## Olsen Recital Held

On November 16, at 3:30 p.m. at the Trinity Methodist Church there will be an organ recital and reception in honor of Bertha E. Olsen. Miss Olsen is being honored for the 50 years of service she has given the Community of Glenville and Glenville State College.

The invited guest organist will be Mr. Jay C. Brooks, a high school senior at Ripley High School in Jackson County, WV. The public is cordially invited to this planned event, shared by Glenville Presbyterian Church and Trinity United Methodist congregation. Reverend Martin Berisford, host pastor at Trinity Church says, "It appears in our anticipation and excitement for the event, the kind of afternoon and hour that many persons will thoroughly enjoy, and the public, as well as particular friends of Miss Olsen, are cordially invited."

Miss Olsen was born in England, but at the age of six or seven, she, with her parents, moved to Dorchester, Massachusetts. Miss Olsen finished her formal schooling in June of 1930 by graduating from the New England Conservatory School of Music with a Masters Degree in Music. Miss Olsen came to Glenville in November of 1930, in replacement of

Miss Wilma West and began a career that lasted for 42 years.

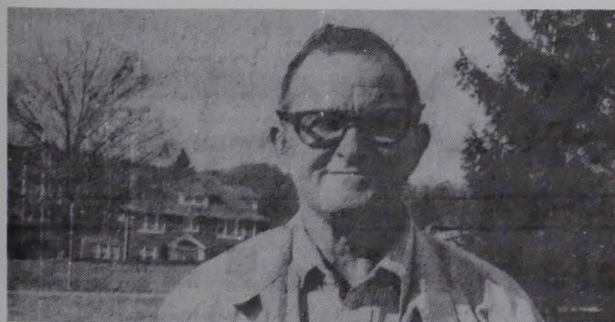
During the first 14 years, Miss Olsen was the lone educator in the field of music. She was advisor to a string orchestra, band, choir, plus she taught all the Music Education and Music Major classes. Later she was joined by other music educators who helped to develop the Music Department into what it is today.

During her career, Miss Olsen assisted in the founding and was President of the West Virginia College Music Educators Association, which was organized in the early thirties in Clarksburg. She was also a member of Phi Kappa Lambda, a musical honorary society; Student Education Association, National Education Association, AHA and MENC.

Dr. Gary Gillespie noted, "Miss Olsen has a state wide reputation as a music educator and as a musician."

The college population hears Miss Olsen's musical talent as she plays the chimes each Tuesday and Thursday. Miss Olsen also plays the organ for the Trinity Methodist Church each first and third Sunday.

From the record of Bertha E. Olsen's accomplishments, not a more deserving person could be honored. Congratulations and Thank You.

Jennifer Chisler and Raeleen McMillion led our team with 13½ points. Fran Davis was second with 10 points and Tom Davisson was third with 9 points. The rest of the team members followed with scores of: Cindy Stewart-5, Randy Gibson-4, Kenny Kuhl-2, and Joe McCormick-1.

## Meeting Conducted

The Glenville State College Advisory Board held its fall meeting November 1. Two times each year a regular session is held. In case of an emergency, a special meeting is called.

The Advisory Board advises the president on such matters as academic programs and campus activities. Other matters were also brought to President Simmons' attention.

Several matters were discussed by the Advisory Board. Among these were enrollment and enrollment patterns and how fulltime enrollment has increased.

Dr. Peterson, Dean of Academic Affairs, submitted a new program of Sports Management which the Board adopted. The program now will be sent to the Board of Regents for approval. Special Education was also discussed.

Director of Finance and Administration, Robert Gainer, discussed campus improvements. One of the main issues was the parking situation. Land behind Louis Bennett will be bought by the Board of Regents from the Alumni Association. The purchase is 3.5 acres. This will help extend parking lots.

The Glenville State College Bowling Team participated in their first tournament of the 1980-81 season on Sunday, November 2nd in Weirton, W. Va. Bowling against twenty-two other schools including Penn State, Ohio State, West Virginia University, Robert Morris and many other northern power houses, the Pioneer Keglers placed 12th out of the 23 teams present in the nine (9) game event. The Pioneers averaged a respectable 177 per game per man, even though the team actually bowled well under each individual's potential. Leading the Pioneers was Senior Greg Martin from Vienna, West Virginia, who averaged 183.4 for 9 games. Fresh-

man Jerry Kurjan from Ohio was 2nd leading bowler for GSC. Jeff Stanley shot the highest three game series for GSC with a 635. Over all the Keglers are very optimistic and hopeful that with the improvement that comes with time, that this season could see the Keglers dominating the Mid-South Intercollegiate Conference.

Backed by a pretty good crowd, the Lady Pioneers were matched against the Concord squad in the match opener. It was the first time the two teams had met. The Concord women captured the first game. In the second contest, the GSC spikers grabbed a quick lead and appeared headed for victory until they faltered. Concord fought back for a tight 17-15 win. Linda Collins led Glenville's scoring in the Concord match with 12 points. Marilyn Linger added seven, Pam Linger three, Donita Cox two and Jackie Makle one.

Following a match between Concord and Fairmont, in which Concord won to become overall winners in the match, GSC and Fairmont finished the evening of volleyball action by going at each other.

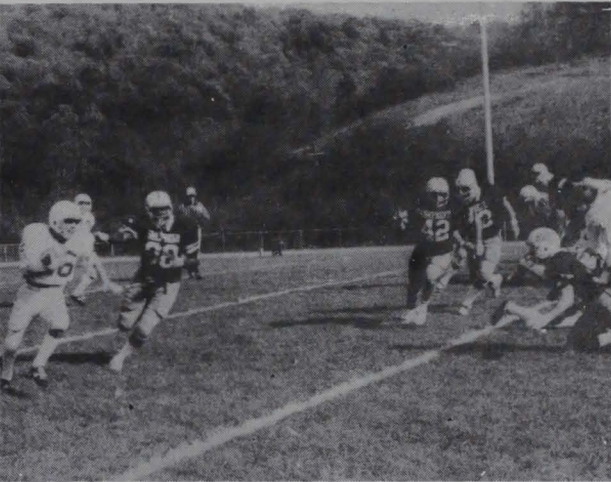
The Lady Pioneers performed well against the Falconettes, while providing some exciting action for the fans. GSC copped the initial outing from Fairmont by a 15-10 count. They completed a sweep of the Fairmont girls by taking the second game, also. The score was 16-14 in the come-from-behind triumph for GSC. Again, Linda Collins was Glenville's top scorer. She totaled ten points in the two games. Marilyn Linger was a close second with nine points. Following them were Pam Linger-five, Donita Cox-two, Leza Groves-two, Della Seaman-two, and Jackie Makle-one.

Overall, the GSC women did well and represented the school in a good fashion.

The next match for Coach Kay Chico's squad will be on Wednesday, Nov. 12 at Charleston. Teams competing will be Glenville, Concord, University of Charleston, and Marshall University, a tough non-conference foe.

After the Charleston match, the lone one remaining on the schedule will be the conference tournament. The conference match will be contested at Wheeling on Nov. 14 and 15.

## Pioneer Rally Falls Short In 28-21 Loss to Shepherd

Twenty-eight points were just too much for the Pioneers to try to play catch-up to, but they proved themselves to nationally ranked Shepherd College last Saturday.

Shepherd, who is currently ranked sixteenth in the country among small college football teams, scored twenty-eight points in the first half against the host Pioneers. But instead of rolling over and playing dead, Glenville State came out of the locker room to knock off 21 straight points and put a scare into the heart of Shepherd.

David Boggess, Brad Batten, and Eddie Huffman ran for touchdowns in the contest. Boggess and Huffman went in from one yard each and Batten scored from six yards out. Place-kicker Reno Gandee went three for three in the extra point department.

Batten was GSC's leading rusher with 72 yards on 23 carries. Huffman rushed for 49 yards on 21 carries. He also completed eight passes for 80 yards. Gandee caught four of those passes for fifty yards.

Defensively the Pioneers were led by Mark Shafer and Terry Kendall. Shafer had nine tackles, two assists, and a fumble recovery. Kendall tackled eight runners and assisted in one. Chuckie Taylor and Happy Joe Parsons both had a quarterback sack for GSC.

Glenville led in first downs by a 17-13 margin. Shepherd held the edge in total yardage with 280 yards to the Pioneers's 269. Both teams lost a fumble each and Glenville was intercepted once.

Glenville, who dropped to 1-6-1 on the season, played Concord Saturday. Concord is the powerhouse of the conference with an 8-0 record and ranked fifth in the nation.

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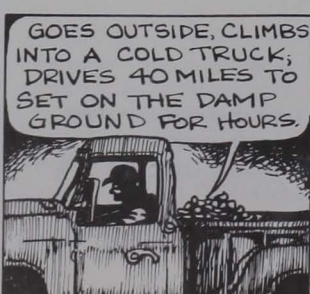
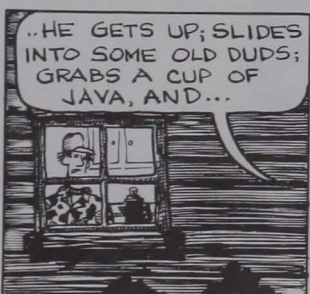
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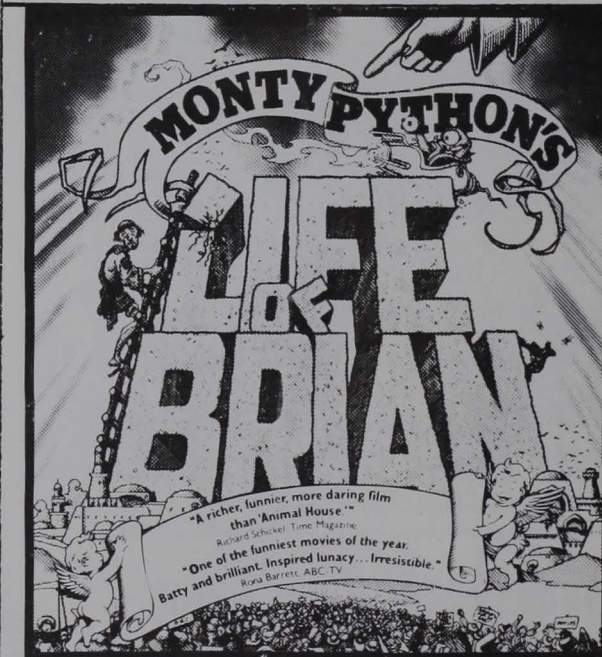
