### Scheduled Nov. 17

The Chamber Repertory Theatre, Boston's continuously touring Professional theatre company, will be performing its original stage production "Seeking Dr. Jekyll" based on the novel by Robert Louis Stevenson at 8:00, Nov. 17 in the auditorium, sponsored by the Ohnimgohow Players. There is no charge.

CRT's appearance at GSC marks the return engagement of the company to this area. Last season they performed Mark Twain's Short Stories.

The play, as performed by a cast of six actors, involves many elements of the classic murder mystery, the psychological thriller, and the chilling horror story. The story is set in the fog shrouded streets of Victorian London, replete with its paradoxes: Great wealth and great poverty; great beauty and horrible decay; social order and criminal depravity. Against this background, characters who represent both sides of those paradoxes recreate the tale of the enlightened Dr. Jekyll and the diabolical Mr. Hyde and how they affect the lives of the innocent friends and bystanders who must confront them. It is a play which entertains, frightens, amuses and teaches something of the self.

# **Pre-Registration Scheduled**

Those pre-registered students who will be receiving financial aid will be given the opportunity to pay their fees on January 12, 1981 in the Little Theater (Room 208A). Financial Aid checks will be distributed in the same room.





**Cave Biology** To Be Given

A course in cave biology will once again be offered through the Division of Science and Mathematics. Mr. Jim Meads will teach the one-hour course which has no prerequisites, and will be conducted during the last eight weeks of the spring semester.

Cave Biology will cover the geology, biology, history, and distribution of cave systems throughout West Virginia. Special emphasis will be placed upon the study of the cave ecosystem and the effects of man on this delicate environment. Cave conservation, preservation, safety, and caverland owner relations are also important aspects of the class.

This course is not geared to the experienced caver but is designed for those beginning spelunking students. All caves entered are those that are accessible to the novice spelunker; therefore, neither specialized caving gear or rope climbing technique skills are needed. Standard caving helmets and lights will be supplied by Glenville State College.

A special feature of this course will be three Saturday field trips designed to allow the students to experience caving first hand. They will also participate in investigative studies in the subterranean environment. Commercial and wild caves will both be explored.

Due to the popularity of this course in the past, those students interested in enrolling for the cave biology course in the 1981 spring semester must complete (as soon as possible) a pre-registration caving questionnaire. This form may be obtained at Mr. Mead's office in 303 AB. The number of students enrolled must be limited. Selection will be based upon the data received from the questionnaire. Actual enrollment will not be held until the regular registration period for the 1981 spring semester in January.

The workshop will be conducted by Mr. Jim Williams who is a member of the West Virginia Fur Trappers Association, District VI Director. Classes will cover preparation of furs from harvesting to marketing with suggestions on improving trapping techniques.

### Speed Reading To Be Offered

A course in speed reading will be offered Spring Semester through the Language Division. Mrs. Sharon Kraus will teach the one-hour course which has no prerequisites and will be conducted during the first eight weeks of the semester.

Speed Reading will have four course objectives. Participants will learn to adjust reading rate to the difficulty of the material, to adjust reading rate to the purpose in reading, to remember more of what was read, and to develop attitudes toward print that are purposeful, selective, and critical.

By establishing a control rate, progress will be checked periodically. A rate record will be maintained to provide added incentive for greater speed gains.

The course will focus on meanings rather than words and students will be encouraged to read for main ideas and their supporting details. Development in these areas will be aided by the presentation of the organization patterns used by most writers

The class will be offered in eight two-hour (arranged) sessions. Anyone wishing to improve speed and comprehension should enroll for this English 399 course. Enrollment will be limited to twenty students.

Less than three years ago, cross country was no more than a club in the eyes of the students at GSC. But before the tournament last weekend, people everywhere were talking about it. After all, the Pioneer runners were 15-0 in the conference and were the center of talk among the West Virginia colleges. I can assure you, no one will ever compare GSC cross country to a club today!

Glenville State won't go to Kansas as a team to participate, but they will be represented. Freshman Larry Taylor of St. Marys was the individual conference champion in the tourney and will go to the nationals to compete and to let everyone know that Glenville will be back next year.

Taylor finished the five-mile race in 28 minutes and 15 seconds. He finished in front of the second place runner by 47 seconds. He was named as the "conference's outstanding runner" and named to the allconference team for his achievement.

Billy Belcher finished eighth in the race. He was less than 20 seconds from being named on the all-conference team. P.K. Coon was number eleven for the Pioneers. He finished with a time of 29:51.

Yes, Glenville finished in a tie for second place. Yes, they will be represented at the nationals. But one thing looks even better than all of this. There are no seniors on the squad and watch out West Liberty 'cause we will be back!'

# **Concord Wins Title With 55-14** Victory over Glenville State

Glenville State College's football team travelled to Athens, West Virginia, last Saturday to take on the nationally ranked Concord Mountain Lions. Concord showed the Pioneers why they are ranked number four in the NAIA by trouncing GSC 55-14.

The victory gave the Mountain Lions the West Virginia Conference championship. Their only threat, Shepherd, tied with Fairmont State last week to clinch the championship for Concord.

In all, six Concord players scored in the contest. Starting quarterback Dave Renner threw two touchdown passes and reserve signal-caller Mark Shannon also connected for two touchdowns.

Concord scored the first six touchdowns, building up to a 41-0 lead at halftime. Glenville came back in the third quarter with two touchdown passes from Eddie Huffman to Steve "Reno" Gandee, one for 20 yards and the other a ll vard strike. The third period has been the big period this season as the Pioneers have scored twice as many points in this quarter than any of the other three.

The Mountain Lions outdid the Pioneers in the rushing department by a 247-89 margin. They also outpassed GSC 271 vards to 122. Concord amassed 518 total yards and held Glenville to only 2ll. Glenville lost four fumbles and Concord lost three in the contest. The Mountain Lions also won the first down battle 23 Glenville had 17 chain movers.

Freshman Scott Pottmeyer, playing for the injured David Boggess, was GSC's leading rusher for the day

with 60 yards on 18 carries. Boggess has the Pioneer's best average on the season with 4.1 yards a carry. Quarterback Eddie Huffman completed nine passes for 122 yards Jim Bingiel grabbed three of these passes, Gandee and Pottmeyer caught two each, and Jeff Matheney and Brad Batten snared one each.

Defensively the Pioneers were led by Mark Shafer with nine tackles and five assists. Tim Townsend tackled six runners and assisted in seven tackles. Chuckie Taylor had seven tackles and three assists. Happy Joe Parsons, Bernie Bertus, and Steve Gandee all had fumble recoveries for the Pioneers. Parsons also had a quarterback sack.

The loss dropped the Pioneers to 1-7-1. Concord is now 9-0. This is the fourth time in five years that the Mountain Lions have won the conference title. If the Mountain Lions defeated Bluefield in the last game of the season they will have won an NAIA playoff berth.

With basketball season just around the corner - the GSC cheerleaders are getting prepared. The 1979-80 WVIAC Champion squad has the fever already, and can't wait until the first shot is put up.





A native West Virginian, Jenio has his bachelor and master's degrees from Eastern Michigan University and his doctorate from Southern Illinois University.



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

### **Drama Production Reviewed**

The Prince of Darkness reigns again as the students of Glenville State College and the community of Glenville take in the College Theatre season 1980 opener, "Dracula." The play, directed by Mrs. Linda McKown, is loosely based on the 1887 Bram Stoker novel by the same name.

The play concerned strange happenings in a suburb of London in the early 1920's. The sanitorium is run by a Dr. Seward (Louis Kent), who discovers the strange happenings after the death of Lucy's, his daughter, (Jennifer Chisler), close friend. Louis Kent portrays a man driven to any length to save his daughter's soul. Jennifer Chisler, a victim of Dracula, overdramatizes the use of her hands, yet reveals a character who both wants to be released from Dracula, but wants to remain with him.

Dr. Seward, unable to distinguish these happenings, calls in a specialist, Professor Van Helsing (Tim Brown), who is quickly united in action with Lucy's fiancee, Jonathan Harker (Jeff McDowell.) Both of these characters are new to the College Theatre; however perform admirably. After much coaxing, Professor Van Helsing and Harker employ the help of Dr. Seward to rid the London countryside of ... Dracala.

The light-footed Count Dracula (Jerry Hough) makes several visits to the Seward home, hypnotizing Lucy and her maid, Miss Wells (Carol Norton,) into his service. Both Dracula and Miss Wells are realistic characters bringing much life into the three-act play.

Although his role was small, when Butterworth (Eddie Harbert) entered the stage, he took full command He artfully portrays an attendant in the sanitorium who fights a losing battle against Reinfield (Mark Lilly.) Reinfield is a patient in the sanitorium who eats spiders and flies. Needless to say, he is also an accomplice of Count Dracula. Reinfield has many scenes in the play where he begs to be saved from the "evil" of Dracula.

However, as in most comedy plays, good wins over evil and Lucy, Miss Wells and all of London are saved from the blood-sucking Count Dracula. As Jonathan Harker (Jeff McDowell) drives the wooden stake through Dracula's heart, souls are saved and true love remains.

RRRRRRRRR Appeals Policy Listed

Each college and university under the governance of the West Virginia Board of Regents shall provide, through institutional-level procedures, opportunities for students to appeal final grades assigned them. In formulating institutional policies to provide appropriate levels for reviewing student grade appeals, the following shall apply:

(1) The different steps and levels in the process and the procedures for advancing appeals shall be clearly delineated and published in the institutional catalog, student handbook, or other publication which is made available to all students.

(2) In exceptional cases where appeal deliberations determine that a grade has been improperly assigned, provisions shall exist to ensure that the grade will be modified in accordance with the findings of the final campus reviewing authority.

(3) Grade appeals shall end at the institutional level.

(4) No later than January 1, 1981, each college and university shall file with the Board Office grade appeal procedures which accommodate the provisions of this policy. All revisions to the institutional procedures initially filed must likewise be submitted to the Board Office.

### Mercury Celebrates 51st Birthday

Can you guess who will be fifty-one years old this year? That's right, your first guess was correct. The <u>Glenville</u> <u>Mercury</u> is fifty-one and still going strong. In these fifty-one years, the name of the college and the newspaper have changed several times.

The college was formerly called the Glenville Normal School in the twenties and the name of the newspaper was <u>The Tower</u>. Although these changes do not seem important, the stories from these previous <u>Mercurys</u> make for interesting reading. For example, in 1930 the first four-year degree was awarded, Homecomings were started and Ethel Barrymore and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt visited the campus. In the 50's, the first sorority (Kappa Phi Kappa) was formed, the first Montrose Award was presented, the Veterans club was formed and in 1952 the Health Building was established.

In 1960, Robert F. Kennedy addressed the student body, lettermen jackets were banned and 'The Four Freshmen,' a nationally known recording group, performed.

In the seventies, the GSC football team had a running back named Jimmy Carter; the bowling team won the '76 WVIAC Tournament and the National Championship; Vincent Bugliosi, a prosecuting attorney spoke on <u>Helter Skelter</u>, lectured on the Charles Manson case and Rosle Grier and Michael Johnson made guest appearances.

Of course, these are only a few highlights of the years past which the <u>Mercury</u> has scooped. Hopefully, the future will bring even more exciting happenings with even better coverage.
