## Task Force Meets At GSC

The Governor's Educational Policy Task Force met on the campus of Glenville State College last Thursday and discussed several issues directly related to public school policy.

"Each and every community must be supportive of schools in order to increase educational standards," said Russell Slack, superintendent of Hancock County Schools. "The initiative lies on the part of each local school system to elicit the community support."

Another issue addressed was the lack of proper funding for continuing education programs for teachers. "Teachers are not enthused about continuing education programs because of the lack of funding," Slack surmised.

"In-service and continuing education is seen as a 'have to' situation on the part of the teachers," said Al Brown, vice-principal of Charleston High School. "The program needs to become more meaningful for teachers to respond."

Pay raises and additional funding for various programs was seen as a critical problem. "Pay is critical in recruiting quality teachers," said Brown. "You get only what you pay for and the need for more money is a continuing problem that we deal with daily."

"Funding is very important," said Slack. "Any pay raise to be given should be equitable for all."

The committee will meet again and ultimately make recommendations to the Governor for the legislative session.

## Infirmary Profiled

"Where do you go when you get sick or injured on the Glenville State College campus?" "What are the procedures a student must follow to be admitted to the hospital?" "If I take myself to the hospital, who pays for the visit?" "Since I am a commuting student, do I still have to go to Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital, or can I go to my hometown hospital?" These are just some of the questions being asked by students about the new health services.

The Infirmary is located on the first floor of the Physical Education Building. A nurse is on duty each day, Monday through Thursday, from 8:30 to 3:30 and on Fridays 8:30 to noon. Dr. Curtis Rogers, of Weston, has been employed as the physician and will hold office hours from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. each Thursday.

Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, the Registered Nurse, stresses the importance of students handing in their student health forms. This will make diagnosis and treatment much easier, and benefit both the health services and the students in a case of emergency.

If an illness or injury occurs in the dorm, students are asked to contact the House Director or a Resident Assistant. These people will, in turn, contact the proper authorities. Students, if the occasion arises, will be transported to the Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital where they will receive treatment. It is important to note, stated Dean Billips, that for the college to bear the expenses of the treatment, the student must have a Health Referral slip signed by the college nurse or a House Director.

Student Congress is hoping that the many misconceptions and questions that students are asking will be cleared up by this article. However, if more questions arise, students are urged to speak out and let your questions be known.

California has its Rose Bowl, Texas has its Cotton Bowl, and Florida has its Orange Bowl. Well, Glenville State College also has the glamour and excitement of a big-time college football matchup and it's called the Commodore Bowl.

The Commodore Bowl is different than any other college bowl game, as you might have already concluded. The Oklahoma Sooners, Ohio State Buckeyes, or Southern California Trojans have never been invited to participate in the game.

In the eleven year history of the Commodore Bowl, only three teams—Theta Xi, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and Lambda Chi Alpha—have ever had the honor to vie for the trophy. And the trophy is a beauty; a lifesize porcelain replica of the real McCoy.

The Commodore Bowl was originated in 1969 by the Intra-fraternity Council of Glenville State College. It was formed to provide a tradition for the three fraternities at GSC. Each fall, the three Greek organizations go after each other for the prestigious porcelain trophy.

There are some rules in the contest. You play with a flag tied to your waist. In order to down the runner, you must pull the flag off. Blocking is allowed, but you cannot leave your feet. No protective pads are worn, so it is a very physical game.

Each year, a different team gets the first round bye and the other two play. The winner of the first game plays the team that had the bye for the championship.

## GSC and Bluefield Battle to 14-14 Deadlock

Glenville State College and Bluefield State played to a 14-14 deadlock at Bluefield last Saturday in a West Virginia Conference matchup.

Brad Batten rushed for 123 yards on 13 carries for a 9.4 average in the contest. He also scored a touchdown on an 87 yard run.

Glenville drew first blood in the game with Batten's touchdown run. Head Coach Frank Vincent once again used his secret weapon, the draw. Quarterback Ed Huffman dropped back to pass but instead he handed the ball off to Batten who galloped 87 yards past a stunned defense for the score. Reno Gandee added the extra point and Glenville led 7-0.

The Pioneers scored again in the second period with Dave Boggess going over the goal line from a yard out. Gandee's PAT made the score 14-0.

But Bluefield added a score of their own in the second period when Joe Turner scored on a two yard burst. The point after was good and it was GSC 14, Bluefield 7.

The Big Blues tied the game in the third period when Turner scampered 11 yards for a touchdown and Glenn Large hit the point after touchdown. Neither team could score in the fourth quarter and the game ended at 14-14.

Glenville amassed 293 yards total in the game with 263 of this coming on the ground. Bluefield totaled 370 net yards in the contest.

Batten led the offense with 123 yards rushing. Boggess, Grady Lamb and Huffman had 49, 45 and 46 yards respectively. Huffman completed three passes for 30 yards.

Defensively the Pioneers were paced by Andy Marchal who had six

tackles, seven assists and four quarterback sacks. Chuckie Taylor accounted for six tackles and seven assists. Roy Nurkka also had a fine performance with six tackles and ten assists. Happy Joe Parsons also sacked the Big Blue quarterback twice.

Mark Shafer, Danny Amick, and Lewis Hill all had interceptions for the Pioneers. John Adkins recovered the lone Bluefield fumble.

Glenville, now 1-3-1 overall, will return to the home turf when they host Salem Saturday in a 7:30 contest.

Salem, 203 thus far this season, is coming off a 27-7 loss to Shepherd last week. They return ten defensive starters from last year's squad. This defense was ranked third in the NAIA last year.

The Salem offense is of good size with their line averaging about 6-3, 240 pounds.

## Delaat Secures Medalist Honor

The golfmen of Coach Tim Carney continued their winning ways as they travelled to Canton, Ohio, to participate in the Malone College Invitational last weekend and placed two teams in the top five.

There were eleven teams in the tournament and four players were on each team. GSC entered two teams and they placed second and fifth.

The second place team consisted of Gordie Delaat, John Forrest, Jerry Kurgain, and Dean Prowse. This team had to go into a four-hole playoff to capture second place.

The fifth place team consisted of Dave Lamm, Randy Slabaugh, Chris Passero, and Jeff Wine.

Delaat was the medalist for the entire tournament with a 75. Delaat is a sophomore at GSC.

Coach Carney commented on the teams achievement by saying that "on the second place team, we had three freshmen and one sophomore. This is a good indication of the future of golf at GSC. I hope this will carry over into the spring season."

There will be no more tournaments for the linksters this fall. They will see plenty of action this spring and hopefully their success at GSC will be as great as it has been in the past.

## TKE Claims Crown

TKE has won the annual Commodore Bowl for the third year in a row with a 27-0 win over Lambda Chi Alpha.

The game was played Tuesday at the Gilmer County Athletic Field.

## Cross Country Team Sees Plenty of Action

With the West Virginia Conference Meet more and more on their minds every day, the GSC cross country runners competed in two meets over the past week. First of all, the Harriers travelled to the West Virginia State Invitational at Sandy Brae Golf Course on Saturday, Oct. 11. Then, on Tuesday, Oct. 14, GSC's runners went to Frostburg University of Maryland to participate in a dual meet with Frostburg.

The Pioneers performed well at the West Virginia State meet, which was originally scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 9. GSC placed third in the team standings with 82 points. Ahead of Glenville were WVU with 28 points and Walsh College of Ohio with 52 points. Behind GSC were the following: WVU 'B' - 100, Davis and Elkins - 141, West Virginia Wesleyan - 189, Fairmont - 190, Walsh 'B' - 198, West Virginia State - 219, West Virginia Tech - 243. For their efforts, the GSC runners were awarded a beautiful third-place team trophy.

Individually for GSC, Freshman Larry Taylor was the first finisher. He ran a strong race in placing seventh overall with a time of 26:38 for the five mile course. GSC's next three runners, two sophomores and a junior, crossed the finish stripe in 16th, 17th and 18th places. Sophomore Billy Belcher was 16th with a time of 27:02. A step behind him was sophomore Asenso Kuffuor in 27:03. Another step

back was junior captain, P.K. Coon, who crossed the line in 27:04. The Pioneers' fifth and final scoring runner was sophomore Chris Keister, who placed 24th with a clocking of 27:46. Steve Roberts, a freshman, was 40th overall with a time of 29:40. Craig Bock, a junior, was GSC's seventh runner. He placed 63rd in 35:30.

The Frostburg meet was between Frostburg and GSC at Frostburg's home course. Frostburg's 'A' team won with a perfect score of 15 points. Frostburg 'B' was second with 57 points. GSC, running in more like a training tune-up for the conference meet, was third with 58 points.

Asenso Kuffuor was GSC's first man, running the 5.2 mile course in 29:17. Larry Taylor was next in 29:22. Third was P.K. Coon in 29:39. Billy Belcher, Chris Keister and Craig Bock finished fourth, fifth and sixth, respectively, with times of 31:33, 31:33, and 36:45. A bright spot for GSC was June Casto, who set a women's course record during the race. She completed the course in 41:09, bettering the old mark by almost three minutes. No other females braved the cold weather to compete in the race.

Coach Jim Hilgenberg remarked, "We're out of the invitational part of our season now. The dual meet with Frostburg and one coming up on Oct. 22 with West Virginia Tech are mainly tune-ups for the West Virginia Conference meet on Nov. 7."

## Volleyball Squad Defeats A-B

Our women's volleyball team went to Phillippi on Oct. 14 to compete in a triangular match with the University of Charleston and Alderson-Broadus. The GSC women fared well in the match, defeating A-B two out of three games and beating UC once.

Glenville squared off against the host A-B squad in their first action. A-B won the initial contest, but GSC captured the next two games by scores of 15-6 and 15-11. This allowed them to advance to play against UC.

The Lady Pioneers dropped the

first game by a 15-5 margin to UC, a perennial West Virginia conference power. GSC rallied in the second contest, however, to pull out a 15-13 win and even the games at 1-1. UC took a victory in the third game. The score was 15-9, giving UC a 2-1 edge in games for the triumph.

The coach of the squad, Kay Chico, stated, "Our girls played fairly well, but we can do better."

The next action for the women will be on Monday, Oct. 20. They will go to West Virginia Tech to participate in a triangular meet involving themselves, Tech and UC.
