Scholarships Listed

Paying for a college education may be difficult for some students. Each year the Financial Aid Office offers scholarships for freshmen students. One of the main scholarships for freshmen is the John C. Shaw Scholarship. This scholarship was established by John C. Shaw, President of Glenville State College from 1901 to 1908. The scholarship amount given to a selected student, who has at least a 3.0 scholastic average and who is a resident of West Virginia, is \$150 each year. Top priority is given to freshmen, but sometimes, in an emergency, an upperclassman is taken into account.

Tuition Waiver Scholarships are

awarded to students who demonstrate financial need, academic ability, or a specific skill in a particular area, such as music or athletics. The amount of this scholarship is equal to the amount of tuition charged.

GSC Scholarships are for freshmen only. Two are awarded each year, and are given on basis of outstanding academic performance at their high schools.

orticulture Beautifies (ampus

What was the most noticable difference to the GSC campus. when you arrived this fall? If you were like everyone else, the new woodchips, plants, chains, and trees kind of jumped out and greeted you as you entered the middle grounds of the campus.

The person most responsible for the beautiful new image is Mary Durand, the new instructor and head of the Ornamental Horticulture department here at the college. Ms. Durand took over the foreman's job this summer after Joe Hickman, Director of Placement, suggested that the grounds needed "something." So Ms. Durand and Mr. Hickman chose the trees, flowers, and general reclaiming of the landscape in front of Louis Bennett Hall, the amphitheatre, and beside the library. Ms. Durand, along with two college students. Garv Ross and Garv Skidmore, and three other CETA crew members, started landscaping. In the period of five weeks, they carried top soil, dug holes, placed locust logs along the hills, planted shrubs, flowers, plants and trees, and made the grounds look "just splendid." When asked what she thought of the whole thing, Ms. Durand commented. "It was tiring, but we had a lot of fun. I was real happy with what all we got done-but we're not through yet.'

The campus-funded project which was approved by Mr. Robert Gainer, Director of Finance and Administra-

tion, was very low cost. The Maintenance Department was very cooperative in lending a helping hand; supplying a dump truck, carrying dirt and woodchips, and to top it all -they will continue some of the maintenance of the woodchipped areas. Ms. Durand said, "The Maintenance staff was great-and about the cost, the woodchips were free and the plants were very low cost."

Ms. Durand, who was a Glenville student last year, took over the twoyear Ornamental Horticulture program this past summer. She expressed a weird feeling about being a teacher to previous classmates and said,"The position is definitely different. I thought it was hard enough as a student, but now I see the other side of the story and exactly all the organization, planning and following through of the program. But I wouldn't trade it for anything." The program, Ornamental Horticulture, is a class that simply means "working with plants." It involves such areas as nursery management, turf management, and landscaping, to name a such jobs as manager of golf courses, football fields and other jobs involving the maintaining of turf. Green houses and landscapers are also job fields for these majors.

Along with the classes, there are activities and projects for the students. Last year the planting of trees and addition of woodchips to the courtyard of LBH along with

pruning of trees and flowers in front of the student union were just a few of their activities. This year Ms. Durand pointed out the project of finishing the grounds job by placing some dogwood and redwood trees to the open areas of the campus and working with weed control on the already completed parts of the project

From what we gather, this class is very fulfilling and helpful to the students, campus, and other surrounding plant followers, but because of the lack of interest in the course, it is in its last year at Glenville. "It's a real shame the program was dropped; it was much needed, and it's just beginning to blossom-it's a real shame," Ms. Durand said.

However, something good came from the effort--our campus is much

Clinic Offers Coaching

If you "need a coach" to help you through some of the adjustments of college life, the Gilmer County Mental Health Clinic can help. The Clinic, located on Mineral Road, offers professional counseling for individuals, families and groups, and also for alcohol and drug abuse. Hours at the Clinic are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and evenings by appointment only.

"The main problem of most students is the first separation from the home and family. The students need someone to show them their mistakes and lend an objective ear,' Dr. Jeffrey Cosnow of the Clinic stated

There are several new innovations at the Mental Health Clinic this year. Dr. Hoover, of Glenville, has been employed on a part-time basis as a medical consultant. The Clinic is also doing hypnosis for weight loss and smoking.

Patients at the Clinic need not worry about names being given out to the general public. As patients, their names are kept strictly confidential. Dr. Cosnow cited the following example, "If you were a patient at the Clinic and your parents called and asked if you were receiving treatment there, the only legal answer the Clinic could give would be 'I'm sorry I am not able to give out that information.' Another worry to a possible patient is fees. The Mental Health Clinic operates on a sliding scale fee range, which means that a patient pays a fee that is in proportion to their income. Many times the patient may have insurance which will pay for the treatment, explained Dr. Cosneeding information on these matters may go to the Clinic and use this information. An alcohol abuse group meets every Wednesday evening at the Clinic for those people who need help with their drinking problems. Anyone wishing to enter the group or who wants more information of the group should contact the Clinic. Dr. Cosnow feels that alcohol is a vastly underrated drug by many college students. Many students do not realize, emphasized Dr. Cosnow, that getting drunk is just an overdose. An adult mentally retarded group,

consisting of eight men and women, meets on Wednesday mornings. The The group needs a teacher to help them with carpentry. Anyone wishing to work with these individuals should contact Liz Schelper at 462-5716.


4-H Club Meets

Romano Serving As Parade Marshal mick, Barbara West, Ann Woody,

The winningest coach in Charleston High School's history has been chosen as the 1980 Glenville State College Homecoming Parade Marshal. Lou Romano, a 1940 graduate of GSC, has been chosen for the honors of Parade Marshal.

While at Glenville, Romano was named to the NAIA All Tournament team in Kansas City, when the basketball team went to the national tournaments, the Small College All American Team, and was the first All American to be named from GSC.

After graduating from Glenville in 1940, Romano went to Leewood High School in Kanawha County. During his stay at Leewood, Romano won three Upper Kanawha Valley Championships in football.

After leaving Leewood, Romano went to Charleston High School, where he compiled the winningest record of any basketball coach in the history of Charleston High, with 318 wins and 77 losses. Romano also won three State Titles, in 1938, '73 and '74, eight Kanawha Valley Conference titles. While at CHS, Romano concentrated his coaching efforts to the basketball courts.

Romano was head basketball coach at Charleston High School for 17 years. He is now retired and has one son, Anthony, a daughter, Monica Lou, and wife, Sperry.

The Be Given The English Proficiency Exam-ination Committee, Miss Virginia

West, Dr. Gary Adkins, and Mr. Wayne de Rosset, wish to remind all advisers and their students who might need the exam that the English Proficiency Examination will be given Monday, October 6, at 6:00 p.m. in Room 312 Administration Building.

As a graduation requirement, all candidates for a baccalaureate degree at Glenville State College must demonstrate proficiency in the English language. In addition, timber harvesting, land surveying and ornamental horticulture students must meet language proficiency requirements.

If the student has an overall average of 2.0 ("C") or better in English 101 and 102, he has met the requirement. If he does not have a "C" average in English 101 and 102, he may take the Language Proficiency Examination. A student may not take this examination more than two times. Anyone who was enrolled at GSC prior to the fall semester 1977 must include English 202 in this average.

A student who has completed 58 hours, or will have completed this number by the end of this semester and who has not achieved an over-all average of "C" or better in English 101 and 102 should see his adviser regarding this matter. If the student wishes to take the examination rather than repeat the course(s), he should come to the Language Division Office by October 3 and sign to take the test October 6.


Day Care Opened

The West Virginia Department of Welfare offers a Day Care Enrichment Program for children of parents who are working or students or both.

The final decision concerning parents' eligibility is based on total income. For example, a family of three is allowed a monthly income of up to \$853.99 before a fee is required and an income of up to \$932.00 monthly before they would be financially ineligible. The rates are adjusted according to family size.

The Department of Welfare is working toward having trained providers for families who need Day Care in Gilmer County. Mandatory training is required of all providers in a four phase program that includes first aid, health, nutrition, and early childhood development.

The opportunity to study veterinary medicine is offered to qualified students by the West Virginia Board of Regents under a contract program with the Ohio State University, Tuskegee Institute, and the University of Georgia.

The three out-of-state institutions will provide West Virginia with a limited number of places for entering freshmen for the 1981-82 academic year. By virtue of the contract program, West Virginia students will be charged residency fees of the state in which the institution is located, instead of the higher fees usually required for out-of-state residents.

Eligibility requirements include a five-year West Virginia residency prior to application, completion of 80 to 90 semester hours of specific credits, and attendance at an accredited college in the United States or Canada.

The Veterinary Aptitude Test (VAT) is required by all three in-stitutions. In addition, the University of Georgia requires the Graduate Record Examination (including the Advanced Biology Section.)




The station has acquired a new solid state transmitter that will now signal 10 watts. Others specials will be album hours and record give aways.



Rich Wynn Is State Karate Champion

Rich Wynn, a senior business President William Simmons will major at Glenville State College, has captured the 1980-81 State Karate Championship in the White Belt Kata division.

The Championships were held last Saturday at Cross Lanes. Four GSC karate students and the instructor attended the competition. Bill King, the instructor, took Wynn, Bill Szabo, Tim Carter, and Jeff Rosselot.

The Kata division is one of two classes of competition. In this class the athlete performs a fighting situation. His score is based on power, technique, breathing, and balance. Three black-belts are the judges of the competition. The scoring is similar to the scoring of swimming

competitions. After the performance the judges hold up score cards stating the participant's score. An average is taken for the final score. Wynn finished First ahead of about forty participants.

The other division, sparring, was not so fortunate to the GSC five. None of the five placed in the division.

For his efforts, Rich's name will appear in Karate Illustrated, the national magazine for Karate experts.

This is Wynn's first year in Karate competition. Bill King is his instructor at GSC. King is a second-degree black belt. He has a private karate school in Weston and teaches a class at GSC every Tuesday and Thursday at 6:30 p.m. King will continue to teach a class at GSC each semester.

King is a state champion himself as he won the sparring division last year.

"I'm really honored to have won the Kata Championship," Wynh stated, "but I don't think enough credit goes to my instructor. I have a lot of respect for Mr. King. He's a great man."

Wynn went on to say that "I wish more people would show interest in his karate program. I know they won't regret it."




