up their checks in the Little Theater, room 108 of the Administration Building, and pay their fees.

An orientation session in the Ad. Building will be held from 4:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. This is an informative session on college life and study habits presented by Mr. James H. Meads.

A career planning orientation in the auditorium of the Administration Building will begin at 6:00 p.m. and end at 6:45 p.m. Freshmen attendance is required.

The election of freshman class representatives will be held in the Amphitheater from 7:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. The Student Congress will receive the Freshmen; and the Pioneer, cheerleaders, football team & coaches will be introduced. (cont. on page 4)

A dance will be held on Thursday, September 4, from 8:00 p.m. -- 11:00 p.m. featuring the band Janice. School clothes are appropriate and admission is free. The band cost \$1,250.

All students, faculty or staff who will have automobiles on campus this semester must purchase a parking sticker. This should be done within 48 hours of arriving on campus. To purchase a sticker, one must present their automobile registration, class schedule and \$5 to the Student Affairs window in the Administration Building.

Increase In Fees Slated To Confront Students

Increases in student activity and athletic fees will mean higher costs for students at 15 of the state's 17 public college and universities this fall. State-mandated tuition and registration charges will remain the same; however, special fees have been increased.

Glenville State College's fees will be increased by \$17 for activity fee and \$97 for room and board, making a total \$114 hike. Additional charges for private rooms were \$133.90, per semester, up from \$72. Apartment rental in Pickens Hall increased by \$60 in Williams and Wagner Wing, and \$61 in Scott Wing.

Even with the increases, West Virginia remains well below the average in annual tuition and required fees among 14 southern states except for non-residents at branch colleges and community colleges. Glenville State College is one of the lowest-priced colleges in the state.

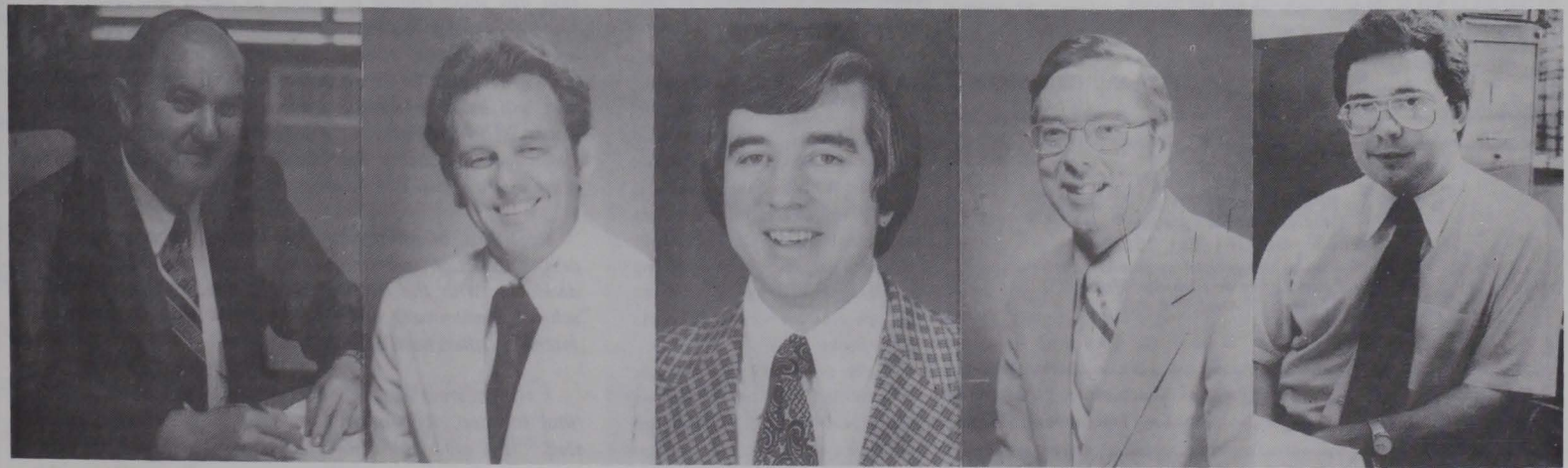

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Twirling Tryouts Set

Mr. Ed McKown, director of the GSC Marching Band, has scheduled a week-long training program for majorette and twirler hopefuls.

Those wishing to compete for majorette or twirler positions will meet with Mr. McKown Monday, August 25. Training will continue each day and will culminate at the end of the week with try-outs.

Mr. McKown explained that though majorette, twirling, or dance experience will be a great asset, it is not required. His decision on the number of positions and the style of corps is dependent on the response from those interested.

NTE Exams Slated

Students completing teacher preparation programs and advanced degree candidates in specific fields may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of three different test dates in 1980-81. Educational Testing Service, the nonprofit, educational organization that administers this testing program, said that the tests will be given November 8, February 21, and June 20.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are considered by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and used by several states for the credentialing of teachers or licensing of advanced candidates. Some colleges require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examinations.

On each full day of testing, registrants may take the Common Examinations, which measure their professional preparation and general educational background, and/or an Area Examination that measures their mastery of the subject they expect to teach.

Prospective registrants should contact Mr. Kermit Kinder for advice about which examination to take and when to take them.

Texts for Sale!

The Student Congress will hold a textbook sale again this semester.

Books will be taken beginning Monday, and be sold beginning Tuesday at noon. A \$.25 charge will be placed on each person wanting to sell books. It should be noted that one does not need to sell books to buy books.

In keeping with the most fashionable attire this year, the Western look, the Student Congress decided to make the "Wild, Wild West" this year's Homecoming theme.

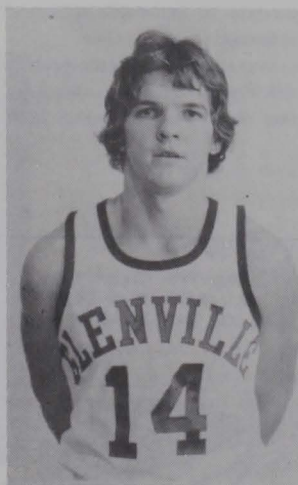

He served as an English instructor at GSC last year but was not extended a permanent contract until this school year when he was placed in the tenure track in English.

Mr. McDonald holds a B.A. degree in English from Davidson College, North Carolina; an M.A. degree in English from the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Virginia; and a Ph.D. in English is expected from the University of York, England. While doing graduate work at the University of York, Mr. McDonald served as a graduate assistant in English.

Mr. McDonald, who hails from Charlotte, North Carolina, and his wife, Karen, are the parents of a two-year-old daughter, Kate.

Miss West, chairperson of the division in which Mr. McDonald will teach, stated that she is "happy to have him as a member of the English staff."

4. **CAREER COUNSELING:** Two career counselors are available to aid students in selecting a career or learn more about an occupation. A career library is maintained for the students' use.
5. **TRANSFER AND GRADUATE SCHOOL INFORMATION:** A library of college catalogs and reference books is maintained in the Placement Office.

The Placement Office and Career Counseling Offices are located on the first floor of the Pioneer Center.

Freshmen who have not pre-registered will be registered Monday, August 25. They will meet with Mack Samples, Dean of Records and
