Joe Crislip To Receive Montrose Award As Golfer During Homecoming Game



Joe Crislip has been selected as the recipient of the Frank Montrose Award for the 1980-81 year.

Crislip, who is being honored for his achievements on the golf course and in the classroom, is the second of his family to be honored with this award. Terry Crislip, his older brother, also won the Montrose Award for golf. Terry was awarded the trophy in 1977.

Joe Crislip was a regular on the squad for three years. He was an All-Conference selection twice, once in 1978 and once in 1979. He participated in two National tournaments for GSC. His first one was in Huntsville, Texas and his second one being in Greensboro,

North Carolina. Crislip attended high school at Parkersburg South. While at PSHS he not only proved himself at golf, but was also an all-state quarterback and a starter on the Big Red basketball team.

He graduated from GSC last spring with a degree in Business Education.

Golf Coach Tim Carney stated that "Joe was a very good all-around athlete. I think that this is seen by his achievements at P-burg South. He was highly competitive and a very good student."

phy at halftime of the Homecoming game with West Virginia State next week.

The Montrose Award is given annually to a GSC athlete who has shown both academic skills, as well as athletic ability. The award was started in 1952 in memory of Frank Montrose, a former athlete at GSC.

Montrose entered GSC in the fall of 1939. He went out for football that year under head coach Nate Rohrbough. As the season started. Montrose looked to be a promising quarterback for the future at GSC. He never got to prove himself until the sixth game of the season. The Pioneers were losing terribly in the late minutes of the game. Coach Rohrbough thought it would be a good time to get a look at his freshman quarterback, so he put Montrose into the action. Montrose took control and led his team to four straight touchdowns and a nearly unbelievable victory!

The next week, GSC met archrival Fairmont State. The starting signal-caller for the Pioneers was Frank Montrose. Montrose took control again and led his Pioneers to a 27-8 win over the Falcons. A highlight of the game was a 63 yard punt return for a touchdown. It was Montrose's first college touch-

GSC won the next game, also under Montrose, slipping by Potomac State 7-0. The win ended the season for GSC and gave them a 5-2-1 final record.

In early 1940. Montrose was suddenly stricken with nephritis which caused him to lose his eyesight. He then dropped out of school, thus ending a short but brilliant football career. In the three games in which he appeared, he was undefeated by sometimes unbelievable

On June 21, 1940, Frank Montrose finally lost. He died at his home at the age of 21.

The Student Congress of GSC initiated the annual Montrose award in 1952 in honor of this man. Joe Crislip is the twenty-eighth recipient of this award.

For the second year, the GSC Pioneer Cross Country team will host an invitational meet, with at least ten teams participating. The meet will begin at 11:00 a.m. tomorrow near the practice football field at Pioneer Stadium.

Last year's invitational, the first annual, was held at Lake Riley in Weston. Frostburg, MD. captured the team title. Carson-Newman of Tennessee placed second, with Rio Grande of Ohio third. GSC was fourth.

There are ten schools entered this year. Following is a list of those teams: Indiana University of PA., Frostburg University of MD., Otterbein College of OH., Fairmont State College, WV., West Virginia State College, West Virginia Wesleyan,

Davis and Elkins, Concord College WV... West Virginia Tech, and host Glenville State College.

Following the start, the race, which will be 10,000 meters (6.2 miles), will follow Mineral Road to the Glenville Golf Course. Two loops will be run on the golf course, then the runners will turn back onto Mineral Road and race to the finish line in the vicinity of the practice

Glenville Drops Opener Against Georgetown 47..6

Glenville State's Pioneer football team travelled to Georgetown, Ky. Saturday for their season debut and fell victim to a massive offensive attack as the Tigers piled up 536 total yards in recording a 47-6 defeat of the Pioneers.

GSC could only muster 62 total vards against the awesome Georgetown squad in the contest.

Georgetown jumped ahead early in the game with seven points in the first quarter. They scored 10 points in the second period, but GSC chalked up six of their own before the first half came to an end. Speedy defensive back Virgil Davis took a punt and raced 55 yards for Glenville's only score of the game. Georgetown scored 17 and 13 points in the third and fourth periods. respectively.

Linebackers Mark Shafer and Terry Kendall led the defensive attack for the Pioneers. Shafer had 7 solo tackles and 4 assists for the game. Shafer also grabbed a pass interception for the Pioneers. Kendall contributed 7 solos and 6 assists

Roy Nurkka also had a fine showing defensively with 6 solo tackles and I assist. Bernie Bertus had a fumble recovery to his credit Scott Taylor also had a pass interception.

Tomorrow the Pioneers host the tion return (Mays kick) Fairmont Falcons in a 7:30 p.m.

Fairmont, 9-1-1 last year, was ranked eighth in the preseason NAIA Higdon (Mays kick) poll among small colleges. But the Geo. - Higdon 25 field goal. Falcons also fell victim to defeat

last Saturday, losing to Wofford (S.C.) College.

"We're looking forward to Fairmont," Head Pioneer coach Frank Vincent stated, "They got blasted last week and are out for revenge. But then, so are we! We're going to be ready for them this Saturday."

Vincent went on to state that "It's not every week that we get a chance to play a nationally ranked team. I'll say one thing, we will be ready for them."

Fairmont is working with a 138 man roster. Forty-four return from last year's nationally ranked team. Players to watch will be quarterback Luc Tousignant from Quebec, a starter for the last three years; Jerome Hoes, a talented tailback who was out last season with a broken leg; and Dickie Tennant who begins his fourth year as a starter in the defensive secondary.

Runners Compete In First Invitational

The GSC Cross Country team got its season off to a good start at the California State (Pa.) Invitational meet on Sept. 13. GSC finished tenth in a field of around 20 teams, beating all of their West Virginia Conference foes in the pro-

Led by sophomore Asenso Kuffour, the Pioneer Harriers placed four runners in the top 100 of the race. In comparison, last year only one GSC runner, Chris Keister, broke the top 100.

Kuffour placed 55th in a field of approximately 215, many of which were from NCAA schools. Kuffour's time for the 5.1 mile course was 29:28. Right behind him, in 57th place with a 29:30 time, was freshman Larry Taylor. Captain P. K. Coon was the third Pioneer through the finishing chute. Coon recorded a time of 29:45, good enough for 67th place. Another freshman, Steve Keenan, was GSC's fourth man with a time of 30:20 for 90th position. Rounding out the five-man scoring for GSC was sophomore Billy Belcher, who came in 138th with a 31:49. Fresh- all RAs of Pickens Hall. man Steve Roberts placed 141st in

a time of 32:15. Chris Keister, a sophomore, finished in 32:31 for 149th position.

Coach Hilgenberg exclaimed, "We did real well considering that we ran against schools which were much bigger than us. I was pleased with the times of our first four runners." Hilgenberg also noted, "I was especially pleased with our freshmen runners." Roberts was competing in his first-ever cross country meet, while Taylor and Keenan are both in only their second year of cross country.

Hilgenberg concluded his remarks by saying that "this kind of performance at a meet of this caliber gives us optimism for the remainder of the season '

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
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
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
